GIANTS LOST

GAME THROUGH
UMPIRE KLEM

The Official Was Out of Position When McCormick Hit Ball and Merkle Scored Run

New York, April 25—New York and Philadelphia played an eleven inning tie game here today, neither side scoring. Both Damaree and Alexander pitched great ball, McGraw's recruit doing the cleanest work and holding the visitors to three hits.

An unusual incident that deprived New York of a victory occurred in the tenth inning, when the Giants apparently won the game. Merkle opened with a single and Herzog bunted for a sacrifice, but Merkle beat Alexander's throw to head the runner off at second. Wilson then bunted safely and with the bases full with none out, McCormick was sent in to bat for Demaree. He hit the first ball pitched for an apparent single, which scored Merkle.

Players of both teams ran toward the club-house and the crowd swarmed on the field. Manager Doolin, Captain Doolan and other Philadelphia players, however, rushed at Umpire Klem, and called his attention to the fact that he was not in position when the ball was hit. Klem had his face turned to the stand and was announcing that McCormick was batting for Demaree. He agreed with Manager Doolin that he was not in position and called for the game to go on. Many of the players had started to change their clothing and it took more than a quarter of an hour to clear the field. When play was resumed McCormick hit into a double play and Snodgrass was thrown out by Doolan. Klem explained after the game that the reason McCormick's hit did not count was because he was not in position and quoted section 4 of rule 28 to sustain his position.

Carl Morris, the Oklahoma heavy-weight, still has the idea that he will be the champion some day.

SECURED AS BALL
GROUNDS FOR SEASON

Arrangements Completed Last Night With Owners by Management of Fredericton Baseball Club

The expected arrangement of the Fredericton Baseball Club for the use of Scully's Grove as a ball park during the season of 1913 were completed last night and now all nervousness with regard to where the Fredericton team in the New Brunswick and Maine League will play its games is vanished. The Club management feels very much gratified that the arrangement has been made.

Some work will be done at the field getting it into shape for the season. The diamond is in good condition from last year and the bleachers and grandstand also.

The arrangement for the use of the field was made in St. John with the New Brunswick & British Colonization Company, which owns the field and the secretary, Mr. Thomas Nagle, wrote the members of the Fredericton Baseball Club last evening that Scully's Grove would be available at ball grounds during the entire season.

The local club still requires \$500 to put it in a position to go ahead. In view of this fact subscriptions from the public will be solicited and a collector will be around at an early date to get those already made.

TO CANVASS

BANGOR ON BEHALF

Efforts Going on to Organize Team There After Mason Dropped Project—Still Some Doubt

Bangor, Me., April 25—F. J. Leonard the promoter of the Maine New Brunswick Baseball League, who is to manage the St. John team this season, is in town arranging for the organization of a baseball association to handle the local team. The withdrawal of W. F. Mason, the theatrical man, who was to have the Bangor franchise, has left Bangor with no one to take charge of the franchise and Mr. Leonard is creating an interest in the proposition with the view of having local men take hold of it.

The chief purpose of the meeting was the appointment of a committee to canvass the city and resort to the feasibility of having a club in Bangor this season. Mr. Mason's withdrawal left the whole matter in the air, but the local fans feel that they are going to have a team.

As the other three clubs of the league are well underway Mr. Leonard naturally feels anxious to get Bangor in line as soon as possible.

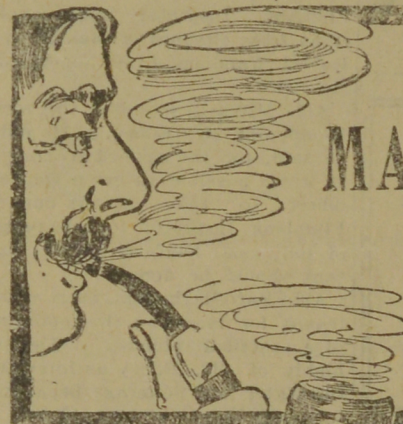
Player Signed 1913 Contract Yesterday After Conference With Pres. Mavin ---Application for Reinstatement

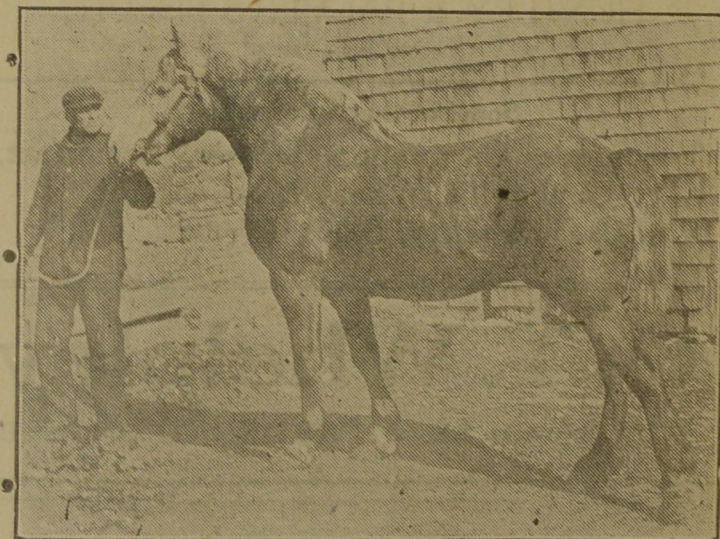
