Basketball**SOMETHING NEW IN  
RACING ORGANIZATION**

New York Trotting-horse Breeder's Club Includes Some of Wealthiest Horsemen of United States.

The new racing organization in New York is called the Trotting-horse Breeders' Club, and back of it are some of the prominent, wealthy and influential horse fanciers of the United States, among them W. C. Brown, president of the New York Central railroad, and who is going to campaign a few horses in the grand circuit this season for the first time.

Gen. Brayton Ives, president of the Metropolitan Trust Company and owner of the Kentucky Futurity winner, Baroness Virginia, 2.08½; W. E. D. Stokes, owner of Peter the Great, 2.07½; and breeder of the champion yearling trotter Miss Stokes, 2.13½; W. B. Dickerman, formerly president of the New York stock exchange and breeder of four trotters with records of 2.10 or better; William Simpson, who owns a 100 acre stock farm in New York and who paid \$50,000 for the trotting stallion McKinney, 2.11½; E. T. Bedford of the Standard Oil Company, who bred Hamburg Belle, 2.01½; John H. Shults, who has spent more than \$1,000,000 in the last 20 years to gratify his liking for the trotters; William Bradley, owner of the largest stud of trotting horses in the east; Jacob Rupert, owner of Oakland Baron, 2.09½, and the Poughkeepsie track; J. Howard Ford, president of the Orange County driving park and owner of the famous Stony Ford stud; James A. Murphy, owner of Star Pointer, 1.59½, the first harness horse to beat 2.00; James McClenahan, formerly president of the Mutual Bank and owner of Wilteen, 2.15½; James Butler, owner of the Empire track and breeder of Ann Direct, 2.10, and A. H. Cosden, owner of Vito, 2.12½; and formerly president of the Road Drivers' Association of New York.

Formed on the lines of the American hackney horse society and the English societies for improving the various breeds of British horses, the trotting horse breeders' club is a purely uncommercial organization, its constitution providing that "the income at the club, from whatever source derived, shall be applied solely toward the promotion of the objects of the club, and no portion thereof shall be paid or transferred directly or indirectly, by way of dividend, bonus, or otherwise howsoever by way of profit to the members of the club or any of them."

A city clubhouse, where resident members and breeders from all parts of the country can come together to talk horses when in New York, is planned, to be opened next fall, shortly after the grand circuit meeting.

Kerr, however, with characteristic modesty states that Cloughen is too good a man for him at either the 100 or 220 yards.

**SPORT****FLYNN HAD CHANCE  
BUT DID NOT TAKE IT**

"Porky" was Poorly Advised and was Really Beaten by Ketchel's Reputation.

Accounts of the Ketchel-Flynn bout in the Boston papers are to the effect that Flynn had an excellent chance to put the middleweight champion out, but failed to avail himself of it.

One report of the fight is as follows:

It was the name and fame of Stanley Ketchel, world's middleweight champion, that defeated Porky Flynn at the Armory A. A. last night. Ketchel won by a knockout in the third round, after handing Flynn a severe beating in the closing minute of the second and in the third round.

But Flynn had his own chance to win, and had he been properly advised might have sent Ketchel to the mat in the first round, which would have at least given him courage to go ahead.

## FLYNN COULD REACH.

In the first round Flynn outboxed Ketchel. The champion is a great rushing fighter, but a wild swinger, and it developed at the start that Flynn could jab lefts to the face and that Ketchel couldn't get away from them. Ketchel tore in like a wild man, but whenever Porky straightened out his left it landed on the Ketchel back and stopped him.

But Porky was nervous and not sure of himself. He acted as if he couldn't believe that he could hit the "Assassin" at all, let alone outbox him. Ketchel's seconds were worried. "We're up against a tough one," said Jimmy Kelly. Then Flynn managed to slip a left hook to Flynn's nose that started the blood. Flynn backed away. Ketchel tore in, and hurt Porky with a wicked left hook to the stomach as he closed.

## DIDN'T FOLLOW UP.

But Porky was not done. He jabbed Ketchel's face again, and then slipped a right hook to the jaw. Ketchel's hands dropped and his knees rocked. But instead of following up his advantage, Flynn stood there as if he were nailed. Ketchel was in prime condition and recovered instantly. He tore after Flynn like a wild man and at the end had Porky weak and hanging on.

Flynn came up strong for the second round and started jabbing at Ketchel's face. For half the round he had Ketchel swinging wildly. But Ketchel was getting in a hard left to the body every time they closed in a clinch, and every time it landed Flynn gasped. Driven into a neutral corner, Flynn went down from a light left to the head. He got right up, but Ketchel was after him, and Flynn was weak and hanging on at the end.

The finish came in the third. Ketchel started to wind it up and soon had Flynn going. Flynn went down for six counts from a clip on the jaw and a little later Ketchel drove him to the ropes, whipped a right to the head and followed with a left hook to the pit of the stomach, and Referee Maffit Flaberty tolled off the fatal ten over Porky.

**OXFORD'S RUGBY TOUR  
WILL COST SOMETHING**

Some more particulars of the proposed visit of the Oxford University Rugby team to Canada have been learned. The trip, it seems, will be a big thing to finance and it is estimated that the total expenses for a tour covering about three weeks stay in Canada would amount to something like \$11,350.

It is proposed to play seven games in Canada and each of the seven clubs played will be asked to put up a guarantee of \$1,650.

The Canadian end of the tour is being conducted by Frank Dods, of Winnipeg, representing the British Amateur Rugby Union of Manitoba. The Oxford University end of the business is being negotiated by R. V. Stanley the representative of the University of Oxford on the board of the English Rugby Union.

With that guarantee there is not much chance of Oxford playing in these parts.

Willie Lewis' agreement to box Stanley Ketchel in Tom O'Rourke's New York club on May 27 robbed the Armory A. A. of a bout between Mike ("Twin") Sullivan and Willie Lewis on May 31. They will probably meet at the Boston club at a later date.
