**STOCK BONUS NOW  
FOR SPANISH RIVER**

Toronto, July 29—Holders of Spanish River Pulp & Paper Mills will receive a notice today of a common stock dividend, which will roughly amount to ten per cent. of the holdings of preferred stock and twenty per cent. of the holdings of common stock.

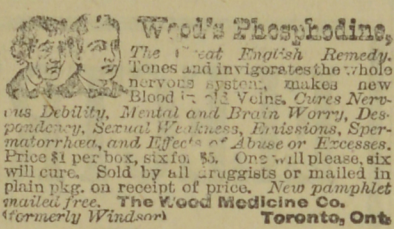
It will be announced that the Dominion Bond Company made an arrangement with the syndicate from which the Spanish River Company purchased the shares of the Lake Superior Paper Company, Limited, for the distribution of this common stock of the Spanish River Company among the Spanish River shareholders. This represents what Spanish River holders get out of the bargain.

The distribution of common stock will be to holders of record yesterday and it is expected that the new certificates will be forwarded about September 1.

The present plan was arranged by President Garnett C. Grant of the Dominion Bond Company while he was abroad. He is now on the ocean and will return to Toronto at the close of the week.

The capital of the Spanish River is increased to \$20,000,000 by the creation of 70,000 additional preference shares and 60,000 additional common shares.

Public parks and gardens prevail throughout the city and the "Keep off the Grass" sign is never seen, likewise public tennis courts are provided for the young, for certain hours of the day. A splendid public library in fact, several, are at the disposal of the citizens, as well as public baths; in fact, almost all utilities are the property of the people. Its annual expenditure in the interest of the citizens of this place averages about \$300,000, the physician in charge of the department being almost an autocrat and is given carte blanche, being of course responsible to authority. By his efforts in the regulation of the milk industry, the mortality in infantile diseases under one year of age has been reduced fifty per cent. The house fly has been partially exterminated also, owing to enforcement of laws regarding stores and garbage.

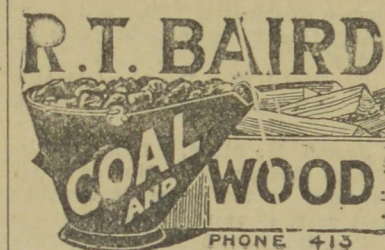

**QUEEN'S COUNTY BOY WHO  
HAS MADE GOOD IN WEST**

**Judge Dykemen of Seattle Now Visiting  
Relatives in New Brunswick---Talks  
Entertainingly of Conditions on the  
Pacific Coast--Seattle a Model City.**

Fredericton has just been honored by a visit of another of New Brunswick's successful sons in the person of Judge King Dykeman of the Superior Court of Seattle, Washington, U.S.A., who left his native village of Jemseg, Q.C., some twenty-one years ago, and after a determined and strenuous career, which included many experiences in very hard manual labor, culminated in an appointment to the distinguished position of Superior Judge, he being the only graduate from the University of the State of Washington—one of the largest institutions in the west—to have been so honored after a comparatively short term of practise at the bar. He is not yet forty years old and his friends bespeak a long and useful future for himself and his two children whom he has left at home, owing to their tender ages, and for which reason Mrs. Dykeman, a western lady was unable to accompany him.

The Judge is actively identified with educational and civic life and loses no opportunity to visit points of interest along these lines. He is enthusiastic with the beauties of the noble St. John River and out city in particular, which he has viewed from many places, not the least, the dome of the University building, and here it may be of interest to remark for the benefit of most of our citizens, that a more delightful prospect than such a view affords is quite beyond imagination. It is simply superb and would make a panoramic view far beyond anything yet shown in the

illustrated literature printed regarding Fredericton.

**AN IDEAL CITY.**

Judge Dykeman occupies a prominent place in public life in his adopted city and from his description of his home, Seattle is surely an ideal place, its water supply being adequate to supply a city the size of London, and having its source in the mountains. The entire watershed which includes many square miles, has been appropriated by the government and rendered free from even the suspicion of contamination. The city also owns its own lighting system, utilizing the same water for generation of its electricity. The streets are uniformly paved and the sidewalks laid in blocks, two feet square, the margin between them and the curb being in most instances beds of roses, roses flourishing there abundantly. Of course other flowers abound too. The sanitary perfection of Seattle is of a very high type and disease is cut down to a very low point. Here the purity of the water doubtless plays a large part for this water is so pure as to be suitable for the most delicate chemical tests, where distilled water is otherwise absolutely necessary. Typhoid fever is practically unknown in Seattle, this, of course, also being true of all other water-born diseases. Medical school inspection is rigidly enforced and all physical defects corrected. This, of course, is the case of all cities where
