BREECH BLEW OUT, MANY WERE KILLED

Eight to Eleven United States Artillerymen Dead at Fort Monroe

Hampton, Va., July 21.—Eight or nine artillerymen were instantly killed and a number injured at Fort Monroe in target practice early today. Details have not been received.

WASHINGTON HEARS ELEVEN DEAD.

Washington, July 21.—A report has reached the War Department that Sergeant Haas and ten enlisted men were killed in the accident at Fort Monroe.

Further unofficial reports are that the accident at Fort Monroe took place in the Decoussay battery and was caused by the blowing out of a breech block.

FIGHTING IN LIBERIA

Washington, July 22.—Severe fighting among tribes of Liberia in the vicinity of Cape Thomas, has broken out again. Commander John F. Luby of the Cruiser Des Moines, which cleared from Monrovia yesterday for the Canary Islands, reported to the navy department that the Liberian troops have been signally defeated in an effort to quell the uprising.

Commander Luby reports four cases of black fever aboard the Des Moines.

WEEDS SUCK BOY DOWN TO DEATH

His Companions Could not Swim to Him—Warning Given Last Year That Spot is Dangerous.

Toronto, July 21.—In a little red-brick house at 59 Jones avenue yesterday afternoon as the late afternoon sun was beating down upon its porchless front, word was brought that the only son, William J. Irwin, aged 15, had been added to the long list of victims of the treacherous water of Toronto Bay. The family had scarcely come to realize the terrible news when the lifeless body was brought to the house.

STARTING HIS TWO WEEKS' HOLIDAYS

The lad set out with two others for a swim early in the afternoon. He had been attending school until three months ago, when he secured employment with Messrs. Rolph & Clark, engravers, at the corner of Simcoe and Adelaide streets. His father at the time arranged with the firm that the boy be given two weeks' vacation and he started out yesterday in the anticipation of a fortnight's good fun.

The trio went to the sandy beach near Coatsworth's cut. This is a dangerous spot, owing to the current, and to the presence of a large bed of weeds which come almost to the surface, but all three boys could swim and, therefore, felt safe in venturing in. Irwin was the most experienced swimmer and took a notion to swim to a scow moored some distance out.

SANK BACK UNDER THE WATER

He set out alone and reached the scow, but just as he stretched his hand up out of the water to grasp the gunwale, he sank back and out of sight under water.

His companions, in alarm, waited to see him come up again, but he did not reappear, and as none of them was a sufficiently expert swimmer to rescue him, they hastened to a telephone in a nearby house and notified the police. The police patrol boat was on the scene and had recovered the body after it had been in the water fifteen minutes. Resuscitation methods were used in vain. Life was extinct.

SECOND DROWNING AT THIS SPOT

This is the second drowning that has occurred at this spot. Last year after a ten year old boy had been sucked down to his death in the weed bed by the current that makes toward the lake through the cut, a warning was issued against swimming in the place. It was fairly well heeded for a time, but the tragedy of last year has been almost forgotten.

CROWN ATTORNEY WILL INVESTIGATE

The deceased was the only son of William Irwin, a butcher, although there are several step-sisters and a brother. He was a member of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church. County Crown Attorney Monahan has been notified and an investigation will be held.

NO MORE TIME LIMITS IN NATIONAL LEAGUE

Cincinnati, July 23.—No more National League games will be called at a fixed time to enable a team to catch a train, says President Lynch. A time limit may be fixed, but if an inning is started it must be completed, even if it runs from ten to fifteen minutes beyond the fixed time. Many complaints have been registered by persons, who went out to see ball games and found that an agreement had been reached to call the game at a certain time. It generally happened that the club in the lead within a few minutes of the time limit was able to prolong a half inning by jockeying and thus rob an opposing team of a chance to tie or win a game.

WILL ASK FOR EGGS BY NUMBERS SOON

New Plan for Marketing Eggs—Ancient Eggs to be Traced by Number Placed on Them by Producer.

Montreal, July 21.—Please give me half a dozen number 23 eggs." This will soon be the sort of request that will be heard in Montreal groceries if a scheme which has been launched by a local produce firm for the classification of eggs is carried out.

Messrs. Gunn, Langlois, one of the largest produce firms in the city, have inaugurated a new system of marketing eggs, the object being to see that every housewife in Montreal gets newly laid eggs every time she telephones to the store.

If she doesn't she can change her number.

The plan is already being worked out in Peterboro and Ontario counties, Ontario, where there are seven co-operative societies carrying it out. Every week the eggs are collected and brought to a central station where they are tested by the buyers. Every egg is numbered by the producer so that if there is any ancient egg in lot the trouble can be traced.

The rules of the co-operative egg circles require that the eggs be gathered at least twice a week, and that no eggs be delivered from found nests. Any eggs that do not satisfy the buyer are to be accounted for by the producer. The membership fee of the association is \$1.

The Gunn, Langlois Company, who started the movement agree to pay a bonus of seven cents per dozen, above the market price, for all eggs produced by members of the circle.

The organization in Ontario is working to advantage in these counties and the farmers are more than satisfied. Since the organization was formed in Peterboro where eggs that were not fresh have been received.

RAILWAY LABORERS WANTED

Will be Able to Enter Canada Irrespective of Money Considerations

Ottawa, July 22.—The scarcity of railway laborers has led to the passing of an Order-in-Council, which changes the existing immigration laws so that railway construction laborers, who are mentally, morally and physically fit, and who are guaranteed work by railway contractors, will be admitted to Canada, irrespective of money considerations, from all countries except those of Asia.

This temporarily places railway laborers in the same position farm laborers have been in during the past. Contractors on the Pacific coast and in the Prairie Provinces, where labor is very scarce, will be able to get large numbers of Scandinavians and other first-class laborers who would have been barred before. Owing to the curtailment of operations in the United States many laborers are expected to be available from that source.
