MAY TAKE A HAND PANAMA CANAL PROTEST

Washington, Jan 2.—In the midst
of the deliberate consideration which
state department officials are giving
the note of Sir Edward Grey of No-
vember 14, protesting against the ex-
emption of the American coastwise
shipping in the Panama canal, atten-
tion has been attracted to a report
emanating from Ottawa that the
Canadian government is preparing
new matter to add to that protest.

Without officials knowledge on the
subject, the conclusion has been reached
that this Canadian presentment
will be devoted to an elaboration of
statements made in the Grey note re-
garding the effect of the Panama
canal act upon Canadian railways
owning and operating vessels, as
well as to the parallel thought to
be drawn between the Welland canal
and the Panama canal.

Touching the first matter, it is re-
called that the British government
reserved the right to discuss further
the application of the act to British
ships. The recent action of the de-
partment of justice is proceeding
against the Grand Trunk Railway of-
ficials under the terms of the Sher-
man anti-trust act is believed to
have decided the Canadian govern-
ment to insist upon the present dis-
cussion diplomatically of this reserved
subject.

So far as the Welland canal argu-
ment is concerned the American
contention is simple and direct. In
substance it amounts to a weeping
denial that there is anything like a
parallel between the Panama Canal
an independent waterway, forming in
what some quarters has been regard-
ed as part of the coast line, and the
Canadian waterway which is a mere
incident in the boundary waters of
the two countries use of which is
specifically guaranteed to both na-
tions on even terms.

got 150 days in jail and Welton 120
days.

THE CANADA EASTERN—At a
meeting held on Thursday by the C.
E. Railway Company, some very im-
portant changes were made in the
board of directors. Three of the old
directors retired and their places
were filled by the election of C. W.
Weldon, Q.C., E. B. Winslow and
Marshal Ritchie, Esquires.

THE MAYORALTY—Election for
mayor takes place January 11. So
far but two candidates are mention-
ed, Ald. Beckwith and John Richards.

NEW PASTOR—Members of the
session and trustee of St. Paul's
met Rev. Willard McDonald at the
station on Wednesday. The reverend
gentleman will reside temporarily at
the residence of Mrs. Capt. J. Barker,
Brunswick street.

INDUCTION—The induction of Rev.

St. Paul's Church on Wednesday

said: "It was not ever thus."

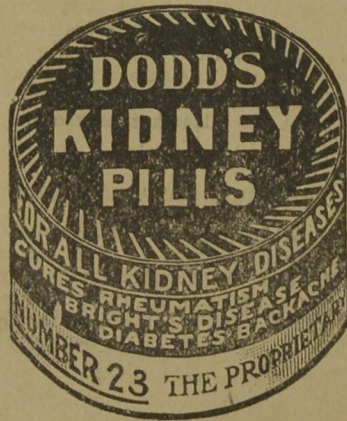
NEW YEAR'S DINNER—About 130

EMPLOYEES BENEFIT FROM PROFIT SHARING PLAN

Chicago, Jan. 2.—During the year
of 1912 a total of several hundred
thousand dollars had been distrib-
uted to employees of Sears, Roebuck
and Company, under the provisions
of the profit-sharing plan put into ef-
fect by the company one year ago.
Every person who has been in the
concerns employ for five years had
shared in the distribution to the ex-
tent of 5 per cent of his yearly pay.
A check for the amount of the bonus
is presented to each employee on the
fifth anniversary of his employment
and on each succeeding anniversary.
About 7000 employees of the company
have benefited by the plan during the
first year of its operation and it is
estimated that within another two
or three years the distributions will
amount to half a million dollars
yearly.



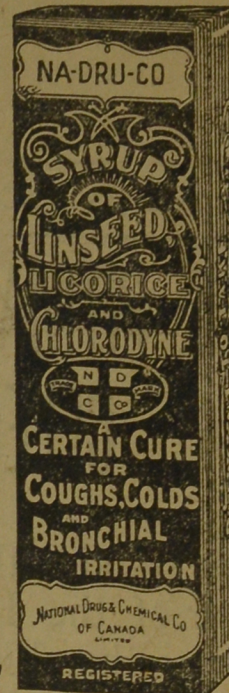

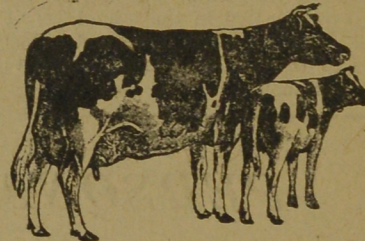
