INCREASES IN SALARY

(Continued from page one)
effect that his salary be \$1000. He pointed out that the City Clerk had free office, free telephone and other things. There was no seconder.
Ald. Farrell agreed with Ald. Rogers. Office rent was a matter of importance. He had noticed that about everything by which he had obtained extras. There had been no talk of increasing the Clerk's salary until after the by-laws had been revised and codified. It had been said that under the new salary the City Clerk would be cut out of the extras which formerly he had received. Ald. Farrell said he could not see that such was the case. He moved that the salary of the City Clerk remain as it had been expressing the opinion that perhaps there would be no seconder as had been the case with Ald. Rogers' amendment.

There was no seconder.
Ald. Clark stated that the proposition was that the proposed salary would do away with all extras except fees as counsel in the city law suits which were tried in court. He thought it would be fair to allow fees for such work. The City Clerk was to have his office at the City Hall.

Ald. Scott was informed that there would be no extras for the City Clerk for legal advice.

PLUMBING INSPECTOR.

With regard to the motion for the appointment of George N. Edney as Inspector of Plumbing Ald. Farrell suggested that the request of the plumbers' delegation, Messrs. Stephen McManniman and William O'Donnell, that a practical plumber be appointed to the office receive some consideration, unless the matter had been discussed beforehand. If such had been the case the delegation might well have been informed of the fact.

Ald. Everett stated that he had made his motion in order to get the matter before the council.

In reply to Ald. Osborne, Ald. Everett stated that he was not aware that Mr. Edney was a practical plumber but that he was a practical man.

His Worship read a petition from Plumbers' Union No. 517 for the appointment of a practical plumber as Plumbing Inspector, also applications from Stephen McManniman and Robert Wandlass to be appointed to the office.

Ald. Mitchell seconded the motion to appoint Mr. Edney. He did so, he said, for the sake of economy. If it were possible to get a competent officer to take up the duties of Plumbing Inspector for the payment of only one hundred dollars extra, that should be done.

Ald. Farrell thought there must be a reason for requiring the appointment of a practical plumber. He spoke highly of Mr. Edney as foreman of the Water and Sewerage Department. In amendment he moved that the matter be referred to a committee of three to confer with the Board of Health. The amendment received no seconder.

STREET LIGHTING INCREASES.

Ald. Rogers explained with regard to increases in salary in the Street Lighting Department that Thomas Harvey was given \$120 more because he had to maintain a horse in his work. Supt. Davidson had been given an increase of the same amount because when accepting the position he had taken it at a salary lower than that which he had been receiving previously for similar work.

Mayor Hooper expressed the opinion that while the salaries in the Light Department had been increased, those of the staff of the Pumping Station also should have been increased.

Ald. Everett, chairman of the Water and Sewerage Committee, explained in reply that there had been no request from members of the Pumping Station staff for increases and the committee did not think that conditions warranted increases.

Ald. Farrell thought there was an unnecessary distinction in the Street Lighting Department. Mr. Minnewater should get more. The fireman at the Pumping Station received \$650. He moved that the fireman receive that amount.

The motion was not seconded.

CITY HALL MATTERS.

His Worship asked that the City Hall Janitor be required to take better care of the furnishings and utensils of the council chamber and mayor's office.

Ald. Mitchell pointed out that the council chamber and the mayor's office had been found by the council when it took office to be in a filthy state. They had not been cleaned for two years. New lights also had been put in.

His Worship stated that the lights had been put in at his own request. Ald. Rogers stated that he would like to see the janitor required to do a little more work about the City Hall. He thought something should be done with regard to the toilets. It was an imposition on the country people who used the market to have the toilets locked against them.

His Worship declared Ald. Rogers was out of order.

Everett noticed that he had so declared, also that there was no call for question. Other members of the council were of the opinion that the motion was carried and still hold that opinion.

CITY ENGINEER

Ald. Farrell stated that he had noticed Ald. Clark nod across the floor and judged from that that something had been overlooked. He would step in the gap and nominate Mr. John O'Neill as City Engineer at the same salary as drawn by him before \$800 per year.

Ald. Farrell alone voted for his nominee the other eight voting against.

Constables, surveyors of wood and lumber, fence-viewers, common drivers were appointed.

On the motion of Ald. Clark it was decided that a cheque for \$2000 in favor of the School Board issue on May 1.

On the motion of Ald. Clark it was decided that residents of York County assessed in the city on income for the year 1912 be relieved to the extent of the amounts assessed and paid on income in the respective parishes in which they live.

The rolls of the various fire companies were read by Ald. Hooper and on his motion were confirmed.


