St. John Doubled Score on Fredericton Yesterday

CANADIAN
HORSES MADE GREAT
RACING AT BANGOR

Earl Jr. Won Free-for-all with Hal B.
Jr. Taking Second Money--Other Events

Bangor, Me., Aug. 6--Earl Jr., a Canadian stallion owned by Murphy, of Enderby, B.C., and driven by Milloy, won the \$3,000 free-for-all pace at the second day of the Grand Pine Tree Circuit races here this afternoon breaking all state and track records for a mile over a half-mile track, when he took the second heat of the race in 2:06½. The State of Maine record was made by the same horse at Lewiston last week, when he went the mile in 2:08 in the sixth heat. The record for the sixth heat over a half-mile track for the world. According to the announcement made by the judges he made the last quarter of the second heat in 29½ or at a 1:59 clip. Earl Jr. was formerly owned by A. H. Merrill of Danvers, the starter at the meet here, who sold him to the present owner for \$4,500.

Another Canadian Horse, Hal B Jr., owned by Kastner of Seabringville, Ontario, took second money in the free-for-all winning the first heat in 2:10½ and pushing the winner all of the time. Pickles, a Connecticut mare, was third, and Mansfield, a Massachusetts horse, was fourth. It was the nearest approach to Grand Circuit racing that Maine has ever seen and was witnessed by 5,000 people.

Boston, Aug. 7.--Needle-like shells propelled by eights, doubles, fours or individual oarsmen, darted hither and thither on the broad stretch of the Charles River Basin today in final practice for the forty-first championship regatta of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen. The preliminaries in the regatta will take place tomorrow, and the final events will be rowed on Saturday. Indications point to one of the most successful regattas the association has held in years. Leading boat clubs of New York and New England, with several in the middle States, will be represented in one or more of the twelve events that make up the program. Moreover, an international flavor will be given the regatta by the participation of the North West Arm Rowing club of Halifax. The club is sending, in addition to its four-oared crew, F. R. Hart, champion sculler of the Maritime Provinces, and R. T. Fitzpatrick, intermediate champion for the senior singles. The Halifax City eight will also contest in the regatta.

RED SOX CANNOT GET PITCHER WILLIAMS

Sacramento, Calif., Aug. 5--Had other major league clubs waived on a certain Boston Red Sox infielder today, "Honolulu" Johnny Williams, star twirler for the Sacramento team, would have started for Boston tomorrow. The waiver was refused, however, and a deal involving about \$10,000 blew up.

The Boston club wired tonight that the waiver was refused. As the Sacramento club wants players rather than money, the deal is off.

Williams is the second best pitcher in the Coast League, his percentage of victories being .700. He learned to pitch in the Hawaiian Islands and was tipped off to Charley Graham, the local magnate, by "Babe" Danzig, a former Red Sox player. This is his third year in baseball. Half a dozen big league scouts are after him. He is a right-hander.

TENARA CONTINUES WINNING BIG PRIZES ON GRAND CIRCUIT

Won Paper Mills Stake at Kalamazoo Yesterday--Won all Four Heats and \$12,000

Kalamazoo, Mich., Aug. 6--Before the largest crowd that ever witnessed a horse race in Kalamazoo, the Kentucky mare, Tamara, driven by Andrews, easily won the \$12,000 paper mills stake, the feature of today's Grand Circuit card. The event was raced on the four-heat plan, \$3,000 for each heat.

In the first heat Tenara and Judson Girl raced even to the half, when Judson Girl broke. The other horses also broke and Andrews had no trouble in bringing Tenara under the wire an easy winner.

In the second heat Tenara lay back until the half-mile post was reached. Then she went out in front and came under the wire eased up. In the next two heats Andrews kept the mare in front all the way around.

This is the third rich stake won by Tenara this season, she having captured \$10,000 events at both Fort Erie and Grand Rapids.

In the 2.16 trot, the first race of the day, Frances Graham had no difficulty in beating Grand Marshal, who was thought to have the race at his mercy. Geers sprang a big surprise when he drove his mare under the wire first in every heat in the race.

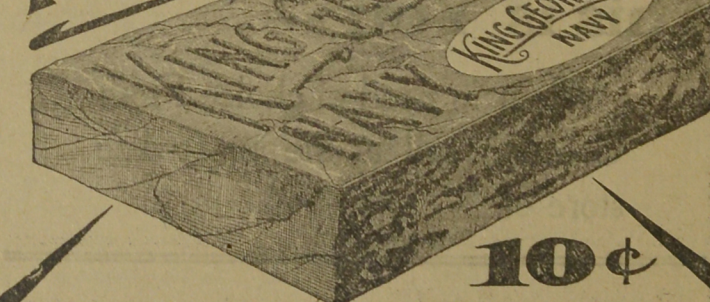
REULBACH TRAGED
