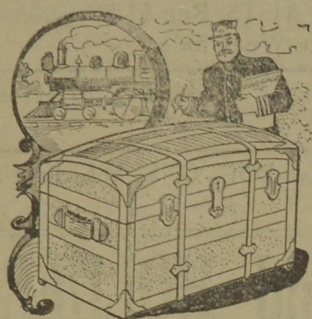

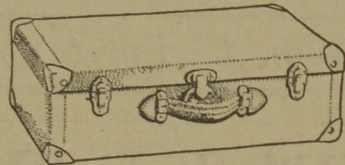

FAST HOCKEY ATTENDED RETURN OF SEVEN-MEN GAME

N. H. A. Teams all Played Close Hard-fought Matches Saturday Night---Overtime at Toronto

Toronto, Feb. 2.—Going into overtime in their last three games, the Tecumsehs have become known as the overtime specialists of the N. H. A. At the Arena Saturday night they were beaten, 5 to 4, by Quebec in fifteen minutes extra play. The game was the first N. H. A. fixture in Toronto in which the full complement of seven men was used by the teams.

Beaumont's franchise was purchased from Oklahoma City last year and it is claimed that Thorpe was among the players reserved by that club.

Manager Wheeler has telegraphed to Sec. Farrell of the National Association to protect the Beaumont club in its claim to Thorpe's services.

Score was 7 to 5---Crescents had Superior Condition and Won on Their Merits---Game Except in First Period Not an Extra Good Exhibition---Big Marysville Contingent Was Present

Six-men hockey made its first local appearance this season at the Arctic Rink Saturday night. Incidentally, Marysville Crescents beat Fredericton 7 to 5 and as might be expected the big Marysville contingent at the rink was delighted, for Marysville always supports its teams with great enthusiasm and besides there was quite a sum of money staked on the result of the game.

As hockey the game was not particularly delightful. The score was slightly larger than is usually the case when seven men a side are played and the individual rushes which hockey of this brand is calculated to encourage were much in evidence. The outstanding fact was, however, that neither team was in condition to stand the pace made necessary by six-men hockey but that Marysville had a margin of condition over Fredericton which is represented by the score. The first of the three twenty-minute periods saw the two teams set a hard pace with Marysville having a shade the better of it. After that the game was a good exposition of "shiny" the prototype of hockey. In the second period Crescents tallied four times to Fredericton's two goals and the last period Fredericton scored the only goal.

FAILED TO PLAY POSITION.

The Fredericton forwards failed to play their positions and on that account lost many chances to score, as well as giving Marysville's forwards chance after chance to get away. Fred McLean was put on at right wing but evidently forgot that as he was all over the ice just as he is when he plays rover in the seven-men team. Except for that fault he played hard and aggressive hockey.

Arnold on the other wing also put up a good game. At centre however, Alex. Galloway again failed to strike his gait and in the latter part of the game showed signs of the hard pace. Blaine Pugh was laid up with a sore ankle, otherwise it would have made a stronger forward line to have had him on the wing and alternated Galloway and McLean at centre-ice. Tom Coward was used at left wing by Fredericton and played well, though handicapped by lack of weight and experience. Hughes at coverpoint, was unable to use his weight as he does in the seven-men game and as the game progressed, showed signs of wear and tear. He scored one goal, however, and covered lots of territory. Walker seemed about as good as he is in the seven-men game and worked hard. In the net "Tart" Titus displayed the old time form which made him a member of the Fredericton Capitals several years ago. He put up a stonewall defence and but for his work Crescents would have won by a big margin. Marysville ran well in on the net when shooting, however, and enough of their shots got by to win the game. On the other hand, Fredericton tried too many long shots and failed to support one another when making rushes.

CRESCENTS TEAM

Fred Wade was the big noise of the Crescent team. He scored twice, played a great defence game and was in the lime-light generally. He scored two goals. Irvine Wade tallied three times and had the better of the argument at centre-ice. "Nat" Hovey at left-wing had distress signals flying after the first spurt was over but by interchanging with Mac Morris was in the game a good deal of the time. George Brogan was as good as ever at point and Robinson in goal played good hockey. He took several big chances by running out of the net but got away with the play every time.

HARD TO REFEREE

Dick Malloy who in times past figured on both the Fredericton and U.N.B. hockey teams acted as referee. Sandy Staples not being able to officiate, Dick had his hands full, it being his first attempt. He had players on the side much of the time both teams at times being reduced to four players. The referee during one of the periods stated that the game was too much for one man to handle.

Fredericton got the fans going by scoring twice in rapid succession in the first period but Crescents at the

first break were leading 3 to 2 and were never headed off.
