ALLIES WANT MORE NOW

The Balkan plenipotentiaries speaking for publication today reasserted their own terms and would satisfy their ambitions to absorb European Turkey entirely, which would include Constantinople. Dr. Deneff, head of the Bulgarians said: "We leave England having shown the world that the Balkan union is not a bluff but a real and important factor in near eastern politics. We intend that our alliance shall remain alive and intact. The feature of the situation which stands out is the unity of the great powers and the fact that none of them desires to take advantage of the troubled state of affairs in the near east. I am convinced that all the powers desire peace. The allies will always regard the collective note of the powers to Turkey as their Magna Charta. The immediate future rests with rifles and guns. Probably there is in store for the world a big surprise than the earlier events of the war provided. I have noticed in some quarters a disposition to accuse us of not exhibiting a conciliatory spirit. Are the public aware that in deference to the powers the allies on the separate occasions deferred the final answer? To remain longer would be undignified and ridiculous."

HOPE FOR PEACE YET

Berlin, Feb. 1.—The weekly review of the Norddeutsche Allgemeine Zeitung says: "Hope has not yet been given up that the powers will be able to prevent further blood-letting in the Balkans, but in the event of the renewal of hostilities Germany will continue to observe the strictest neutrality."

The Cologne Gazette's Berlin despatch says that the powers will endeavor to the last moment to prevent hostilities. Germany sitting a good example by her advice to the allies.

THE CANADA WEST INDIA COMPANY

(Hartland Advertiser.)

In September last The Observer cautioned the farmers of Carleton County in regard to the Canada West India Company. We did not charge that the company was a fraudulent enterprise. We did point out that if it was as good a thing as its promoters represented it to be, the government might very well guarantee the bonds for the required funds. The farmers, denied the benefit of free access to the great American markets, might reasonably ask the government to finance this glittering project. But they didn't. Many of them instead succumbed to the alluring literature and confidential "information" of the makers of the scheme and gave notes for amounts of \$100 and upwards in return for stock certificates of the company. These were advertised as an excellent thing for a father to present to his son as a start on a prosperous career. As time went on it became more apparent that the Canada West India Company was not the success that it at first was promised to be. It had at its head men of means and good repute so far as they were estimated by the stockholders. B. F. Smith was the president, Rev. J. B. Daggett and W. W. Melville solicited stock subscriptions from the farmers and sufficient confidence was thus established to raise several thousand dollars and magnificent salaries were paid to the officers for their services. Confidence soon began to wane and it is not news to anyone in Carleton County that now the affairs of the company, if not literally "busted," are most awfully twisted. Some farmers are reputed to have refused to pay their notes. One farmer's note is said to have been endorsed over to a custom tailor to pay for fine clothes for one of the company's officers. Other farmer shareholders are anxious that the affairs of the company be investigated. Others again wonder if the president and stock solicitors and other high promoters of the concern are out anything.

COLLECTOR FISHER BURIED AT WOODSTOCK

Woodstock, Feb. 3.—The funeral of Williamson Fisher, late collector of customs, who died on Thursday afternoon, took place this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and was largely attended. Services were conducted by Rev. R. W. Weddall at the house.


