SENATOR FROM WEST A PICTURESQUE FIGURE

Washington, D.C., Feb. 1.—Senator Knute Nelson of Minnesota, one of the most picturesque figures in the States senate and likewise one of the most influential of the Republican members of that body, will celebrate his seventieth birthday tomorrow. Senator Nelson whose present term will expire next month has just been re-elected by the Minnesota legislature for another term of six years. In the next Congress he will rank among the veterans of the senate in point of service as well as age. Of the entire membership of the senate as it will be constituted after March 1, only two members, Lodge of Massachusetts and Perkins of California, will have seen longer service in the upper house than the senior senator from Minnesota. Both Senators Lodge and Perkins came to the senate in 1893, two years before Senator Nelson made his appearance.

The career of Senator Nelson is of much more than ordinary interest, and in several respects unique. The story of his life has many of the salient features of a romance, including the picturesque and unusual. Born on a little farm near the city of Bergen in the southwestern part of Norway, he accompanied his widowed mother to America when six years old. The family was practically penniless and the early youth of the future senator was one of hardships and privations. Undoubtedly it was the remembrance of these early days that prompted Senator Nelson to come to the aid of Folke Brandt, the young Scandinavian whose pardon he was instrumental in securing and whom he has taken to Minnesota to begin life anew.

Chicago was Senator Nelson's first home in America. Here he aided in support of the family by selling papers on the streets. In 1850 the mother and son went to Walworth County, Wis., and settled on an unproductive little sand farm. When he was 16 young Knute heard that at Albion Seminary which was conducted by Seventh-Day Baptists he could get an education without money. He at once set out on a tramp of sixteen miles to see about it. For two years he farniated at the seminary doing chores for the people in the vicinity to pay for his tuition and board.

When the war broke out Senator Nelson with twenty of his fellow students enlisted. He served three years, was wounded, taken prisoner at Port Hudson, and came out a corporal. He then finished his seminary course, read law in Senator Vilas' office in Madison, was admitted to the bar and elected to the Wisconsin legislature before he was twenty-four years old.

J. M. ROBINSON & SONS WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REVIEWS

St. John Feb. 1.—While there has been no material change in conditions and influences surrounding the stock market, there has been a somewhat improved sentiment and in certain parts of the list, more activity and strength.

One conspicuous feature has been the absence of any pronounced liquidation, declines being followed immediately by absolute dullness and lack of business. It is equally true that the buying power is small, excepting that arising from shorts and in certain specialties, but perhaps the absence of liquidation is more significant than the latter.

The situation abroad, politically, has its dangers, but there appears to be more of a give and take spirit, probably inspired more by financial inability than from any other motives. Financial conditions abroad leave much to be desired, especially on the continent, and it is difficult to see how, with enormous financing ahead in Europe this year, and with many borrowing countries having held off waiting for more favorable conditions, there can be any easement of money of consequence abroad. This is accentuated by the apparent increase in credits out of proportion with gold reserve, an economic condition which presents some dangers.

This condition, however, seems to be applicable only across the water and not in the United States. Money is evidently plentiful, and while large financing is ahead, funds will undoubtedly be available at a price. Uncertainties regarding tariff, however, continued attacks against corporations and capital and experimental plans are not conducive to an immediate return of confidence and it is difficult to anticipate sufficient relief from these conditions to assure any large upturn of stability or breadth.

In Canada, while there is enough money to go around, there is no surplus, and the banks are inclined to mark up rates wherever there is an opportunity to do so, in fact it begins to look as if there will be no easy money conditions in Canada this year, unless there is a very heavy flow of money for investment from both Europe and United States.

DETROIT

This stock is holding its advance of last week in a very encouraging manner, and the shareholders seem to be waiting for the action of the Board of Directors next Tuesday, when it is expected that the dividend will be increased to 6 per cent. If this should happen there will very likely be a big demand for the stock and the price should advance from five to ten points. If the dividend is not increased there will very likely be some reaction, and on any breaks we consider this stock to be a purchase on account of the splendid earnings of the Company.

SPANISH RIVER

From all appearances it would not be presuming too much to look for another advance in Spanish River before long. There are evidences of a disposition of the board of insiders to keep the stock around 70 at present as they do not want it to advance too rapidly. On any reaction we would have no hesitation in advising the purchase of this security.

CANADIAN COTTONS

Canadian Cottons has shown more activity this week, due no doubt to the election of a Director of Textile Company to the Vice-Presidency. This procedure will no doubt be to the advantage of both companies, as they will work more closely together. The Preferred stock certainly looks attractive as an investment at the present price, and the common offers good opportunities for speculation.

I were bred in captivity in Prince Edward Island during that period.

Sub-sec. 2 of Sec. B.

Any silver black fox shall be eligible for registration whose color is free of red or rust, even if either of their parents were not eligible for registration.

(c) No foxes shall be registered unless the owner is a member of this association.

Also that a copy of the New Brunswick Act for the protection of foxes and ranches from the dog nuisance and in the act substituting in place of the penalties of section two of the said New Brunswick Act and making it read \$1000.00 and \$500.00 respectively in place of \$50.00 and \$5.00 as therein stated.

And in section four, substituting in the said section the sum of \$2000.00 and \$1000.00 respectively in the place of \$100.00 and \$50.00 as therein stated.

Also that we apply to the Dominion parliament at its present session for an act in amendment to the criminal codes re stealing of foxes and breaking into fox pens and enclosures and make it the same as burglary.

MUCH INTEREST IN BANDIT'S TRIAL

Paris, Jan. 31.—Not since Mme. Steinheil was tried several years ago for the alleged murder of her husband and mother-in-law, has a trial in Paris excited the intense interest exhibited in the cases of the surviving members of the Bonnot-Garnier gang of motor bandits, who will be called to the bar next Monday to answer to a long list of charges of robbery and murder. Though a number of members of the gang, including the most prominent leaders, met death in resisting the sensational seizure by the police some months ago, there are still twenty-one members who are to be tried. For the accommodation of the unusually large number of prisoners a special dock has been built in the assize court at the Palais de Justice. It has also been deemed advisable to construct in the courtroom a large glass case for the numerous exhibits, including an amazing assortment of revolvers, carbines, daggers, slungshots and other weapons found on the prisoners when they were taken into custody.

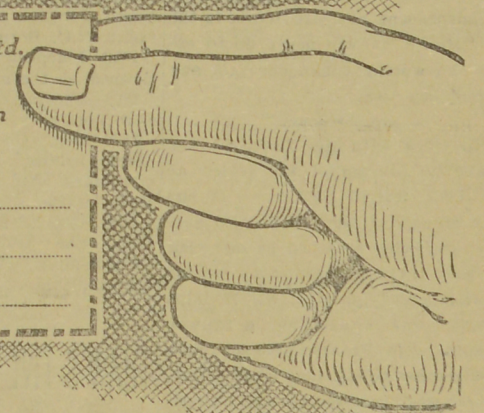
