THE PITMAN CENTENARY CELEBRATED BY BRITONS

letters of the alphabet. On November 15, 1837, the first edition of the Pitman system was issued from the press under the title "Stenographic Sound Hand." This was a little twelve-page pamphlet in ordinary type with two additional pages of lithographed plates in shorthand. Copies of this work are now extremely rare, only fifteen known to be extant.

Shortly after the publication of his pamphlet, Mr. Pitman was summarily discharged as head of his school on account of differences with the school committee of the town in regard to religious views. Mr. Pitman went to Bath and there opened a private school at 5 Nelson Place. The second edition of his booklet was published on January 10, 1840, under the title "Phonography," and soon thereafter a third edition became necessary. Isaac Pitman worked strenuously to make his system, which he continued steadily to improve and simplify, known throughout the country. He traveled extensively during vacation time, lecturing upon the advantages of phonography, and created so much interest in the subject that the monthly magazine first published in January, 1842, became a success. The first phonographic society was founded in 1843. In the following year his system was introduced in America and since then it has spread throughout the English-speaking countries of the world. It is used not only commercially, but also for reporting the proceedings of every court and every legislative body, in which the English language is spoken.

In 1894 Queen Victoria conferred the honor of knighthood upon Mr. Pitman, in recognition of the great value of his invention. On Friday, Jan. 22, 1897, Sir Isaac died and, in accordance with his wishes, his remains were cremated. His portrait painted by A. S. Cope, A.R.A., was hung in the National Gallery.

COUNTRY MARKET

There was a fairly large country market today, the majority of the farmers in attendance coming to the city in wagons on account of the absence of snow. Prices showed very little change. Two small lots of potatoes were offered at \$1.50 per bbl. Shippers, however, now are paying \$1.10 per bbl. Prices rules as follows: Eggs, 35 cents per dozen; butter, 30 to 32 cents per lb; chickens, 18 cents per lb; lamb, 10 to 12 cents per lb; tongue, 20 cents per lb; beef, 7 and 8 cents per lb; pork, 10 and 12 cents per lb.

PEACE PLENTIPOTENTIARIES MAKING SLOW PROGRESS

ALLIES' ULTIMATUM.

Each leader of the allies after the Turkish terms had been presented, declared that they were unacceptable and insisted on Turkey accepting those proposed by the allies. It was then that M. Miyuskovitch issued orally what seemed practically to be the ultimatum of the allies.

"The allied delegates," said M. Miyuskovitch, "see with regret that the Ottoman delegates take no account of the results of the war and the allies consequently would be justified in breaking off the negotiations. In order, however, to afford fresh proof of their conciliatory spirit, they request the Ottoman delegates to make them at a sitting at four o'clock Monday afternoon, Jan. 6, a proposition on these terms."

Here M. Miyuskovitch submitted a counter proposition to that of the Turks. The summary of it follows:

First. Turkey shall cede unconditionally all her islands in the Aegean archipelago, including those provisionally held by Italy.

Second. The allies proposed such rectifications of the frontier as will include Adrianople in Bulgarian territory.

M. Miyuskovitch added that the allies, already having been most generous in repeatedly giving Turkey time to reconsider the situation, would wait no longer than Monday for Turkey's answer embodying substantially such terms as would be possible as a basis for further negotiations.
