## BRITISH ADMIRAL HAS ONLY POOR OPINION OF AIRSHIPS

Admiral Markham Declares that England  
Will Always Depend on Battleships  
--Thinks that Aeroplanes Would  
Have Small Chance of Doing Much  
Real Damage to Fleet.

New York, July 22—"Aeroplanes will never take the place of battleships," declared Admiral Sir Albert Markham, as he stepped ashore from the White Star liner Adriatic yesterday. "While airships will be invaluable as scouts in time of war, battleships will always prove the first line of England's defense, and all this talk about the German invasion of England by aeroplanes is as airy as the machines themselves."

Admiral Markham, who was accompanied by his wife and his little nine-year-old daughter, Joy Markham, is on his way to Great Barrington, Mass., to spend a couple of months with Dr. and Mrs. Frederick W. Pierson. He has visited America on hunting trips before, but since the Campdown of which he was in command, rammed and sank the battleship Victoria off Syria, sending her crew of six hundred men and Sir George Tyrone to the bottom he has stayed in England.

"I think the limit in the size of battleships," he remarked, "has been reached. They should not build them any larger than the Dreadnaught, as that type of war vessel is the best to handle in time of war, and I think that a 20,000 ton ship is ideal."

"Coming back to airships, I don't believe a battleship could be hit by a shot from an aeroplane, except by the merest accident, and the aeroplane has to pass through several more stages of development before it conquers the air sufficiently to be a dependable instrument in war."

"Large naval armament is the best peace preserver anation can have and, therefore, the larger navies are built, the more likelihood there is of peace being maintained. But don't let us think of war; I am sure no one dreads war more than I do."

## MEN MUST MEASURE UP OR GO UNWEDDED

Lady Dockrell Says Women Must Not Marry  
Unless the Men Can Show Some Certificate of Mental and Physical Ability.

London, July 22.—Lady Dockrell, wife of Sir Maurice Dockrell, in an address at the annual congress of the Royal Institute of Public Health, declared that woman must realize that upon her depended the ascent or descent—the very existence—of the human race.

"The popular idea," said Lady Dockrell, "is that every woman has about five men ground her from whom she can choose a husband. Only in rare and isolated cases is that so. Usually a woman is ready to accept the man she is thrown against, and invariably she in her own mind knows that he does not approach her ideal."

Lady Dockrell concluded by saying that the time would come when a woman would refuse to accept a man unless he could show some certificate of mental and physical fitness.

## SUBJECTS FOR COMING COLONIAL CONFERENCE

Mr. Asquith Says that Business to be Transacted will be Fully Set Forth in Time.

London, July 22.—Mr. Hammersley in the Commons, asked the Prime Minister whether he would consider a request for the appointment of a committee to report on what subjects were recommended for consideration at the next Colonial conference.

Mr. Asquith said the Government was and must remain responsible for the subjects which they would submit for consideration at the Imperial conference. The Governments of the Dominions were responsible for the resolutions proposed by them and the hon. member might rest assured that the business to be transacted would be arranged at such a date as to allow a full circulation of the subject matter as between ourselves and the Dominions.

Sir C. Coke inquired whether Mr. Asquith was aware that, when a resolution relating to emigration came before the Imperial conference last year not one of the delegates knew anything about it. The Colonial Secretary himself was not aware as to how the matter arose.

Mr. Asquith said: "I cannot charge my memory with that, but I will not say that it did not occur."

## THE SITUATION AT CAMPBELLTON AT PRESENT DEPLORABLE

Heavy Rains Have Soaked Ground Upon which People must Sleep—Two Reported to Have Become Mentally Unbalanced—Further Appeal for Prompt Aid Has Been Issued.

Campbellton, N.B., July 22—Thunderstorms and heavy rain falls during the last two days have made the condition of the homeless population of Campbellton more miserable than ever. Only today, in fact, are they beginning to realize their helplessness. The thunderstorms which swept over the ruins today forced the majority of the homeless people to sleep in their wet clothing with the ground, water soaked. There were no mattresses or bedding of any kind to relieve the hardships of the majority of women and children.

In the absence of regular sewerage or water supply the physicians of the town are preparing for a serious outbreak of sickness, and a temporary hospital is being rapidly completed. The members of the relief committee are doing their best to distribute provisions justly, but it is a difficult task under the circumstances, and the cash subscriptions are coming too slowly to supply the immediate needs.

Subscriptions should be addressed to Judge McLatchy, chairman of the committee, Campbellton. The cash received is deposited in banks in Campbellton and the funds are not paid out except upon checks drawn out and signed by the three members of the finance committee.

So far only \$38,000 has been received in cash. How far this will go toward relieving the situation is shown by the explanation of the committee.

It is absolutely necessary to rebuild the homes before winter sets in, to avoid abject misery. To do this it is important to keep the present working population on hand, and first of all the homes of the working men must be rebuilt. This means the expenditure of a large amount of money but the future of the town depends upon it.

## ARGENTINA'S NEW PRESIDENT

Buenos Ayres, July 22.—Senor Roque Saenz-Penna was proclaimed president of Argentina yesterday by the presidential electors, chosen in the election of June 12. Dr. Victorino De Lapraz, minister of foreign affairs, was declared elected vice-president.

The electors from the fourteen provinces, numbering three hundred, met in the senate chamber to canvass the ballots in the recent election. Saenz-Penna was declared elected by 240 out of 300 votes, while De Lapraz received 259 out of 300. De Lapraz resigned as minister of foreign affairs.

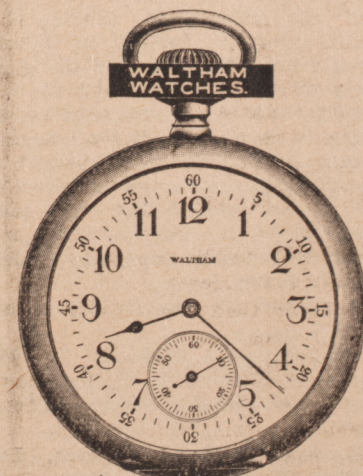
