DEMOCRATS MAY RAISE MONEY BY INCOME TAX

Washington, Jan. 28.—A feature of the tariff revision program of the extra session of Congress may include the raising of \$100,000,000 from an income tax, including the corporation tax, as part of the \$309,000,000 basis of revenue from the tariff. Representative Hull of Tennessee, a Democratic member of the Committee on Ways and Means, who has been active in income tax problems, plans to introduce a bill which would provide such a source of revenue.

The Democratic majority of the committee favor an income tax.

The committee today finished hearings on wool, and it is likely the Democratic plan as embodied in the two previous Democratic wool bills will be undisturbed. This is true of all the so-called "fighting" schedules on which the Democrats went on record at this Congress—wool, cotton, metal, chemical and sugar and the farmers free list—so far as the Democratic leaders now foresee.

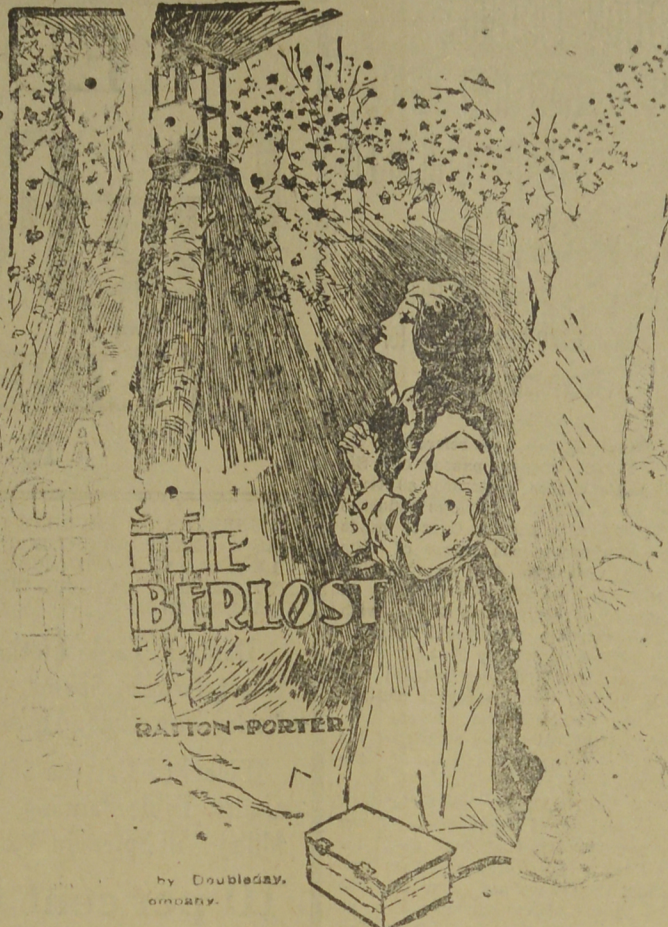
The last of the fourteen schedules "sundries" will be taken up tomorrow.

Mohair, used in the manufacture of clothing, for felt, plushes and other purposes, bids fair to be reduced from 40 per cent. to 20 per cent. as a valorem. Johnston Robertson of Del Rio, Texas, angora goat producer, pleaded today for a specific rate of 12 cents a pound, equivalent to the present 40 per cent. duty.

Chairman Underwood pointed out that it was the raw material for great industries and although now a luxury it was every day becoming more of a necessity.

The Newark Club has signed Gus Getz, the star third baseman of the New York State League. Getz was drafted by Brooklyn last fall but turned back to the Elmira Club.
