MRS. MARGARET CAMPBELL DROPPED DEAD AT HER HOME LAST NIGHT

Widow of the Late Nelson Campbell--Survived by Two Sons and One Daughter.

Mrs. Margaret Campbell, widow of the late Nelson Campbell, was stricken with heart failure last night at her home, York Street, and died instantly. Death took place at about eleven o'clock. The deceased had been talking to her son, Mr. J. Stewart Campbell, but a few minutes before and seemed to be in good health. She retired to her room and shortly afterward Mr. Campbell heard the sound of her falling. On going to the room he found his mother dead. Dr. McGrath was summoned and stated that death had been instantaneous.

Mrs. Campbell was eighty-two years of age, the anniversary of her birthday having occurred in March last. She had never suffered from heart trouble and was thought to be in good health until the time of her death.

The deceased is survived by two sons and one daughter. They are Mr. Frederick C. Campbell of Port St. John, B. C., mining recorder for the government of British Columbia; Mr. J. Stewart Campbell, barrister, of this city; Mrs. A. J. Loggie of Chatham.

The late Nelson Campbell, second husband of the deceased died several years ago. Before her marriage to him, Mrs. Campbell was Mrs. Fraser.

The late Mrs. Campbell was the daughter of the late James Colter of Nashwaak and was the last member of her family. Mr. T. H. Colter, recorder for the County of York, is a nephew. Hon. George J. Colter of Keswick is also a nephew.

The funeral will take place Monday afternoon, leaving the house at two o'clock. Twenty minutes before that hour Rev. Neil McLaughlin will conduct service at the house.

Mrs. Loggie, daughter of the deceased arrived from Chatham this morning.

WHARF MUCH USED MANY YEARS AGO, IS NOW BEING REBUILT

Hatt--Morrison Co. Ltd. Will Use Old Steamboat Landing For Discharge of Coal Cargoes.

The Hatt-Morrison Co. Ltd., is improving and repairing the wharf immediately above the Phoenix Square dump. New cribwork is being placed along the front of the wharf and the rear filled in. The company will use the rebuilt wharf for the discharge of cargoes of coal.

This wharf in its early days was one of Fredericton's most noted features, for at it the steamer "The Hatt" said to be the finest that ever ran on the river St. John, docked when river traffic was at its height many years ago. The first wharf was built by the late Thomas Pickard who owned a steamer which plied between this city and St. John. This wharf was rather narrow and formed only the most easterly part of the present structure. Later the late A. T. Coburn bought the property and built a wharf above the Pickard wharf and used it in his own provision business. Later still people by the name of Lunt obtained possession of the property and extended the Coburn wharf to deep water and used it for the purpose of docking their river steamers. This was the time of railroads in the hey-day of river traffic. At this time the Hatheway line of steamers also ran to St. John and docked at the present Star Line wharf.

BIG GAME PLENTIFUL IN NORTHERN SECTION OF THE PROVINCE

Guide Charles Cremin Home From Trip Through Northern Wilds--Was Accompanied by Two Ohio Men.

Mr. Charles Cremin the well known guide of the city returned on Friday by the I.C.R. from a trip through the wilds of the northern part of the province. He left here three weeks ago and was joined at Perth by Mr. H. C. Huntington of Huntington and Mr. Clarence Brown of Dayton, Ohio. They proceeded by rail so Plaster Rock and drove to the Forks of the Tobique where they launched their canoe. They poled up the river to the Pictou Lake and a three mile carry put them into Bathurst Lake at the head of the Nepisiguit river. They ran down the Nepisiguit a distance of twenty miles, and then made a carry of six miles to the northeast branch of the Upsalquitch. They then canoed down the Upsalquitch and Restigouche to Metapedia where they boarded the train for their home, the Americans returning by way of St. John.

The party enjoyed some excellent fishing and were delighted with their trip. In the Nepisiguit they caught trout weighing four and five pounds, and while on their Upsalquitch they had no difficulty in taking the maximum allowance of five salmon a day. Mr. Cremin states that they saw a great many moose and deer on the trip and he has no doubt but that big game is on the increase in that section of the province.
