(1) A Bill authorizing the City to grant certain concessions to the Palmer-McLellan Company, Limited, and to fix the valuation of the property of Frasers Limited in this City for taxation purposes.

(2) A Bill to authorize the issue of Debentures for the erection of a Fire Station, a Police Station, for the purchase of Queen's Park and for the further construction of Permanent Street Pavements, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000).

(3) A Bill to provide for lighting by electricity the Fredericton and St. Mary's Highway Bridge.

## SUFFRAGETTE HIKERS

## TIRED OF THE JOB

Rahway, N.J., February 14—Chilled to the bone and ready to fight at the drop of the hat, General Rosalie Jones' little army of suffragist hikers arrived here today after a twelve-mile walk that seriously tried their tender feet. There have been three desertions since yesterday when the army arrived at Princeton and were met by the students.

Last night the army was thirteen strong, and today, alas, it is but ten. The wounded list also contains two names. They are Mlle. Lausanne, the edine suffragette who bulls the baggage train and Mrs. Hetty Graham. Mlle. Lausanne, who was given that French cognomen because she was born in Peru, Ind., had a decided limp and Mrs. Graham was partly overcome by cold.

Along the line of march the houses were flag decorated and crowded with spectators who cheered the Pilgrims. A short distance outside of Princeton a horse attached to an express wagon was asleep standing up at the curb. He awoke suddenly as the cornets of the paraders blared. After taking one look at the procession he fell in a heap on the icy pavement.

The hike started at nine o'clock. It was slightly delayed by the breaking down of the commissary automobile to Pilgrim Alphonse Major. All of the Pilgrim baggage had to be despatched by express, together with such of the 20,000 leaflets, 10,000 Pilgrim postcards, 500 copies of Votes for Women, 500 votes for women buttons, 400 malted milk tablets megaphones and twenty cakes of foot soap that could not be accommodated in the automobile of official Scout Olive Dhultz.

Pilgrim Gaffney wore slung over her shoulder a pair of hob-nailed shoes which had gone to the South Pole with a member of Shackleton's party. Possibly on that account she was riding in the commissary automobile long before the first five miles had been covered.

## COFFEE AND FRANKFURTERS

At one point the marchers were regaled by a woman sympathizer with coffee and frankfurter sandwiches, which were much appreciated, especially by Albany veterans who recalled a freezing afternoon on which a New York State woman had welcomed them to her home with a bunch of illies.

FORMER CASHIER CHARGED  
WITH EMBEZZLEMENT

Trenton, N.J., Feb. 17—Abram L. Beavers, the former cashier of the First National Bank of High Bridge, N.J., under indictment on the charge of having misapplied and converted to his own use funds of the bank, made his appearance today before the United States Court in this city to be tried under the indictment. At the defendant pleaded guilty to the charge last month before United States Commissioner Richard Stockton, in Elizabeth, N.J., it is expected that the hearing in the Federal court will be short and perfunctory.

Premier Roblin is an Ontario man by birth, though he may fairly claim to be one of the pioneers of the greatest. Foreseeing the great development which must take place in western Canada when a transcontinental railway was built, he settled in Dufferin, Manitoba, in early life, and became associated with the grain trade, eventually establishing a business in Winnipeg.

After two unsuccessful attempts he was elected to the Provincial legislature in 1888. At first he was identified with the Liberal party, but, becoming dissatisfied, took the other side. When the Greenway Government was defeated in 1899 Mr. Roblin was given a place in Hugh J. Macdonald's cabinet, and succeeded to the leadership of the party on Mr. Macdonald's cabinet retirement the next year. In 1900 he became Premier.

wear the same clothes as deputy ministers. If there is no difference in dress there is no difference in rank or merit unless you reckon with those augmented distances in the interior of the soul, which are not always visible on the surface.

Sir John, as I have said, saw all this at a glance and solved the problem in his own prompt way. He left the deputy ministers where they were in the dark trousers and bellboy buttons—a sort of glorified combination suit—but he gave the cabinet ministers, privy councillors and lieutenant governors a step up. The promotion was from black trousers to white breeches. Earl Grey was much pleased. He wrote a letter to Colonial Secretary Lytton pointing out that the white breeches were a sign of Canada's growing importance. And indeed any Canadian mother will agree with this. It is always a red-letter day when you "shorten" the baby.

## SCORNED WHITE BREECHES

Of course there were people who objected to white breeches. Sir Mackenzie, who had grown fond of his blue and bottoms, hung it in a cupboard and never wore it again. What's more he refused to buy

white breeches and the fixings that went with them. The old ways and the old clothes, so he said, were good enough for him. The Hon. Hon. Charles Murphy and the Hon. Frank Oliver also stuck it out. But the deputy ministers came along with a rush. Altogether the change has caught on very well.

Some day soon I will do myself the pleasure of describing other uniforms to be seen at Ottawa and perhaps make a few suggestions about white breeches. Meanwhile it will be enough to say that the uniform which Canadian cabinet ministers, privy councillors and lieutenant governors wear today in the civil uniform of the second class. It differs in a few minor details from the uniform of his majesty's household. It is worn also by the commissioner of the Somaliland protectorate and by the lieutenant-governors, cabinet ministers and privy councils of Australia, New Zealand and South Africa. An added blessing is that cabinet ministers, who are also privy councillors, may wear the uniform of their class even after relinquishing office, so that when a statesman of parts goes into the tomb shades his faithful white breeches go with him.

Yes, Sir John Gibson was within his rights when he wore the white breeches. Perhaps you would like to hear what the lord chamberlain says. These are his very words,

plucked from the living page, last edition: Dress "worn at his majesty's court. Mark the daedatan and connate splendor of the official garments:

Coatee—Blue cloth, single breasted stand collar. The collar and gauntlet cuffs are of black velvet. None 'buttons up the front, showing between the two embroidered edges (which are made to 'hook), two at the bottom of the bottom of the back skirts. The buttons, gilt mounted, the royal arms' with supporters, style No. 1. White silk linings. A white collar may be worn inside the collar of the coat. Gold oak leaf embroidery not more than four inches wide at the base of each front, but to broaden across the chest according to figure. The embroidery on the cuffs must not exceed four inches and must have a saw edge. The collar, pocket flaps, back, skirts, back skirts and side edges are also embroidered.

Breeches—White Kerseymer with three covered buttons at the knees.

Hose—White silk.

Shoes—Black patent leather.

Hat—Black heaver cocked hat, black silk cockade, double gold bullion loop and gold tassels without hangers. White ostrich feather border.

Sword—The regulation pattern with black scabbard and gilt mountings.
