THIEVES GOT OFF WITH MANY GEMS

New York, July 29—Gems valued at \$75,000, including a rope of pearls worth \$60,000, were stolen from the home of Mr. C. C. Rumsey, at Naragansett Pier during the 24 hours ending Sunday night. Mrs. Rumsey was a daughter of the late E. H. Harriman.

The theft had not been reported to the police this afternoon, and Mr. Legetoff, secretary to the late E. H. Harriman, who made the announcement said that private detectives were working on the case, and probably would handle it independently of the police.

The rope of pearls was given to Mrs. Rumsey by her mother, and had a sentimental value far in excess of its intrinsic worth. Other jewels stolen, according to a statement issued at the office of the Harriman estate in this city, include the following: Ruby and pearl pendant, gold pin set with magnificent ruby solitaire, diamond brooch, and gold moustache bag.

Mrs. Rumsey's home was entered some time between eight o'clock on Saturday night and the same hour on Sunday. Only the contents of one room, that was usually occupied by Mrs. Rumsey, were disturbed, according to the announcement. How the thief entered the house, whether Mrs. Rumsey was at home at the time, and other details of the robbery were lacking at the office of the Harriman estate, which had been acquainted with only meagre facts concerning the robbery.

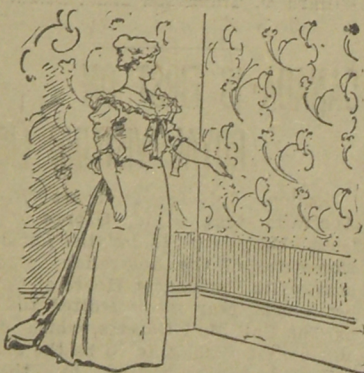
