The Street Lighting Committee has been authorized by the City Council to instal a lamp at the temporary span of the Highway Bridge. The Public Works Department of the province will pay half the cost of maintenance.

Mr. Albert E. Kilburn has disposed of his farm at Macquiac to Mr. Avar Currie. This farm is one of the finest in York County and brought a good figure. It is Mr. Kilburn's intention to remove to the city and he is now looking for a house.

LATE MRS. ANN BURNETT.

The funeral of the late Mrs. Ann Burnett took place this afternoon from the home of Mr. H. M. Hayward, son-in-law of the deceased. The funeral service was conducted by Rev J. E. Wilson. The remains were taken to Lincoln where interment was made.

STREET EXTENSION.

Mr. Samuel Cook is to transfer to the city land sufficient for the extension of Argyle street from Northumberland street to Smythe street. Messrs. H. P. Biard and Nathan Squires are to transfer sufficient land to permit of the extension of Connaught street from York street to Regent street.

OUT ON BAIL

Paul Ranta charged with assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm to employees of the Hibbard Company at Dumfries, was sent up for trial at the county court by Police Magistrate Marsh yesterday afternoon. He was let out on \$480 bail his bondsmen being Ex-Coun. David Carson and Thos. Feeney.

CONVICTIONS OBTAINED

Convictions were made in the police court this morning against a West End hotel man and a resident of that district for violation of the Canada Temperance Act. The witness in both cases was a St. Mary's man who left town some days ago but who was brought back by Chief of Police McCollom night, having been found at place thirteen miles up the St. John River from St. John. Fines of fifty dollars and costs were imposed.

BAND GRANTS

The special committee of the City Council appointed to consider the applications of the bands of the city for civic grants has been continued. The application of the Fredericton Brass Band for a grant of \$500 and that of Donovan's Brass Band for a grant of \$350 were referred back to the committee by the City Council at last night's special meeting. The 71st Regt. Band is also to apply for a grant. It was stated at last night's meeting that the grant asked for was necessary if the Fredericton Brass Band was to continue in existence, also that Donovan's Band was organized and ready to play.

**ELWOOD BURTT'S
DRIVE IN SAFE
WATERS TO NIGHT**

Nashwaak Drives Coming on Well
With Water Rising—Some Lumber
Will Be Manufactured at
Marysville Mills

Word received by the Mail today from Mr. Elwood Burtt was to the effect that his drive on the Keswick River was making excellent progress and would be in safe waters tonight. Mr. Burtt's drive consists of about 6,000,000 and will be sawed at his mill at Burtt's Corner. The drive had a fairly hard time, but the water rise during the last two or three days and it came out with little trouble.

TO SAW AT MARYSVILLE

Ex-Senator N. W. Jones and Mr. Thos. McAvity of St. John, representing the E. Partington Pulp & Paper Company were in the city yesterday and spent some time inspecting the company's property at Marysville returning to St. John last night. It has been decided to repair the dam which crosses the Nashwaak River at Marysville. Some weeks ago about one third of the dam was carried away by a rush of ice and water in the river. The dam will be put back in its former condition.

TO OPERATE MILLS

It is announced also that a portion of the lumber cut on the Nashwaak will be manufactured at the Marysville mills but how much of the total cut of 14,000,000 feet will be sawed there is not yet known. As in 1912 a large quantity of the lumber will be sent to Fairville and will be made into pulp at the pulp-mill there. Preparations for rafting the lumber at the mouth of the Nashwaak are going on steadily.

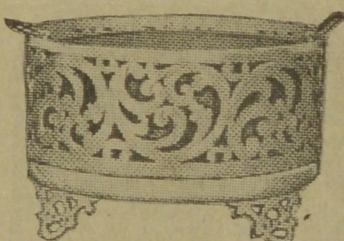
**MAYOR DECLARES
MOTION RE CITY
CLERK'S SALARY LOST**

Division of Opinion as to Whether
or Not Salary Has Been Increased
—Clerk Holds Office Till Re-
moved for Cause

The alarming story was spread this morning that Fredericton was without a City Clerk that state of affairs being the result of the declaration of the mayor at last night's meeting of the City Council that the motion to appoint the City Clerk at an annual salary of \$1200 had been lost. It is stated however that such is not the case, the City Clerk not being appointed yearly but holding office until removed for cause. Mr. J. W. McCready therefore is still City Clerk at the former salary of \$650 per year. In the face of the declaration of Mayor Hooper that he declared Ald. Clark's motion increasing the salary lost, the matter probably will lie over until the regular monthly
