man Pinder squarely in the eye,

Harry Woods.

For the edification of the new  
members Mr. Slipp gave a brief  
dissertation on "Political shams  
their uses and abuses" which was  
much enjoyed.

Shortly before one o'clock several  
of the members having fallen asleep  
the caucus was adjourned until this  
morning. It reassembled at eleven  
o'clock in the executive council  
chamber. The session lasted more  
than an hour and resulted in con-  
siderable hot air being generated. At  
last accounts Honest John was still  
holding the fort.

palace was one of great animation.  
Several regiments of infantry encircled  
the yard, buglers in brilliant uni-  
forms sounded fanfares, colors were  
dipped and the military bands played  
"The Marseillaise." Outside the  
crowds shouted "Long Live the Pre-  
sident," and "Zong Live Poincare."  
The actual ceremony of the trans-  
fer of office was simplicity itself  
and consumed scarcely five minutes  
from the beginning to the end. In  
the Salon des Ambassadeurs, the  
largest of the reception rooms of the  
Elysee, the retiring President awaited  
the arrival of the man who was to  
succeed him in office. President  
Fallieres was surrounded by the mem-  
bers of the cabinet, delegations re-  
presenting the senate and the cham-  
ber of deputies and the members of  
his military household.

President Fallieres' address of  
greeting and the response of his suc-  
cessor were both brief. Both M.  
Poincare and Fallieres wore evening  
dress with the broad scarlet sashes  
of the Grand Cross of the Legion of  
Honor across their breasts. The pre-  
sence of their military staffs gave  
brilliance to the scene, the bright  
uniforms affording a pleasing touch  
of color against the somber back-  
ground.

At the hour of the inauguration  
every military garrison in France  
thundered a salute of twenty-one  
guns. The soldiers were given a half-  
holiday by order of the Minister of  
War.

Following the ceremony the former  
President and his family withdrew to  
their private apartment in the Rue  
Francois I. President Poincare did  
not remain long at the palace, re-  
turning to his former home where  
his wife awaited him. Just when the  
President and Mme Poincare will  
take up their permanent abode at  
the Elysee has not been announced.  
It is rumored that the palace is to  
be renovated and redecorated from  
basement to attic and that the Pre-  
sident and his wife will remain in  
their present home until the work is  
completed.

The extensive "brushing up" which  
the Elysee is to undergo at the or-  
der of Mme Poincare is generally un-  
derstood to mean that the palace  
will soon be the scene of social gay-  
eties and official entertainments such  
as have seldom taken place within  
its walls during the seven years' oc-  
cupancy of M. and Mme. Fallieres,  
whose neglect of the social obliga-  
tions attendant upon the office of  
chief executive of the nation and the  
mistress of the Elysee has been the  
subject of much comment and criti-  
cism.

## FARMERS AND DAIRYMAN

The commissioner also dealt with  
that great stride had been made  
largely through the efforts of the  
provincial horticulturist. He spoke  
highly of the work of the Fruit  
Growers' Association. Illustration  
orchards were of great value as was  
also the importation of good stock  
from outside nurseries.

Dr. Landry expressed pleasure on  
account of the success which had at-  
tended institute meetings and claimed  
that his department had organized  
the Farming Special train which  
had gone through the province to the  
great advantage of the farming com-  
munities.

Dealing with the dairying industry  
the speaker stated that the past year  
had been the second best in the his-  
tory of the province. The best year  
had been 1903. The value of dairy  
products had been within \$10,000 of  
the total value of 1903 and was \$82,-  
000 in excess of that of 1908. His  
department intended to extend work  
in this line but could not work un-  
aided.

The Commissioner touched upon the  
matter of the establishment of the  
two agricultural schools and an ex-  
perimental farm. He made a plea  
for co-operation on the part of the  
farmers with the Farm Settlement  
Board and hoped that the results of  
the work of that body would war-  
rant its continuation.

Pres Smith to address the Associa-  
tion. He stated that the trouble with  
the farmers of New Brunswick that  
they failed to stand together. He  
suggested that the farmers them-  
selves had the solution of the prob-  
lem of keeping the young people on  
the farm. If the boys and girls were  
given a financial interest in the farm  
they would stay there. He made a  
plea for more installations of water  
systems and sanitary appliances in  
farm-houses. Good roads were also  
discussed by the bishop. They could  
not be obtained by statute labor.  
He also advocated the investment of  
money instead of hoarding it. The  
practice of going to the lumber  
woods in the winter he strongly con-  
demned saying that the capital in-  
vested in the woods was lost.

Mr. C. N. Vroom of St. Stephen,  
president of the New Brunswick Fruit  
Growers' Association, followed His  
Lordship. The association had saved,  
he said, a considerable amount  
of money in the importation of apple  
trees. Within the past three years  
100,000 apple trees had been imported  
into New Brunswick. Spraying  
apparatus had increased 1,000 per  
cent. Spraying material had been  
imported by the association.

There was no danger, said the  
speaker, of there being an over-pro-  
duction of apples for during the past  
year New Brunswick had imported  
49,000 barrels. New Brunswick could  
raise better apples than any other  
province in Canada. The McIntosh  
Red, the finest apple in Canada,  
could be raised in its highest perfec-  
tion in this province and it brought  
the highest price. (Applause.)

Mr. Vroom gave some data of pro-  
fits made at illustration orchards in  
various parts of the province. Pro-  
posed in the farm should be too  
great to permit of labor for a dol-  
lar per day. He felt sure he could  
say that during the year he had  
stopped more people from going west  
than any other man in the province  
(Applause). He closed his remarks  
with advice to stay in New Brun-  
swick.
