RECORDS SHATTERED ON GRAND CIRCUIT YESTERDAY

Racing at Grand Rapids Continued
Until Dark--Average Time for Fifteen Heats 2.06 9-15.

Grand Rapids, July 30--The largest audience ever assembled at a race course in this city today, in a program of Grand Circuit racing lasted until dark and going over unfinished, saw a world's record for average speed on any track, shattered in a series of performances, marked by the reduction of a variety of records.

Of the fifteen heats, paced or trotted, the slowest was the one just at dusk 2.09½, by Strathstorn. The speediest was Stetbrino Lad's 2.04½, in the third heat of the 2.07 pace. The average time for fifteen heats was 2.06 9-15. Every race was featured by split heats, and torrid finishes.
