

## WOULD RESTRICT LOANS TO CORPORATIONS

Ottawa, April 30—When the Banking and Commerce Committee resumed this morning an amendment of J. A. M. Aikens, came up for consideration providing against the establishment of foreign branches excepting in so far as auxiliary to the banking business of Canada.

Mr. Aikens decided to withdraw the amendment "in deference to the opposition of the Minister of Finance."

Mr. White objected to the word "Opposition." It was not opposition he said but if the amendment were adopted it would still be in the discretion of the directors to determine what business was "auxiliary." Mr. White pointed out that the Nova Scotia, Royal, and other banks did a large business outside of Canada.

It was a further amendment proposed by Major Sam Sharpe, which was the first real object of discussion this morning and then there was a lively row over it.

### FOREIGN LOANS

Major Sharpe's amendment provided that Canadian Banks may not lend money or make advances in excess of ten per cent of their paid-up capital to any foreign person, company, or corporation, or upon the securities of such foreign person, etc., or in excess of 25 per cent of paid up capital to any person residing in Canada.

There was a double barreled principle in the amendment and the discussion waxed warm on both phases. Major Sharpe quoted the American comptroller of currency as stating that bank failures were unusually due to centralization of capital among particular individuals or corporations. Parliament has a right to restrict the loans of banks to persons and corporations of foreign countries.

Several speakers objected to the clause. Mr. White declared that to restrict loans at certain times of the years would be disastrous to corporations. A vote was finally taken on the first principle of the amendment relating to foreign loans. The amendment was defeated by a vote of 23 to 10.

The second principle regarding the restriction of domestic loans was voted down by an overwhelming majority.

An amendment was offered by Hon. H. R. Emerson, which was designed to prevent banks from expending more than five per cent of committed capital and reserve in real and reserve in real and immovable property. The amendment further provided that monthly and annual statements should contain the real value of each property. Mr. Nesbitt, of North Oxford, and Mr. McCurdy supported this. That the vote was a foregone conclusion was evidenced by the fact that for the first principle only three men voted, Messrs. Emerson, Thompson and Warnock.

On the principle of providing information as to value of real and immovable property, there was a much larger vote—sixteen against and fourteen for.

Considerable time was expended in defining terms throughout the act. When the word live stock was being defined, Mr. Emerson asked if black foxes should not go under that category in order to help out the maritime "ranchers."

"These people don't need any credit," said Mr. White, "they are making so much money."  
"They'll be lending to the banks themselves," said Mr. Nesbitt.

### THE SECRET LIEN

The new clause extending the secret lien to farmers and ranchers came up for some consideration. Major Sharpe declared himself as absolutely opposed to the secret lien. Notice of it should be given in a registry office in the various provinces, at the Dominion 21 hours after the lien was given. Without such notice the principle was a very dangerous one. The bankers' lien would take precedence to the landlords' lien. It would make the banks preferred creditors.

Hon. Mr. White declared that the whole question of extending the lien to farmers had given him more worry than any other portion of the act. He did not believe that the secret lien should be extended beyond the wholesale manufacturers. Only the exigencies of the transportation and storage problem of the

west would induce him to consider the matter of inserting the clause at all. He was entirely opposed to registration in any case. The banks objected to it.

The amendment was put to the vote and carried eighteen to nine. "Strike one," said Major Sharpe.

The clause itself extending the privilege to farmers on the grain passed with no apparent opposition. Mr. White, however, did not agree.

"You have now introduced the chattel mortgage system. You are making pawnshops out of the banks. It is bad legislation," he declared.

"You'll have the banks in possession of half the personal property."

## TORY PAPER COM- PLAINS OF ROADS

Everybody is complaining of the bad roads and nobody is doing anything as yet to remedy them. 
