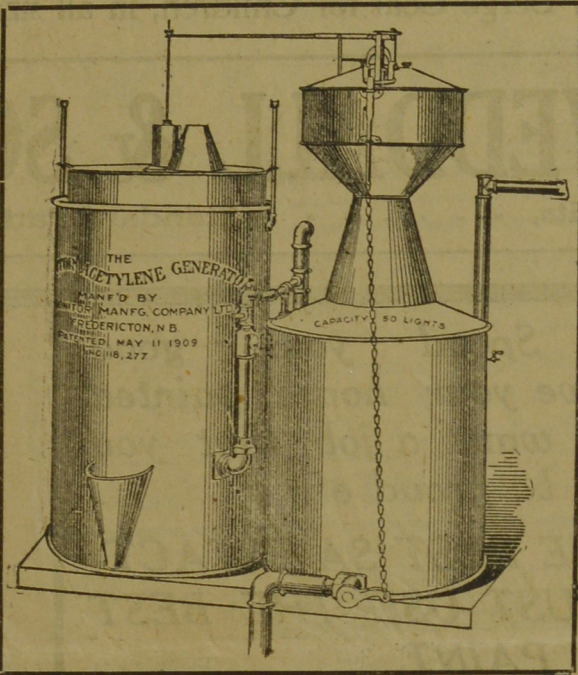

WANT TO BRING N. Z. MUTTON TO CANADA

New Zealand Steamship Co. Backed up
by C. P. R. and Owing Vessels
Seeks New Trade.

(Montreal Herald.)

The possibilities of trade between New Zealand and Canada was discussed and the needs of the trade were recounted at an informal gathering aboard the New Zealand Steamship's ship, the Rakia, yesterday afternoon. At the gathering were representatives of the city papers and of the steamship company and the Canadian Pacific Railway, which stands back of the steamship line in all its doings. For the C.P. R. Mr. H. A. Harris of the Traffic Department, who has control of the new line, Captain Walsh, marine superintendent, and Mr. George Ham were present, while at the head of the gathering Captain Baines of the Rakia sat.

The Rakia is the first of a line of ships to run between New Zealand and Canada and while not intended for the exclusive carriage of mutton, its unusual capacity for such goods places it in a class apart from any of the many ships which stop at Montreal.

The Rakia is not by any means the best of the New Zealand Shipping Co.'s ships. Nor is it the largest, nor has it the greatest carrying capacity. Yet its refrigerator plant is capable of carrying no less than 110,000 sheep's carcasses, although a fair load is 100,000. Probably no ship has even brought to this country such a supply of mutton, yet the new line are willing to carry such a cargo or as large a one each month during open season, and if the supply exceeds the demands of the Dominion, Chicago firms stand prepared to take all the goods which can be spared to them.

In discussing the trade relations between Canada and New Zealand, Mr. Harris told that the Canadian Pacific in looking around for new fields to conquer had decided that the trade with the Antipodes offered a field for development and accordingly the company made arrangements with the New Zealand Shipping Company by which it had been possible for them to maintain a monthly service between the two colonies on a subsidy from the Canadian government far smaller than that which had been asked for by lines in the past, which had contemplated entering the trade.

"What is needed to develop this trade, a trade which will bring cheap meat to the tables of the people of Canada, is a removal of the duty now imposed on mutton," Mr. Harris said. "If the Canadian Government can see its way clear to make this duty less we can bring to the country enough mutton to materially reduce the price of the commodity. With the price of mutton reduced the price of all meats will fall, and a long step will have been made toward the lowering of the cost of living."

Mr. Harris told of the way in which the New Zealand connection had grown, and said that if properly patronized, as there was no doubt it would be, the line would be strengthened with new and large ships, and already the plans of the company called for ships nearly double the size of the Rakia. These would be here next year.

"We have had plenty of opposition shown us since we began this service," Mr. Harris said. "There are four or five lines running out of New York direct to New Zealand, and when these companies heard of our move they came into Canada with a freight rate such as had never been thought of before."

"We have been able to meet this and the fact that we have, in spite of it, already about 5,000 tons of cargo booked up for this voyage is an indication of the satisfaction that the Canadian shipper feels in the new line," Mr. Harris said.

Mr. Harris told that if arrangements could be made with the New Zealand Government to enable a direct service on both the eastward and westward voyages this would be done. Then on the voyage to Canada the ships would stop at Indian points and load burlap in large quantities for Canada. At present this sort of freight from India is coming by foreign lines to Boston and on to the Canadian West, where it is used in the making of bags for the movement of the Canadian harvest.

