

On November 15, 1837, the first edition of the Pitman system was issued from the press under the title "Stenographic Sound Hand." welve-page pamphlet in ordinary ype with two additional pages of ithographed plates in shorthand. lopies of this work are now extremey rare; only fifteen known to be xtant.

Shortly after the publication of The second edition of his booklet was bublished on January 10, 1840, under the title "Phonography," and soon hereafter a third edition became Isaac Pitman worked ecessary. trenuously to make his system, which he continued steadily to imrove and simplify, known throughut the country. He traveled extensively during vacation time, lecturng upon the advantages of phonography, and created so much interest n the subject that the monthly mingzine first published in January, 1842, ecame a success. The first phonoraphic society was founded in 1843. n the following year his system was ntroduced in America and since hen it has spread throughout the Inglish-speaking countries of the world. It is used not only commercially, but also for reporting the proceedings of every court and every legislative body, in which the English language is spoken. In 1894 Queen Victoria conferred




