Bishop of London Preached Urging Missionary Effort

Urged Greater Church Activity -- Forty-Two Anglican Clergymen Including Six Bishops Were in Attendance -- Music of Service Striking Feature.

The concluding service of the Bicentenary Festival of the Church of England in Canada held last evening at Christ Church Cathedral was attended by a congregation which taxed the seating capacity of the edifice to the utmost. Admission to the church was by ticket and many were unable to secure admission. The sermon of the evening was by His Lordship, the Rt. Hon. and Rt. Rev. Bishop of London who preached upon Natural Religion and strongly urged that the church of England in Canada perform its duty by evangelizing the thousands of immigrants annually coming in the Dominion. His Lordship employed a style of speaking which was simple but most effective. Forty-two clergymen of various Anglican bodies took part in the service. In the number were included six bishops—Bishop of London, Bishop of Glasgow, Bishop of Washington, Bishop of Niagara, Bishop of Glasgow, Bishop of Niagara, Bishop of Fredericton and Assistant Bishop of Toronto. Prayers were taken by Very Rev. Dean Schofield of Christ Church Cathedral and by Rev. E. B. Hooper rector of St. Paul's (Valley) Church, St. John. His Lordship the Bishop of Fredericton pronounced the benediction. The first lesson was read by the Bishop of Washington, the second by the Bishop of Glasgow.

One of the striking features of the service was the music. The choir of the Cathedral had been augmented for the occasion by chosen singers from other choirs of the city and the Fredericton Brass Band under the leadership of Bandmaster George H. Offen assisted the organist Mr. Farrer in playing the accompaniment for the anthem and hymns.

The procession as it entered the cathedral by the west entrance with the numerous clergy in their robes made a most striking picture.

The clergymen of the other denominations of the city and vicinity were present seats near the front having been reserved for them.

THE SERMON

His Lordship preached from John 14:6; "Jesus said I am the way and the truth and the life."

"Some of you may remember," said the preacher, "that in one of Browning's most famous poems there

is depicted a young girl who has but one holiday in the year. She takes it one beautiful spring morning. The poet makes Pippa, as he calls her, sing."

His Lordship quoted the lines from "Pippa Passes," ending with, "God's in His heaven all's well with the world."

"That is perhaps the most beautiful May morning song in the world, full of natural religion. It made all the wicked people good, turned the vicious man from his way and made better every one who heard it."

"This natural religion is founded on a foundational truth. We have had too much railing against God for the cruelty in Nature."

"Nature armed with tooth and claw shrieks after her creed."

"I often wondered how so great a man as Tennyson could write those lines. Nature does not shriek against her creed."

"As I came up your beautiful river, the most beautiful river I have ever seen, I was pleased to think that the agreement of nature was not merely seeming."

HAPPINESS OUTWEIGHS GRIEF

"I have spent seven years in the East End of London, I can say that even there the happiness outweighs the pain nine to one. If that is so in East London, how much more must it be true of what I have learned to call 'happy Canada.'"

"Look back over your own lives, and you will find that for every hour of grief you have had ninety-nine of joy. In St. John yesterday I spoke to a great congregation and called God the Great Giver, and he is O, the ingratitude of men! 'Blow! blow! thou winter wind, Thou art not so unkind As man's ingratitude.'"

THREE WANTS

"Suppose yourself to be in old England on such a beautiful autumn day as this was, absolutely ignorant of religion. What would be your three wants?"

"First you would want to know how you were to get from this experience to that beyond. You would want the Way. You would also want the Truth. You would want to know what was in the Beyond, to have something more than an instinct for immortality. Again you would want Life. You would want to drink from the River of Life that flows from the throne of God."

"So if you were on your own river you would want the Way, the Truth and the Life."

"Brother Bishops, in thinking of what I would give as the message of the last service of your Bicentenary celebration, I thought I would let Jesus Christ preach his own sermon. He has said, 'When I came to earth and died I became the Way * * * I am the Truth for he who has seen me has seen God. * * * I am the Life for he that believeth in me even though he be dead yet shall he live.'"

HOW DO WE STAND.

"Now first of all how do we stand with God? It is always well to begin with ourselves. How do we stand with regard to the way? One great trouble with the Christian religion is that it has been under-rated. The first guide to the Way is Repentance. Other guides are Faith, Hope, Love and there are still other posts which have been sunk in the swamp of despair to guide the wanderer back to the Way. Come back and tread it more perfectly."

"Then there is the Truth. The Truth is a mystery and a mystery is a revealed secret. God has stooped and whispered to his child five secrets."

"There is a person behind the veil who loves you. * * * All things work together for good to those who love me * * * Sin can be forgiven * * * There is a pardoning grace, * * * Yes, there is a life to come. 'God has given you a treasure. I do long to make you love your treasure to weep over it, pray over it. Every time you come to pray you put your lips to the Fountain of Life and drink freely.'"

MISSIONARY EFFORT.

"There are thousands in my London alone who know nothing about the Truth. Do you think there are none such among the thousands sweeping through to the Northwest? Do you think your beautiful Cathedral which reminds me so much of the Old Land, is for you alone? This should be a missionary church."

"We must have Faith, we must have undaunted Hope and evangelize Canada. The church needs a revival. It needs to develop into an active militant body spreading its influence abroad wherever needed. Go forward and try to make your Church of England in Canada such a Church as that and as you go forward in your missionary zeal will you lose your

faith in life? No because you will have the assurance that it will be yours for ever."

"Then you can say with Browning's Pippa, God's in his heaven, All's well with the world."

ARRIVED YESTERDAY

The episcopal party came from St. John by the River St. John Commodore Thomson of the Royal Kennebecasis Yacht Club of St. John having put his magnificent steam yacht Corinthia at the disposal of the bishops. The latter were delighted with the sail on the river and with the scenery.

The Corinthia reached Fredericton at about 4.15 yesterday afternoon and docked at the Star Line wharf. The visitors were taken by motor cars and carriages to the homes of those whose guests they are while in Fredericton. On their arrival here, they were welcomed by Dean Schofield Sub-Dean Street and the sidesmen of the Cathedral.

The Corinthia lay at anchor off the B. & B. Club House last night and returned to St. John today.

Bishop Taylor-Smith Chaplain General of the British Forces who was one of the party which arrived on the Corinthia yesterday left for Montreal by C.P.R. at 5.50 o'clock.

GRAIN MOVEMENT NOW

FELT IN THE WEST

Montreal, Sept. 12.—Winnipeg reports to Bradstreet's say the grain movement is now beginning to make itself felt as a factor in general conditions there throughout the West, and there may be some interference

in the movement of fall goods. Up to now large shipments have been arriving from the East, and it is understood storekeepers are pretty well supplied with likely requirements for the next month or so. The end of the summer season finds stocks of light goods well cleared up, and later fall ordering is likely to be correspondingly good. Latest threshing reports are encouraging and the out-look for fall trade is good in nearly all districts.
