ation to the project during a period covering about three years and I regret to say that we consider the entrance via the West Side to be impracticable for this Company because of the crowding and inconvenience in reaching the terminals, the increased cost of operation that would result on the main line, also the unavoidable delays to the operation of all trains and the danger of accidents that would inevitably be the result of the existence of the draw span that it would be necessary to provide at the Navy Island bridge. You will readily see that the traffic over this bridge, as well as the water traffic are bound to increase in proportion to the growth of the city and business of the port. Therefore the more business there will be to do, and the more trains there will be to cross, the more interference and delays must result through the demands due to similar increases in the traffic crossing by water.

I am very much afraid that if the route of the Valley Railway is changed the above objections may not only delay our entrance to St. John, but will compel our company to send business to other Canadian ports that it might otherwise be economical to route via St. John. This

HAD LIVELY SESSION

The fact that so large a gathering had come together showed that there was a strong prohibitory sentiment in the province. Organization was necessary and should be extended.

Mr. C. Fraser MacTavish, secretary said he was unalterably opposed to any change in the expressed intention of the Moncton convention which had been endorsed by the executive. He would not like to have it published abroad that because forty or so citizens of Fredericton were opposed to going before the government and asking for a prohibitory law that the branch had stultified itself.

Mr. W. L. McFarlane stated that the resolution asked the government to commit itself to prohibition. Why should a delegation go before the government and be turned down.

Mr. W. D. Baskin, St. John—"It already has been decided to go before the government. The question is to appoint a delegation."

Mr. McFarlane—"Well if the delegation is not appointed it won't go before the government" (Laughter).

Continuing Mr. McFarlane pointed out that the liquor interests were strong in many constituencies and had the knack of controlling the electorate. Members of parliament recognized that it would not promise to act in the interests of temperance. What was needed by the temperance party was organization. The Liberal and the Conservative temperance men should look after their own respective party conventions and see that temperance candidates were put up. The present convention was divided and the speaker thought it would be foolish to go before the government. (Applause)

Mr. P. W. Cass of Fredericton said he had been present at Moncton and he did not at that time think that a resolution such as that which had just been read had been passed. He thought it was the suggestion of the secretary. He felt that there never would be any better temperance man at the head of local affairs than at present. Premier Fleming was a long-lived temperance man. Personally he felt that New Brunswick was not ready for prohibition for the Scott Act could not be enforced.

Rev. H. R. Boyer of Fairville stated that it was evident that the convention was hopelessly divided. He suggested that it would be better to start a campaign of education and organization rather than interview the government.

Rev. H. E. Thomas of St. John, believed that on principle the delegation should go before the government although he believed the request for prohibition would fail. When the temperance vote could be made respected it would be possible to get prohibition. In St. John the last provincial election the prohibition candidate had lost his deposit. He could not agree with Bishop Richardson in the matter of education. The law was the great educator.

Rev. Thos. Stebbings of Albert County thought it would be a retrograde step not to appear before the government.

Rev. Neil McLaughlin of Fredericton moved that the resolution be upon the table until two o'clock.

Mr. A. C. M. Lawson seconded the motion which was carried.

On the motion of Rev. J. H. MacDonald, seconded by Mr. L. H. Bliss it was decided to have the executive and six others meet before two o'clock and attempt to draw up a resolution which would be agreeable to all.

Bishop Richardson, Mr. L. H. Bliss, Rev. Dr. J. H. MacDonald, Rev. Mr. Sherman of Hartland, Rev. Mr. Macpherson of Harvey, Mr. W. L. McFarlane were the six elected.

The convention then adjourned till 2 p. m.

TO INTERVIEW GOVERNMENT

would of course, result in loss to the City that in my opinion, would far offset any temporary benefit derived by having the Island bridge built a year or two earlier or any permanent benefit advanced in the arguments of those who favor the Westfield route.

The question of accessible entrance to cities and the economical operation of terminals is one of great importance which not only affects the railway companies, but is of direct and of vital importance to the growth of the cities themselves. I am sure that this is the broadminded point of view under which this subject will be discussed at the coming meeting.

I may also add that, in my opinion the total cost of the line will be greater via the West side than via the East.

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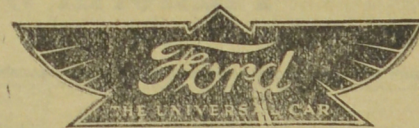
