GONE TO BOSTON—W. Burden and Charles A. Burchill left for Boston on Thursday, where they intend to reside in future. The exodus is on us.

AT IT EARLY—James Campbell, one of the progressive farmers of Kingsclear, had a man at work plowing on Monday last. He reported the field in fine shape for that work.

GOING TO EUROPE—Hon. A. F. Randolph left on Friday and Hon.

A. G. Blair and Mrs. Blair are to leave on Monday on a trans-Atlantic trip. They sail from New York on the 27th.

REMOVED—The Farmer now will be issued from the new brick building, Carleton street, south side, near Queen. Those having business with that enterprising journal will notice the change. (The Farmer was a weekly newspaper published here for many years in the Conservative interest. Mr. L. C. 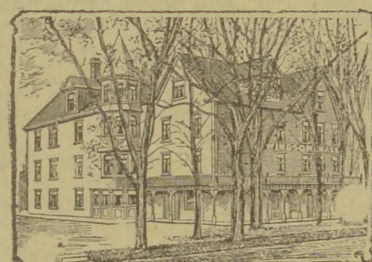

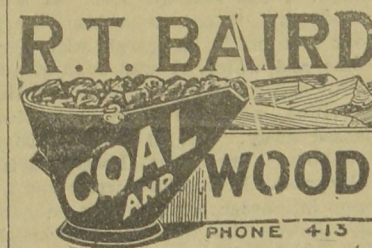

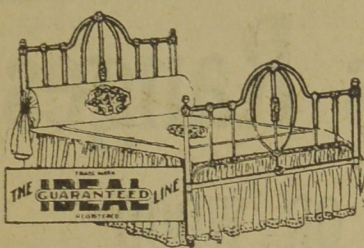
