CRIPPEN IN FAREWELL LETTER PROTESTS HIS INNOCENCE

New York, Nov. 29.—A London cable to The World says:

Ethel Clara LeNeve has given to The World the last statement Dr. Hawley Harvey Crippen made before he was hanged, Wednesday. It is established now that the alleged "confession" by Crippen never came out of Pentonville Prison, where he ended his days.

In her letter, enclosing the public authenticated statement by Crippen, Miss LeNeve writes:

"I forward you Dr. Crippen's last words.

"They are contained in two final letters he wrote: the last on Tuesday, the day before he left me forever."

"A GLIMMER OF HOPE."

The man who murdered his wife, Ethel Elmore, presumably for love of Ethel LeNeve, wrote in the shadow of the gallows:

"How to control myself to write I hardly know, but I pray God to help us to be brave to face the end now so near. Though this rush to my mind quicker than I can put them down; the time is short now and there is so much that I would say.

"When I wrote you Saturday I had not heard any news of my petition, and, though I never dared hope, yet deep down in my soul was just a glimmer of trust that God might give us a chance to put me right before the world and let me have the passionate longing of my soul.

"Your letter, written on Saturday, came soon after the governor (of Pentonville Prison) brought me the dreadful news about ten o'clock. He was so kind and considerate in telling me; in breaking the shock as gently as he could.

"When he was gone I first kissed your face in the photo, my faithful, devoted companion in all this sorrow. How am I to endure to take my last look on your dear face? What agony must I go through at last when you disappear forever from before my eyes. I know what your agony will be, for I know that your heart, like mine, will be broken.

WANTED HIS BODY CREMATED.

"I think all necessary points about business are settled, but there are one or two things I want to say:

"If, by any possibility, you can have my body, have it cremated; dispose of my ashes as you wish.

"I know you will be the only one to mourn for me, which I know will please you. But do not, dearest, think I expect you to put on mourning; that, dearest, I leave you to decide on. It may not be well for you to do it, in going to Mrs. H., and I know that not the deepest mourning can be more than a faint indication of your grief. But you have friends to help you; you have at least sufficient means to begin the

battle of life; you are not destitute and helpless.

"The governor let me read, yesterday, your story and my statement. I find, though, in some way they omitted entirely my comment on the scar (on the remains found in Crippen's cellar a scar like one on his wife's body). My criticism on this point was important and I hope you can see that it is put in my statement next Sunday.

DECLARES IT WAS NOT A SCAR.

"Medical witnesses for the defence brought forward proof to support their denial that the groove was a scar by demonstrating that there were certain structures present in the so-called scar which could not be present if the mark had resulted from a surgical operation. This proof showed so absolutely that the groove was not a scar that the Crown (prosecutors) could only affirm out of their false position.

"Another point advanced at the last moment by the Crown, when they saw their case was weakening with regard to the so-called scar, was the fact that the groove was widest at its lowest point. The fact of the thing is that, anatomically considered, the fibrous attachments of the abdomen are firmest almost exactly at that point. So, if the groove had been a scar that had been stretched, its widest point would have been much higher up. Yet, despite the fact that my medical witnesses proved the groove was not a scar, the Judge dwelt on this point as advantageous for the Crown.

"I write these things in the hope that the unreliability of the case brought against me may be understood by thoughtful people. But I want you not to go to any further trouble or expense in trying to get further evidence beyond completing what correspondence you have begun with medical men here and with the hospital in Philadelphia.

SOLICITOUS FOR HER WELFARE.

"I want my dear one to keep for her own use all that can be realized by the sale of my estate.

"We can safely leave to the hand of the just God the production of further evidence later on, if necessary.

"I hope so greatly you have heard favorably from Mrs. H.; that you may soon get to her, where you will be comfortable and made more cheerful by bright sunshine; where you will be entirely free from newspaper men and their lying tales.

"My worries and troubles here will soon be ended, as I shall be tomorrow in God's hands, and I have perfect faith He will let my spirit be with you always and after this earthly separation is finished, will join our souls forever.

"There will be no time for letters Wednesday morning."

THE GERMAN KAISER AND THE DIVINE RIGHT

Berlin, Nov. 29.—The Reichstag was occupied on Saturday with a discussion of the speech made by Emperor William, at a provincial dinner at Koenigsberg, on August 26th, during his tour of Eastern Germany. The varied and conflicting sentiments aroused by his remarkable utterance intimating a continued belief in the play. The debate, participated in by divine right of kings, was given full Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg and the leaders of all parties, the Republicans, Socialists, Monarchists, Moderates and Conservatives, was bitter throughout. In his Koenigsberg speech the Emperor, after saying that his grandfather had seen in himself the chosen instrument of heaven, and so proclaimed that the Prussian crown was bestowed upon him by God's grace alone, intimated that the convictions of the Emperor William I and his own were identical, and added:

"Considering myself as the instrument of the Master, regardless of passing views and opinions, I go my way, which is solely devoted to the prosperity and peaceful development of our Fatherland."

