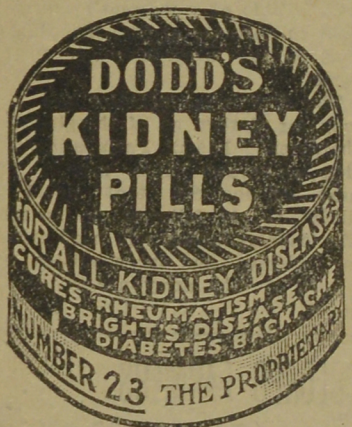

Two sisters Mrs. Mary Robinson and Mrs. Jane Robinson of this place also survive her. She was a woman of strong character and kindly disposition and was very much respected and beloved. She retained her mental faculties till the last.

James Thompson an old and much respected resident of this place died at his home yesterday after a short illness from pneumonia. He was in 71st year. And is survived by five daughters, two sister and one brother, Council Robert Thompson of this place. Deceased was a son of John Thompson one of the first settlers of Harvey and was a man of sterling character and had a wide circle of friends who will regret to learn of his death.

## STRAY TOPICS FROM LITTLE OLD NEW YORK

New York, Jan. 13.—The New Yorkers, or at least a great many of them, evidently are not satisfied with the safe and sane celebrations which the municipality provides on special occasions like the Fourth of July, Christmas and New Year's Day. They do not object to the entertainment provided, but they want in addition to it as much of the old unsafe and insane ways of celebrating as they can possibly get. The New Year's Eve celebrations in New York, especially during recent years, were a disgrace to the city. It seemed as if all the pent-up rowdiness of the multitude, all the hysterical craving for noise and excitement sought an outlet and gratification on that night and all night pandemonium reigned supreme along Broadway and practically all the streets of the Bowery and the Tenderloin districts. It was with the hope of putting an end to the senseless noise and the display of rowdiness on New Year's Eve that the city authorities, supported by the better elements among the citizens, tried the experiment of arranging public celebrations with music and other features of entertainment. But the rowdiness would not be downed so easily and there was enough of it throughout the city to satisfy the toughest hoodlum.

To make things a little livelier the striking waiters made an attack with bricks and paving blocks upon the Hotel Astor, which was filled with merry-making crowds. The police reserves had to be called out to subdue and disperse the strikers. Some of them were captured and order was finally restored. It is safe to say that the striking waiters did not win much sympathy from the decent element among the citizens by their violence.

The suicide the other day under rather peculiar circumstances of Barrington Hutton, a young man of twenty-one years, and the son of a wealthy retired business man, attracted considerable attention. Last winter the young man was working contentedly with the railroad company at Panama, but in the spring his father, who missed the companionship of his favorite son, called him home. Since then young Hutton had nothing to do and being of an active disposition, the feeling of being dependent upon his father had a highly depressing influence upon him. In his morose condition the young man began to worry over religious matters and to attend church and Sunday School exercises. He attended a meeting of the Y.M.C.A. at Tarrytown and heard a sermon by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., the sanctimonious son of the Oil King. Hutton's mind being in an abnormal condition, made him receptive of all the cheap claptrap of the sermon. So deeply did the young man become impressed with Mr. Rockefeller's words that he went home and hanged himself. The fact that he took the sermon seriously is considered proof of the abnormal condition of the young man's mind.

The much talked-of Film Bill, which proposed the creation of a Board of Censors for moving picture films to be exhibited in this city, has been vetoed by Mayor Gaynor. He took the stand that such a law was unnecessary and would mean an infringement upon the rights of free utterance and would interfere with the unhampered pursuit of a legitimate business. Mayor Gaynor requested the movers of the bill to give him a single instance where immoral or improper films had been displayed in the city but they were

unable to do so. In view of this fact the Mayor maintained that it was unnecessary to create such a law and to anticipate trouble that did not exist.

The other night the maid of Mrs. George B. McIntyre, wife of a wealthy builder living on West Ninety-third street, telephoned to police headquarters that her mistress had caught a burglar in the house and asked to send some officers to the house to take charge of the prisoner. Two detectives were sent to the house in great hurry and arrived there breathlessly, only to find that the only one in the house who needed prompt relief was the burglar. When the detectives arrived the maid who received them directed them to the bath-room. There they found the burglar, bent back over the edge of the bath-tub, while Mrs. McIntyre, perfectly calm and smiling, held the intruder in his uncomfortable position, her strong hand clutching his throat and nearly strangling him. The burglar was evidently glad when the detectives arrived and released him from the grasp of Mrs. McIntyre's hand.

There has been a great deal of noise throughout the country about the high price of eggs, due to the fact that the egg trust, but nowhere did the prices reach the record established last week by a poultry man exhibiting at the Madison Square Garden poultry show. He sold eggs at the price of \$5 a piece to \$50 a dozen and there seemed to be considerable demand for these eggs. These eggs come from a new breed of chickens which a noted fancier at Lakewood is raising and are, at least for the present, not intended for food purposes.

Burglars entered the office of a manufacturing concern in Manhattan the other night, removed a safe weighing 800 pounds from the building, carried the heavy load to Long Island City, blew it open in an open field and after taking all the cash they could find, left the shattered safe on a dump. The police did not know anything about the burglary until the broken safe was found by some boys who notified the police department. Now the authorities are looking for finger-prints.

The police were more fortunate, however, in another case, when they arrested five men and two young women, who, it is charged, have been blowing open and robbing safes in the Bronx for many months. Scores of safes in the Bronx were robbed during the past month or two, but the police authorities were unable to find any trace of the burglars. The timely arrest of one of the members of the gang upon another charge led to the discovery of the rest of the gang and eventually their arrest.

The other day a little boy was run over and killed by an automobile and five women claimed the body as that of their own offspring. It took several hours of search and investigation to convince four of the mothers that the dead boy was not theirs. Finally there was only one claimant left and as the child was proved to be hers, the body was turned over to her.

The City of Fredericton will present at the approaching Session of the Legislative Assembly of New Brunswick the following bills for enactment:

(1) A Bill authorizing the City to grant certain concessions to the Palmer-McLellan Company, Limited, and to fix the valuation of the property of Frasers Limited in this City for taxation purposes.

(2) A Bill to authorize the issue of Debentures for the erection of a Fire Station, a Police Station, for the purchase of Queen's Park and for the further construction of Permanent Street Pavements, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000).

(3) A Bill to provide for lighting by electricity the Fredericton and St. Mary's Highway Bridge.
