Washington, Jan. 28—A feature of the tariff revision program of the extra session of Congress may include the raising of \$100,000,000 from an income tax, including the corporation tax, as part of the \$309,000,000 basis of revenue from the tariff. Representative Hull of Tennessee, a Democratic member of the Committee on Ways and Means who has tee on Ways and Means, who has been active in income tax problems, plans to introduce a bil which would provide such a source of revenue.


