**FARMING PROSPECTS  
LOOKING BRIGHTER****Farmers Themselves Take a More  
Hopeful View of the Situation--  
Fewer Farms for Sale.**

(Telegraph)

W. W. Hubbard, secretary of agriculture, Fredericton, is in the city on business in connection with his department. Mr. Hubbard, in answer to a question from a representative of The Telegraph, said that he had noticed recently a very general spirit of enthusiasm among the farmers of New Brunswick. He believed this was significant and went to show that New Brunswick farmers are gradually if slowly, acquiring great faith in the possibilities of their own province. Mr. Hubbard also remarked that several farms offered for sale a few years ago had recently been with drawn from the market, the owners, evidently, having become convinced that they could do better on their own farms in New Brunswick than in the west or any other part of Canada. When asked in regard to the number of New Brunswick students in attendance at the agricultural colleges, Mr. Hubbard replied that more than forty attended agricultural schools this year, either for long or short courses. He believed that the effect on their farms in future of the knowledge they gained there would be of very great value. Several of these students had written to him, he said, telling him what they believed to be the greatest difficulties encountered by the farmers in their particular districts. These letters Mr. Hubbard found to be interesting, practical and very useful. While Mr. Hubbard deplores the great number of vacant farms in New Brunswick, he believes that the farmers of this province are rapidly becoming convinced that chances here are equally as good as in any other part of Canada.

**ENGLISH SCHOOLBOYS  
AND CURRENT POLITICS**

The boys attending the Methodist schools at Ashbourne, England, were recently asked to write a short essay on the Budget. The following is the unaided production of one boy, aged 12 years.

"The Budget is a Finance Bill. It is drawn up by the Premier and the Chancellor of the Exchequer to pay away part of the National Debt and all the officers engaged by the Crown such as judges, policemen, postmen and the Army and Navy. In the present Budget the Old Age Pension Act must be provided for. The present Budget (brought about by the Liberals) is known as the People's Budget. First of all it leaves the food of the people untaxed; second, it lifts the burden off the poor; third, it unlocks the land to the people, fourth, it adapts the burden to the backs that are able to bear it; fifth it is a triumph of justice; and sixth, it is the final unanswerable argument for Free Trade."

Who shall say that English boys are not politicians after this?

**INTERNATIONAL ARBITRATION  
CONFERENCE NOW MEETING**

Mohonk Lake, N.Y., May 18--The sixteenth annual meeting of the lake Mohonk conference on international arbitration begin its three days' session here this morning. Diplomats, educators, jurists and clergymen from many parts of the world received the welcome Albert K. Smiley, LL.D., the founder and host of the organization. Dr. Smiley was followed by Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, president of American Association for international conciliation and presiding officer of this conference. Dr. Smiley declared that the greatest step in the direction of international arbitration was soon to be taken in the establishment of an international court at "The Hague."

The most striking feature of president Butler's address was his assertion that "Somebody makes something by reason of the huge expenditure in preparation for war and his suggestion that 'the same sort of ability that has exposed other forms of political graft should investigate the sincerity and disinterestedness of lively types of patriotism which accomplished these military and naval debates the world over.'"

A year's review of the movement was given by Benjamin F. Trueblood LL.D., secretary of the American Peace Society.

**IMPORTANT CHANGE IN  
AMERICAN LAWS****Recommended by National Association  
of Manufacturers Dealing with Im-  
ported Labor.**

New York, May 18--An important change in the immigration laws which, if adopted, would have a direct bearing on the efforts of union labor to prevent the importation of contract labor, was recommended to the National Association of Manufacturers, which opened its annual convention here today. The committee on immigration included in its report the following recommendations for changes in the laws covering immigration:

"That it shall be lawful to import skilled labor when the person importing cannot obtain laborers of a like kind in this country who will work for him at the rate of wages prevailing generally.

"That the Secretary of Commerce and Labor be authorized and directed upon the application of any employer and upon his showing the facts as set forth, to grant such person permission to import such labor, permission to be contingent upon his right to do so and upon the rights of the aliens to land.

"That warrants for the arrest and deportation of aliens who have landed be issued only by an United States Commissioner or United States Judge and then only upon such sworn complaints as are now necessary to criminal cases.

"That aliens be given speedy trials and the right of appeal to the United States District Court, as in the case of Chinese and to higher courts and trials to be conducted as in criminal cases, except as to a jury."

**GIMLET PIERCES  
INTO MAN'S HEART**

Brockville, May 18--"Wiltwick Point," the summer home of Dr. Lefebvre, of New York, twenty miles west of here, on the St. Lawrence River, was the scene of a terrible accident with fatal results on Sunday morning. Richard Adams, aged 55, a resident of Rockford, was the victim.

Adams and Edward Furness, of Alexandria Bay, was engaged in fitting out a motor boat for Dr. Lefebvre, Adams, to get into the craft, which was tied alongside a dock, had to descend a ladder. In doing so he fell. Mr. Furness, who was in the boat, had a gimlet in his hand, and before he knew what had happened, Adams, in his fall, struck against the gimlet, which pierced his heart. He fell backward with a groan, but never uttered a word. Furness, who was dumb-founded at what had happened, called for assistance, at the same time holding the unconscious form of Adams in his hands. Three minutes after the accident, he was relieved by Wm. Luther, of Kow's Corner. Dr. Shaw, of Lansdowne, decided an inquest was unnecessary.

Two years in Kingston penitentiary was the sentence of John McAuley, given by His Honor Judge McDonald. McAuley is a Scotchman, 24 years old, and until his arrest engaged as a farm hand. Two weeks ago he pleaded guilty to a serious charge preferred by Wm. Luther, of Kow's Corner's father of a girl under sixteen.

Wm. Brown, coachman, 27 years, who has hitherto borne a good reputation, was placed under arrest on a charge of stealing bicycles. A series of these thefts had been perpetrated within the past two years. Shortly after his removal, and while being removed to the jail, Brown made a complete confession to Chief Burke. Six of the wheels have been recovered. Brown, upon accomplishing a theft, would change parts of a machine, so that identification could not be made.

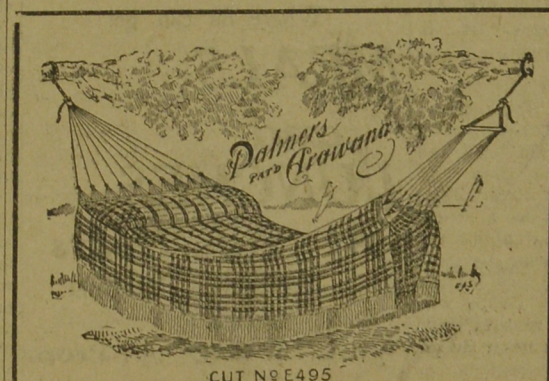
