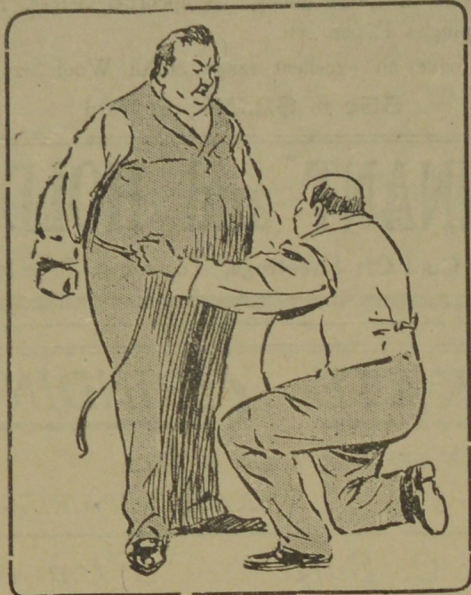

BAN ON HOPPLES HAS BEEN LIFTED BY A. T. ASSOCIATION

Minimum Weight Rule Also Sent to
the Discard--Will Lessen Delays
--Great Western Circuit

The American Trotting Association Congress last week, as expected, lifted the ban on hopples, and decided upon the innovation of providing a fund for disabled drivers, said fund to come from fines imposed on owners and trainers for infractions of the A. T. A. rules.

The congress also threw into the discard the weight rule which for years has called for a weight of at least 150 pounds in the sulky for all regular harness races. The advent of the low-wheeled, rubber-tire sulky some 20 years ago has made the imposition of a minimum weight unnecessary, but both governing bodies have clung to the old custom. Doing away with the weighing in after heats will save a lot of bother for a few drivers, but best of all it will do away with many delays in the announcement of the winners, something that the folks who pay at the gate will appreciate.

GREAT WESTERN
