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## A SANE POLICY

The London Nation, a high-class English weekly newspaper, in a recent issue, deals with the uneasiness which has arisen from the new objective imparted to colonial naval policy by the arrangement concluded by Mr. Borden and Mr. Churchill. It says:

"Since the Borden scheme was commended to the Canadian ministry, and indeed pressed upon them, and a direct form of naval tribute accepted, or extorted, from the Rajahs and Chinese and Malay laborers of the Malay States, a change has come upon the problem of imperial defence. If the self-governing dominions had been left to themselves they would have quietly developed their plan of subordinate navies, manned and eventually built at home but freely offered as aids to the imperial fleet. Is the Borden scheme, and Mr. Churchill's ingenious embodiment of it in The Imperial Patrol, likely to deflect this design?"

"Not, we think, in the end. The colonies, it is clear, will not accept the Gibraltar basis and the political arrangement which guarantees this mixed service of ships on loan and recall will not long be acceptable either to us or to them. IT IS NOT A DEMOCRATIC—HARDLY A CONSTITUTIONAL—DEVICE TO TAX OUR PEOPLE FOR THE MANNING AND MAINTAINING OF SHIPS NOT ORDERED BY PARLIAMENT AND NOT PROVIDED IN THE ESTIMATES. IT IS UNDEMOCRATIC AND ALMOST DIRECTLY UNCONSTITUTIONAL, TO GIVE CANADA, IN EXCHANGE FOR HER LOANED SHIPS, REPRESENTATION NOT IN THE IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT BUT ON A SECRET AND NOMINATED COUNCIL OF DEFENCE. Both people lose by this transfer of power. At the utmost the dominions can only gain a sixth part of the total representation on the council, and, as their interests diverge, even this measure of power is of little value against THE PROPER AND NECESSARY PREDOMINANCE OF THE MOTHER COUNTRY."

"The Canadian parliament parts with control over ships she has built and our parliament with control over ships she has manned and maintained. Each country interferes with the other in a manner repugnant as modern and British ideas of democracy and representation. Canada is wounded in her pride of progress and invention and her ambition of nationality—the criticism of the Canadian Liberals is already salted with bitter allusions to the 'Boston tea party,' while our admirals are given charge of ships which only half belong to them."

"Therefore we predict that Canada will revert, with Australia, to the Liberal policy of national navies. The Imperial Squadron will gradually be absorbed into its original elements; the Atlantic and the Pacific will claim their own again, and the 'patrol' of the empire will be divided between the imperial power acting for the crown colonies and dependencies and the dominions acting for themselves. This, in practice, will mean the restriction of our fighting fleets to the North Sea and the Mediterranean. By that time the democracies of Europe will have entered upon the inevitable struggle with their governments for the rescue of the states from bankruptcy, and the preservation of their present not too exalted standard of living."

The sensible utterances of the great English journal is commended to all right-thinking Canadians. A Canadian navy, built by Canadian mechanics and manned by sturdy Canadian seamen, would seem to be a safe and sane policy for Canadians.

While the eagerness manifested in some quarters to secure new industries for the city is worthy of commendation, the fact should not be overlooked that the industries which we already possess are deserving of the hearty encouragement and support of every citizen. These industries are also deserving of the patronage of all loyal citizens, and it is the duty of Frederictonians when travelling abroad to put in a good word for them at every opportunity. No man need be afraid to say that Fredericton turns out the finest shoes and shoe-packs in the Dominion of Canada, and when it comes to a stylish carriage we can hold our end up with the best of them. We hope the day is not far distant when the Smith Foundry Company will be manufacturing automobiles. Lack of capital

sometimes prevents a manufacturing concern from doing all it would like to do. While we are all anxious for new industries we must not fail to show our appreciation of the old ones.

After lecturing the Liberal press for alleged misrepresentation in connection with the Alberta elections the Tory Newcastle Advocate goes on to say: "The government went to the country with a majority of thirty-four in a house of forty-eight members and with one of its cabinet ministers defeated it finds itself with a majority of about thirteen in a house of fifty-five." The last house consisted of forty-one members and not forty-eight as stated by the Advocate, and as the opposition numbered eight the government's majority was twenty-four exclusive of the speaker. The new house consists of fifty-six members, of which at least forty will be ministerialists, which will give the government a majority fully as large as it had in the last house. 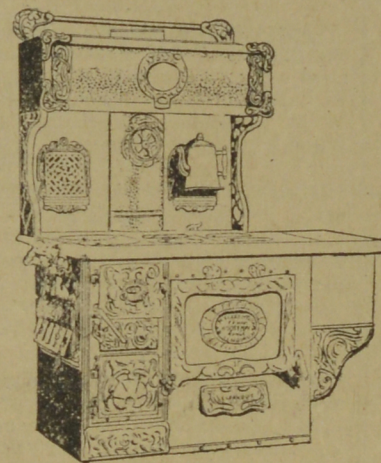
