CY YOUNG MANAGER IN FEDERAL LEAGUE







THE NAVAL BILL

Liberalism is as resolute as ever in its fight both against the policy of contribution and against the substitution, through the gag, of rule by the machine, and for the machine, instead of rule by the people, and for the people. The opposition will resist to the utmost any attempt in the commons to apply the gag in order to force through either the naval bill or supply, without constitutional warrant, without adequate discussion and contrary to what Liberals believe to be the real will of the people.

They believe that the only way to finally solve the two big issues now before the country is to appeal to the people. If this cannot be forced, in the commons then the last resort will be to the senate, whose chief function is to safeguard the interests of the people against arbitrary or hasty legislation in the commons. The fight is by no means over. Next week it will simply enter another and probably an even more dramatic stage.

Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance, will bring down his budget speech the week after next. He will announce no tariff changes of any importance. There will be no renewal of the steel bounties. There will be a few minor changes in the duty, probably along the line of a remission of duty, on raw material for manufacturers. The real tariff revision is postponed until next year, with a view to keeping the government's high tariff allies still in line and ready to help put the government back in power in case an election is forced by the Liberals in the meantime.


Those juniper trees at Mars Hill are looking as if we would have lots of berries this year. We hope they will be plentiful there.


