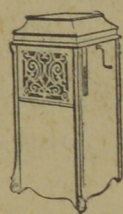


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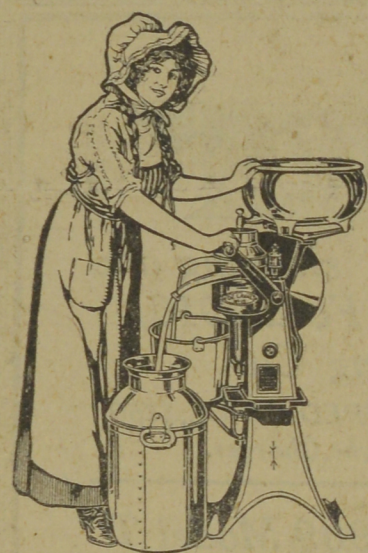

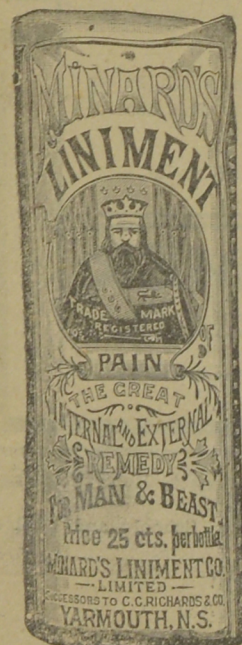

Infielder McDonald and Cash Consideration to Boston Given in Exchange for the Catcher

Chicago, May 1—Manager Joe Tinker of the Cincinnati team today signed John Kling, the catcher, who will report for duty at Cincinnati next Sunday.

In exchange for Kling's release Tinker gives C. McDonald an infielder, and a cash consideration to Boston. The size of the latter was not announced, nor was the salary Kling is to receive made public.

BOSTON BRAVES GAVE
\$4,000 FOR RUDOLPH

Boston, May 2—According to a dispatch from Toronto yesterday, Dick Rudolph has been sold to the Boston Nationals for \$4000 cash, pitcher "Buster" Brown, for whom the Bostonians have received offers of \$3500 from American Association clubs, and the pick of any of the Boston players turned back.

Rudolph took part in 42 games last season. He won 25 of these, lost 10 and tied in one game. He held his position for an average of .976, accepting 120 out of 123 chances. He struck out 137 men, passed 63 and hit three batters. Twelve wild pitches were scored against him. He was third in the standing of the International League boxmen. He is a fair sticker, having hit the ball for an average of .234.

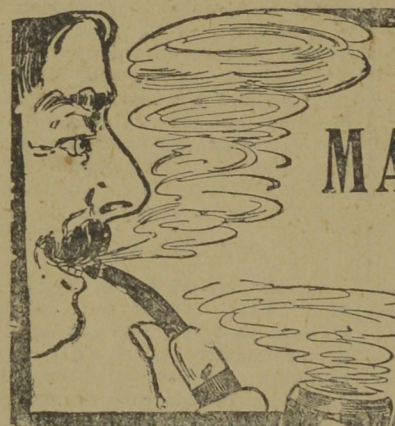
FORMER HALIFAX TROTTER UP AGAINST CLASSY ENTRIES

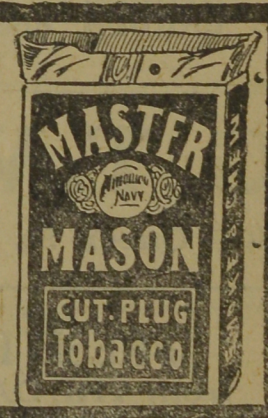
