BOLD ROBBERY
AT DOAKTOWN
YESTERDAY

Earl Van Horne Stole \$115 from the Store of Wm. Duffy--Confessed to Theft--Part of Money Recovered

Earl Van Horne, who was in trouble at the Douglas boom a short time ago, on account of thefts which he committed, burglarized Wm. Duffy's store, of Boiestown, yesterday afternoon, and secured \$115 in cash. The robbery took place in broad daylight, but unnoticed by any person. Shortly afterward Van Horne was observed to be flush with cash, and was at once suspected. He was approached and through the influence of a relative, was induced to disgorge. He showed where ninety dollars was hidden beneath the station platform. The balance he had spent for various articles. He was let go.

Young Van Horne hails from Durham, but had been about Boiestown for some time. Yesterday he was in Mr. Duffy's store, and unobserved, slipped the bolts which held the door at top and bottom. During the afternoon the proprietor was called out and locked the door, but was unaware that the bolts were drawn. Van Horne, seeing Mr. Duffy leave the store, pushed the door open and entered. He searched the place and found the sum of money mentioned in the cash box.

SUDDEN DEATH.

Mrs. Pond, wife of Ex-Coun. John S. Pond of Ludlow, died very unexpectedly last evening. She suffered a stroke of paralysis while doing her house-work at noon and became unconscious. She died at 8 o'clock in the evening. She is survived by a husband, three sons and two daughters. One of the sons has been in the city for several days and does not know of his mother's death.

DANGER FROM
SPRUCE BUG WORM
PAST FOR SEASON

Insect Pest Reported to Crown Land Office from Kings and Northumberland Counties--Destroys Spruce and Fir Trees

According to a report made to Col. T. G. Lobgie, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, by Mr. W. W. McIntosh, of the Natural History Museum, St. John, the danger of any extreme ravages in the province by the Spruce Bud Worm is past for this season. There remains, however, the danger of the insects re-appearing in larger numbers next year. It is understood that the pest has to be fought by the importation of parasites.

Lt. Col. Loggie has received from the Miramichi Lumber company specimens of the worms taken at Doaktown and also from the S. H. White company, specimens taken in King's county. This dreaded insect is certainly in the province, but not as yet in large numbers.

It is considered a matter of the gravest importance to New Brunswick that the Spruce Bud Worm be not permitted to get a foot hold, as the spruce forests are the greatest asset of this province. Reports made to the Crown Land Office state that the insect destroys the foliage of spruce and fir trees exactly as it would be destroyed by fire. Young trees are killed by the pest.
