COMMISSION ON TECHNICAL EDUCATION WILL REACH FREDERICTON THIS EVENING

The Royal Commission on Technical and Industrial Education will arrive in Fredericton this evening by the regular C. P. R. train from St. John. A committee will meet the party, which will be composed of ten members, at the train and escort them to the Queen Hotel, which will be their headquarters during their stay in Fredericton.

Tomorrow morning Rev. Dr. Bryce of Winnipeg, one of the commissioners will preach at St. Paul's Presbyterian Church. As far as is known Mr. James Simpson will not address any meeting on Sunday. Tomorrow afternoon the Commissioners are to be given a drive about the city.

The committee which will receive the commission at the railway station this evening will be composed of Chancellor C. C. Jones of the University of New Brunswick, Mr. George W. Hodge, president of the Board of Trade and Dr. W. S. Carter Chief Superintendent of Education.

PROGRAMME

A programme of the sessions of the commission has not been definitely mapped out but it is the intention to devote the morning and evening sessions of the commission to the hearing of evidence and the afternoon to the inspection of industrial plants. The sessions will be held in the assembly chamber at the parliament building. It is expected that Chancellor Jones, Mr. T. B. Kidner, Chief Superintendent Carter, the Secretary of Agriculture and others will be heard Monday morning. On Tuesday morning the representatives of the farmers and dairymen are to be heard. The evening sessions are to be devoted to the mechanics.

SMALL POX OUTBREAK AT JACQUET RIVER

Newcastle Leader: One of the worst small-pox epidemics that has developed in northern New Brunswick now demands the vigorous attentions of the Health authorities. The disease centres in Jacquet River and nearby settlements. One estimate says there are thirty cases while another places the cases at approximately fifty with a strong possibility of a much greater number. The Leader has been enabled to learn exclusively of the outbreak and the exact conditions prevalent. The pestilence has been the source of causing fears that the outbreak might spread. Indeed for some time no proper quarantine system had been inaugurated until the arrival of Col. Maltby from Newcastle. The Colonel had been on his Campbellton trip at the time and went to Jacquet River to investigate the conditions. He discovered matters in a very critical condition and at once secured communication with Dr. Fisher of Marysville, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health. Mr. Maltby also instructed the physician Dr. Coffin, to take every possible quarantine and relief measures. Meanwhile Dr. Fisher arrived and Col. Maltby made a second trip to Jacquet River with him. This was the end of last week.

Systematically, the health officials proceeded with their duties. Invariably their investigation revealed that there had been practically no quarantine whatever. Some very serious cases had developed and the disease had been spreading rapidly. While placards had been placed on many doors this was by no means an adequate method of quarantine and not conforming by any means with the regulations of the Provincial Board of Health.

Dr. Fisher and Col. Maltby gave orders to Dr. Coffin for the strict enforcement of the regulations and a late report states that quarantine conditions are improving somewhat. Dr. Ferguson of Dalhousie is the chairman of the local board. Much credit is due Col. Maltby for the prompt manner in which he investigated the outbreak and forwarded his report to the secretary of the provincial board.

In conversation with The Leader yesterday Col. Maltby did not hesitate to say that the situation was a very serious one and the outbreak, unparalleled in that section.

FLORENCE NIGHTINGALE LAID TO REST TODAY

London, Aug. 20.—Florence Nightingale, the famous nurse of the Crimean War, who died Aug. 13, at her London home, was buried this afternoon beside the bodies of her father and mother in the churchyard of the little Hampshire. Village of East Wil low. In accordance with her often expressed wishes for a simple, private funeral, the ceremony was one of the quietest nature.

The only reminder of her great services to the army and the nation being the presence of a squad of the Grenadier Guards who acted as bearers. Outside of these only members of the immediate family and a few relations were present at the funeral.

Public tribute to the "Angel of the Crimea" was paid at a memorial service at noon at St. Paul's Cathedral here, at which King George, Queen Mary, and the Queen Mother Alexandra, the war office and Admiralty and the greater part of the British public bodies and colonies were represented.

The Cathedral was crowded with the official representatives.

INCREASED TEMPERANCE IN MALTA.

In a report on the finances of Malta for 1909-10, which show that the revenue for the year was £436,200, and the expenditure £458,013, an expenditure over revenue of £21,813, General Sir Leslie Rundle, the Governor, states that there was a decrease in receipts on beer of £2,523, due to a further shrinkage in local consumption which is attributable to prolonged absences of the fleet and to increased temperance among the troops and the civil population.
