### BICYCLIST FINED.

A bicyclist was charged this morning in the police court with riding upon the sidewalk. He pleaded guilty and was fined two dollars.

### FINED FOR FORESTALLING.

A West End grocer was before the police court this morning charged with forestalling in the country market. The offense was committed on Saturday last. A fine of two dollars was imposed.

### LIVE-STOCK ENTRIES RECEIVED

### JUDGMENT TUESDAY.

Judgment will be given Tuesday in the Canada Temperance Act case in which the proprietor of a West End hotel is charged with a second offence. The defendant was on the stand this morning and admitted that he had kept liquor on his premises for sale but denied that he had it for sale on the day Special Policeman Roberts visited the hotel.

### TAGGED THE HOUSES

This morning at an early hour practically all dwelling houses in the city had their doors decorated with tags bearing the following inscription—"Please do your shopping at the stores that give their clerks the Thursday half holiday." During the day a boy paraded the streets carrying a sign calling upon the public to patronize the stores which closed Thursday afternoon. Tags were also placed upon horses, vehicles, etc.

## GAME LAW VIOLATIONS REPORTED FROM DUMFRIES PARISH

Railroad Navvies are Permitted to Prowl About Woods with Fire-arms---Dynamite Used to Destroy Fish

The game wardens, who according to Premier Flemming, "sleep against a stump" and endure many hardships do not seem to be doing much this season to earn the money which they receive, if all reports are to be credited. In the Parish of Dumfries railway navvies, armed with guns and rifles, prowl about the woods on the Sabbath day, shooting everything in sight and not the slightest effort is being made by the authorities to stop them. Deer are very plentiful in that region and during the summer months frequent lakes and water courses where they can be easily killed. People living in that vicinity declare that a number have already been shot and the carcasses used as food at construction camps.

Not satisfied with slaughtering game out of season some of these navvies also resort to illegal fishing. Dynamite has been used in the lakes and streams and many fish have been destroyed.

A party of young people from the United States are camping for the summer at Davidson Lake and so much shooting is going on in the neighborhood that they are in constant fear of their lives.

If game wardens are good for anything except to draw pay from the government they ought to be able to enforce the law against carrying fire-arms in the woods in close seasons.

## COMMITTEE UNANIMOUS FOR CENTRAL STATION

Another Meeting of Fire Committee Held this Morning---Resolution to Use Central Station Site was Passed

The Fire Committee met this morning and reconsidered the matter of a new central fire station. Those present were Ald. Hoben, chairman, Mayor Hooper, Ald. Scott, Ald. Osborne and Ald. Rogers. Owing to the illness of his little daughter Ald. Farrell was unable to attend the meeting.

The decision of the committee was unanimous and a resolution was passed to the effect that it be recommended to the City Council that the Fire Committee be authorized to meet upon the site of the present central hose station, a new station of sufficient size to accommodate the existing equipment and a motor driven combined chemical engine and hose-wagon to be added to the equipment.

The Fire Committee met some days ago to consider the same matter and passed a resolution similar to that passed this morning. The Mayor raised an objection to the resolution being reported to the council on the ground that the members of the committee had not been notified properly of the meeting. This morning's meeting disposes of that objection however.
