SPIKE KELLY WON FROM RAY BRONSON IN EIGHT ROUNDS

Hard Bout at Memphis, Tenn.—Bronson Made Good Showing Through Losing Decision

Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 13—"Spike" Kelly of Chicago, was awarded the decision over Ray Bronson of Indianapolis, tonight in an eight-round bout before the Phoenix A.C. It was the revival of the boxing game here after several months of idleness and a large crowd flocked to the arena and saw one of the fiercest contests in years.

Although Kelly's nose was badly damaged and he was otherwise disfigured, Referee Haack ruled that he had landed the cleaner blows and had carried the fight to Bronson in a majority of the rounds. Bronson's left jabs and right swings landed almost at will, and caused many to believe that Kelly would not last through the fifth round. This was Bronson's best round.

Kelly recuperated in the sixth, however, and when Bronson tried to start the seventh with a final rally, Kelly stopped him with uppercuts and left jabs and had Bronson in retreat from then on.

Bresnahan's contract gives the Cub team a unique catching staff, for three of them—the former St. Louis manager, Jimmy Archer and Toom Needham—were born in Ireland. These three backstops also make up the strongest staff in the National League. They are regarded as the head-est in the organization.

LEACH CROSS OUTPOINTED BY MEXICAN BOXER

Joe Rivers Won in Ten-round Bout at New York Last Night—Fast go

New York, Jan. 14—Joe Rivers, the Mexican lightweight, outpointed Leach Cross, of this city, in a ten-round bout here tonight. Cross had the better of the first two rounds. While the New Yorker was showering rights and lefts to the head in the first round, the Mexican slipped to one knee at the ropes, but was up in an instant, adopted blocking tactics, and proved Cross' superior at in-fighting.

In the second round Cross scored the only real knockdown of the bout, with a left hook under the jaw. Thence on Rivers fought cleverly and was so rapid in movement that Cross frequently could not find him, losing his range and missing and becoming decidedly wild at some stages. Rivers' showing during the last eight rounds earned him a victory by a comfortable margin.

Rivers tore in with lefts to the neck and a right uppercut in the third, Cross coming back with a hard right to the head. The Mexican missed a swing a minute later and fell to the floor, but was up again immediately. A left jab brought blood from the Mexican's nose, angering him so that he plunged with rights forcing Cross into a neutral corner. to the body and lefts to the face.

Rivers became steadier as the fighting progressed, while Cross grew wild and became worried under Rivers' constant landing of left and right uppercuts, backing away at times. In the eighth, the Mexican fell again, tripping over Cross' foot in breaking from a clinch. Rivers then landed four rights and lefts to the face and head without a return, and when the New Yorker again lost his range Rivers came up under the East Siders' swings and jolted heavily to the body.

In the last two rounds Rivers did practically all the fighting. In the tenth he rocked the local man's head with a hook to the jaw, which almost knocked him down. Cross staggered to the ropes. The final bell found the men in a fast mix-up, of which Rivers had the better.

JOE HALL FINED FIFTY DOLLARS FOR ROWDYISM

Montreal, Jan. 14—President Emmet Quinn of the N.H.L. this morning handed down his decision on the dispute in the game between the Canadiens and Quebec, at Quebec Saturday, when Joe Hall was alleged to have struck Referee Melville. Mr. Quinn finds that though Hall did not actually strike the official he swung at him with his stick. Hall will therefore be fined \$50 and suspended for two weeks. In addition the Quebec Hockey Club, says Mr. Quinn, has fined Hall \$100.

RED SOX AND PIRATES TO SEND ADVANCE PARTIES

Hot Springs, Ark., Jan. 13—Both Jake Stahl, manager of the World's Champion Red Sox, and Fred Clarke, commander of the Pittsburgh Pirates, have been heard from here concerning their training plans.

Stahl contemplates arriving here about Feb. 20, accompanied by four or five of his veterans, but the rest of the Red Sox will not be on deck until Sunday, March 9. Practice will start the following day on the Boston club's training grounds at Majestic Park.

Though the Pirates have been coming here for 12 years, they never have arrived before March 18; but this year it will be different. Clarke today sent word to "Doc" Owens, manager of the Whittington Park that the advance guard of Buccaneers will reach here March 2. This party will consist of the catchers and pitchers. 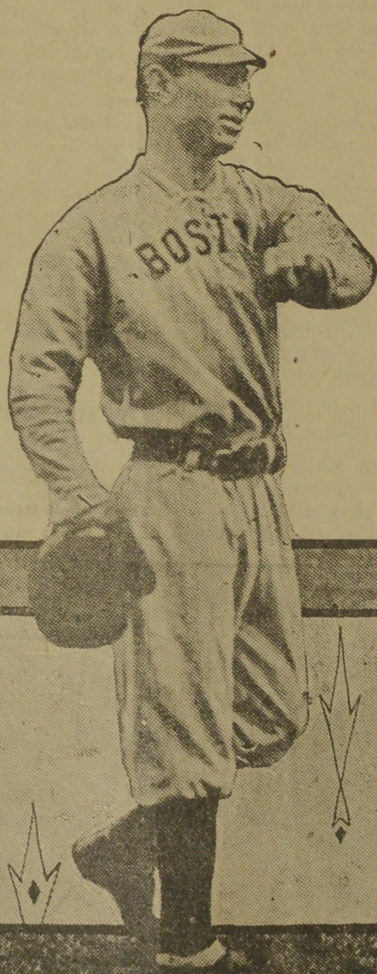