In anticipation of a prolonged discussion, the House met two hours earlier than usual. But few of the members were absent and the galleries were crowded. Many ministers and other high officials and the Prussian and Imperial governments were present.

Herr Ledebour, one of the Socialist leader Bedell's most gifted lieutenants, supported the Socialist interpellation inquiring what the Chancellor thought of the Emperor's declaration of his belief in the divine right of kings.

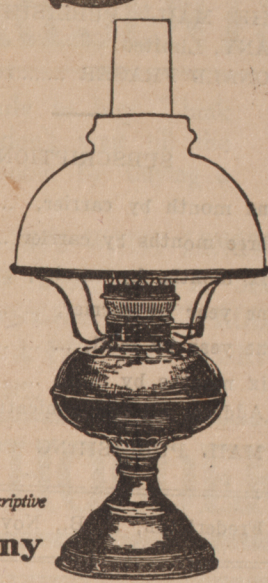

The speaker affirmed that Germany must be ruled by a democratic parliamentary system.

Replying Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg defended the Emperor and asserted that the Socialist interpellation was inspired by republican sentiment rather than by anxiety for the integrity of the State. Herr Ledebour's remarks made it clear, he said, that he and his party are not moved to interpellate by their care for the commonwealth, but a passionate hostility to the constitution. He confessed that he and his party favor a republic.

"Is that something new?" Ledebour interrupted.

"No," responded the Chancellor, "this is nothing new. You have always supported that principle, but you have not proclaimed your aim so publicly as today."

The Chancellor denied that the Koenigsberg speech constituted a breach of any promise that His Majesty had made in 1908, saying that when he used the expression, "by the grace of God," the Emperor was fully conscious of his rights and duties.

ROMAN ORGAN ENDORSES EX-PRESSION

Rome, Nov. 27.—The Observatore Romano publishes comments, evidently inspired by the Vatican, out of the discussion yesterday in the German Reichstag, on the speech by the Emperor William at Koenigsberg, on August 26th, pointing out that the debate furnished proof of the irrefutable truth contained in the Emperor's speeches both at Koenigsberg and Beuron that the throne and altar can not be divided in Germany, religion being necessary in the struggle against error in modern times.

In addressing the Abbot and a number of Roman Catholic dignitaries in the Benedictine Monastery at Beuron, the Emperor said: "The governments of Christian princes can only be carried on according to the will of the Lord. The altar and throne are closely united and must not be separated."

The Vatican official organ, in the course of its comment says:

"The two finest speeches of the German monarch were noble, just and constitutionally correct. While irreligious, it is a relief to hear certain truths nobly vindicated by the authoritative and august lips of a powerful sovereign."

SOURCES OF WEALTH OPENED UP BY G. T. P.

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is already a factor in opening up lands and promulgating trade throughout the western provinces. The construction of that portion of the road from Winnipeg to Edmonton has been a big factor in the development of that portion of the west.

In operation only a few months, this line has participated extensively in giving new life to the country through which it runs and in creating an enthusiasm among the populace, which has resulted in the birth of new towns and a greater activity in land cultivation.

A run over the line from Winnipeg west will convince the traveller that the Grand Trunk Pacific has now reached a point in operation where, on the 1,000 miles of "prairie" section, it will have opportunity to demonstrate the financial wisdom of its builders in laying down a first-class railway through absolutely new and undeveloped territory.

The financial success of the enterprise of course, is as yet to be demonstrated. The prairie section is the only part of the road on which the company will have to pay interest on the cost of construction within the first seven years. Even estimating cost of this section at as high as \$30,000 to \$35,000 per mile, the total interest charge would not be over \$2,000,000. Moreover, traffic is developing in this section faster than officials had believed possible.

Though the road has just been opened to traffic for the 1,400 miles from Edson to the head of Lake Superior and is still in fact being operated under the construction department, it will this year take out of its territory about 7,000,000 bushels of grain. Lumber traffic in 1909 was 46,102 tons, as against 25,190 tons in 1908, and the 1910 year will be much larger. Five years ago along this line there was nothing.

Of course, the problem of making a paying proposition of the 1,000 miles from Winnipeg to the Atlantic, through the Canadian mineral belt is purely a development problem, but so far as the Grand Trunk Pacific officials are concerned, their chief attention at present is devoted to making a paying proposition of the prairie section now in operation, which they are firmly convinced they can do from the start.

All along the line from Winnipeg to Edmonton and then to Edson, the hand of enterprise has been at work. Towns of from one to three years of age are in evidence all along the route, while huge areas of wheat fields and miles of herded lands present a spectacle to the traveller's eye that is at once inspiring, and impresses one with the fact that this favored portion of Canada's west in which the Grand Trunk Pacific is playing such a prominent part will yield enormous wealth and greatly add to the prosperity of the whole Dominion.
