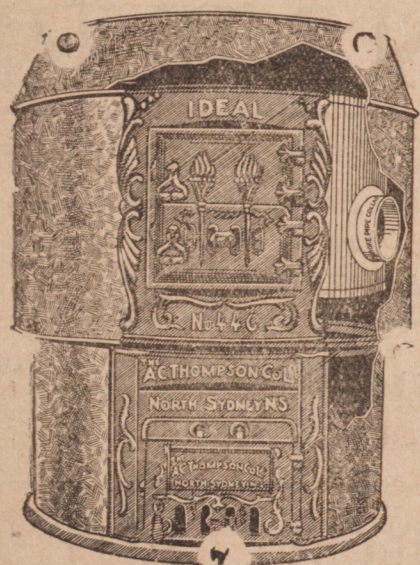

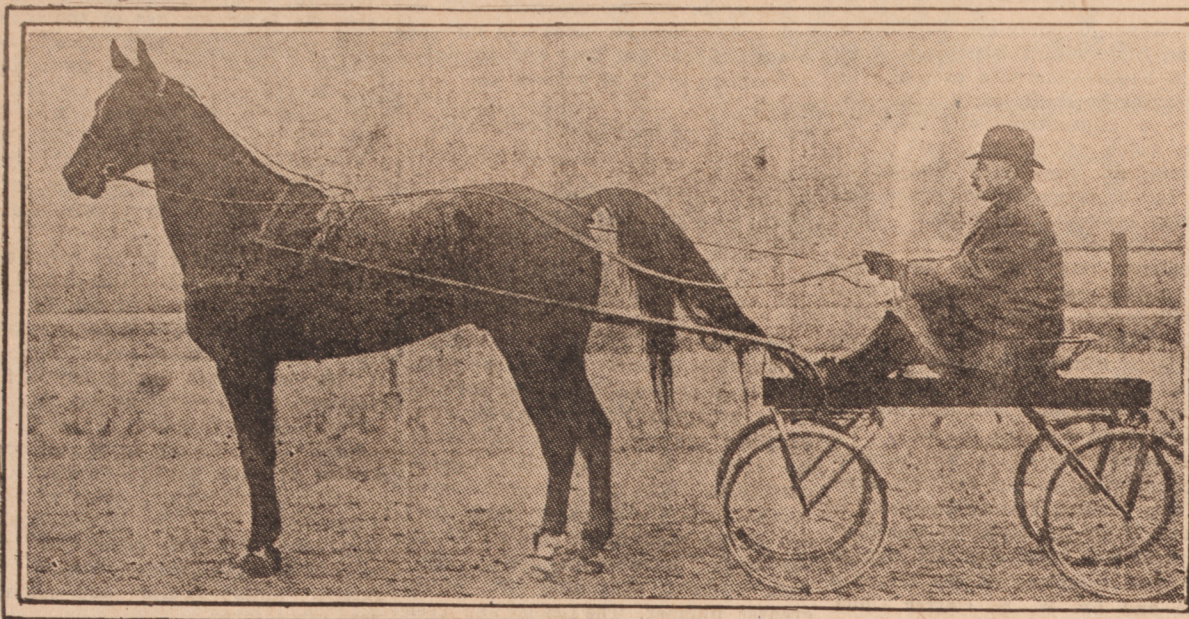

UHLAN C. K. G. BILLINGS DRIVING

Uhlan's mile in 1.58½ without the aid of a wind shield at Cleveland last week was one more triumph for the family of Bingen, 2.06½. Perhaps no other trotting sire ever lived that at the same age was the progenitor of

so many sensational young horses as are now credited to Bingen and his sons, Todd, 2.14½, and Bingara. The sire of Uhlan is seventeen years old. He has already founded a family which promises to be one of the

most important in the future of the trotting horse.

Besides being a sire of early and extreme speed, Bingen is a model of the trotting horse type, not alone for light harness but for heavy harness work as well.

### HISTORY OF HARVESTER, RECORD BREAKING FIVE YEAR OLD STALLION

By Walnut Hall Out of Notelet--  
Repeatedly Driven to Victory By Ed.  
Geers.

The Harvester, the five-year-old who has established a new record for the mile for trotting stallions is by Walnut Hall out of Notelet by Moko and for two years past has been repeatedly driven to victory by Ed. Geers. He is owned by August Uhlén of Milwaukee who bought him out of a Walnut Hall consignment in the winter of 1907 for \$9000. The following fall he was entered in the Grand circuit races. At Columbus he captured the Horse Review and Stock Farm futurities and rounded out his record for the season by taking the Kentucky futurity at Lexington in which his sire had won second money in 1901.

### SEASON 1909

Last year he won special note by capturing the \$10,000 Charter Oak purse at Hartford, winning the second and third heats from Bob Douglass. At Syracuse also he took the 2:09 class with a best time of 2:09½.

This year he started the season at Detroit, Aug. 2 where he defeated Country Jay and Bob Douglass for the Chamber of Commerce stake, taking both heats in 2:04½. The next week at Cleveland on the day following Uhlan's great exploit he trotted into fame by downing Sonoma Girl in a 2:03½ mile equaling the record for stallions established in 1901 when Cresceus raced The Abbot at Brighton beach.

### WELL BROKEN.

Ed Geers who alone has driven The Harvester since the horse was placed the his hands, gave him a thorough breaking in before attempting to do anything in the speed-making line.

"I knew that his sire was one of the highest strung horses we ever saw racing," he said in 1908 "and I wanted to break the colt thoroughly before asking him for speed lest he get speed crazy."

"I trained him on the mile-upon-mile system, that is to say, I brought him along slowly, dropping down a little each week and brushing him the first and last ends of his miles. He learned very fast but I never drove him anywhere near his clip. I thought him the best individual I ever saw, and I can remember no trotter with which I have taken greater pains."

### ED. GEERS.

Edward F. Geers, better known as "Ed, the silent man from Tennessee" is one of the veterans of the turf and probably its favorite. He was born Jan. 25, 1851 and has therefore 59 years to his credit of which nearly half have been spent on the Grand circuit. He has driven more than a score of trotters to records of 2:10 or better and has won the greater part of \$1,000,000 for his employers. Born at Lebanon, Wilson county, Tenn, he first became trainer for C. J. Hamlin of Village farm, Buffalo. That first brought him into close contact with the turf and he has never left it.

His only world's trotting record was won by The Abbot with a mark of 2:03½, but many of his horses have held records in their own classes. Such were Robert J. whom he gave the champion pacing record of 2:01½ Brown Hal, Nightingale, Lady of the Manor, Fantasy, Lord Derby and Heir at Law all of whom received

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age may homestead a quarter-section available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$500.