Captain Baines told of the trade with New Zealand and of what prospects there are in the trade if proper tariff conditions can be made. He extended the thanks of the company for the good wishes he had received from them. Mr. George Ham made a short address, in which he outlined the policy of the C. P. R. in its steady upbuilding of all the great means of transportation.

After dinner the guests were shown over the ship by the Rakia's officers.

DISCUSS G. T. PACIFIC TERMINAL AT QUEBEC

President Hays Confers with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Several Cabinet Ministers in Regard to Site.

Quebec, May 18.—An important conference was held here today between Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hons. L. P. Brodeur, Geo. P. Graham, Rudolphe Lemieux and William Pugsley with President Chas. M. Hays, of the Grand Trunk and G. T. P., and Vice-president William Wainwright.

Many matters concerning the terminals of the G. T. P. at Quebec were discussed and this morning the whole party made an inspection of the line and its possible end here. As a result it was stated by both Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Chas. M. Hays that there was every probability of an agreement being arrived at between the government and G.T. P. about the Quebec terminals.

While no definite statement has been given out, it is understood that a decision has been reached favoring the Champlain market site instead of the C. P. R. palace station site, which was favored by several influential forces.

COUNTESS OF WARWICK AND SOCIALIST FRIENDS

London, May 17.—The Countess of Warwick has set herself the difficult task of consolidating the divided forces of the English Socialist body. Hitherto the countess has been associated with the most aggressive element in socialism, the body in fact which has not hesitated to assail most of the other Socialist societies.

Now Lady Warwick is advising the Social Democratic party and the two organizations which that party has most vigorously attacked, the Fabian Society and the Independent Labor party, to sink their differences and concentrate upon an attempt to realize those purposes on which there is a common agreement.

Her efforts at reconciliation have not as yet met with a very promising reception, mainly because certain leaders of the Social Democratic party refuse to meet the two other societies except on the condition that these two sections accept the Social Democratic programme in its entirety.

CANADIAN COTTON REPORT RATHER GLOOMY

Montreal, May 17.—President Morrice struck a pessimistic note when he delivered his annual review to the small assembly of shareholders of the Canadian Cotton Company at their annual meeting today.

Mr. Morrice not only stated that the past year had been an extremely bad one for the cotton industry but that the present year might be looked upon to bring forth very meagre returns unless conditions in the cotton market were materially changed. Despite the hard times, all the shareholders expressed themselves as being well satisfied with the present state of affairs.

The old directorate was re-elected, and the same officers will be re-appointed for the coming year.

A second vice-president is also to be chosen from amongst the directors, with a view to lightening the labor of president and first vice-president in attending at board meetings.

The sum of \$10,000 was unanimously voted to pay the incidental expenses of the board.

In view of the fact that the company is in the habit of printing one sole copy of the annual statement and then keeping a close clutch on it in case any eye not belonging to a director might light on it, the following is only an abbreviated memorandum of the document:

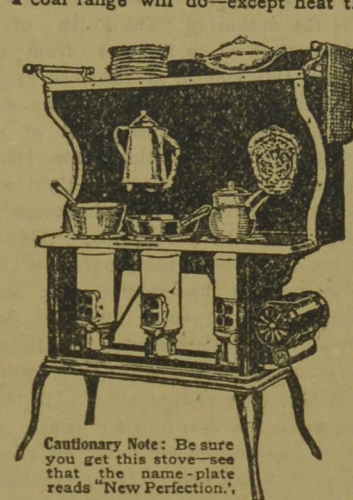

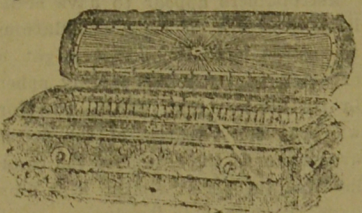

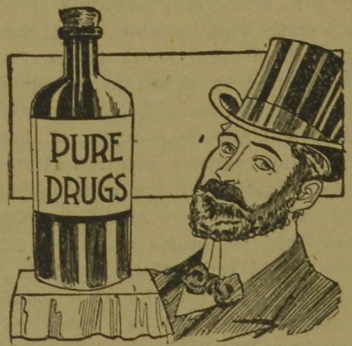
