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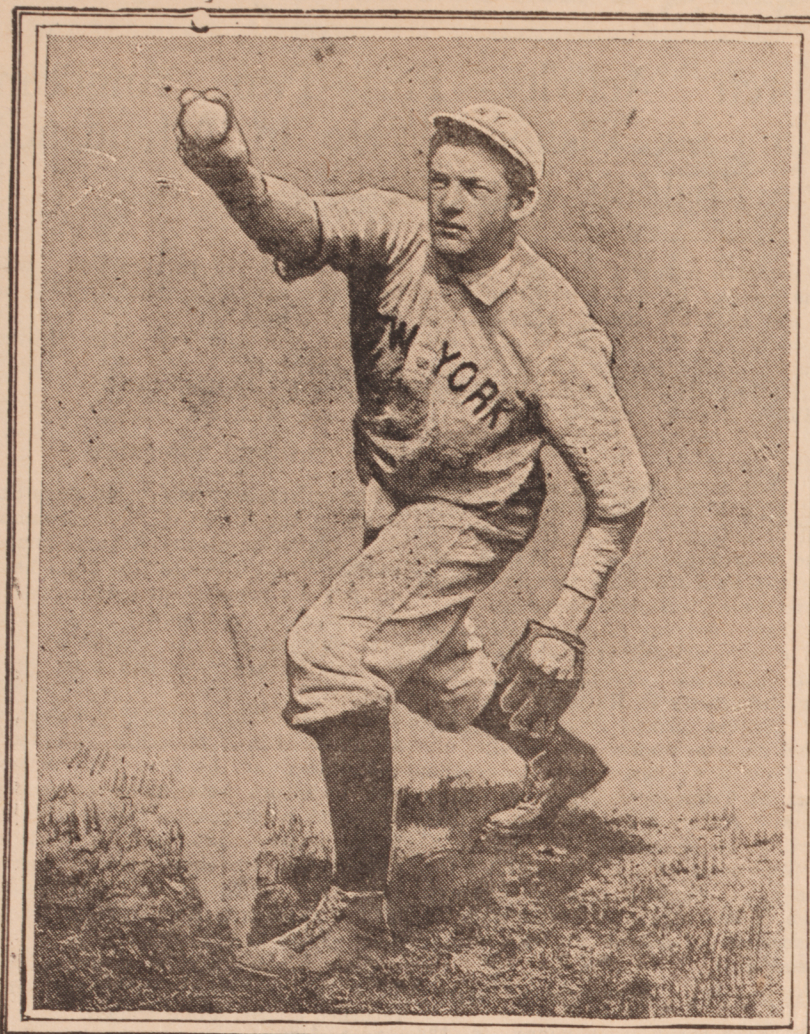

Syracuse, N.Y., Sept. 12--The Abbe unbeaten this year, won his eighth victory of the season today, in capturing the Syracuse stake, the feature of the opening day of the grand circuit races in connection with the week's exhibition of the New York State Fair. Ed. Geers had no trouble in sending the black whirlwind through for a three-heat victory. Lady Isle was a stubborn contender in the first two heats and in the second forced the Geers entry, for the latter part of the journey to his best clip, traveling the final quarter in 29 flat, and landing a bare length in front of Lady Isle.  
The Ka-Noo-No stake for young 2.25 trotters went to Lionello in straight heats. The 2.18 trot result was a triumph of endurance for Henry Winters.

## DARING AVIATOR FLIES OVER LONDON

Noon Day Crowd Watch Him Circle the Dome of St. Paul's Traffic Blocked by the Enthusiastic Crowds.

London, Sept. 12--Aviator Willows made a sensational aeroplane flight over the city of London, Saturday, steered over Trafalgar square and St. James' Park, circled the historical tower of St. Paul's Cathedral and cut all manner of aerial capers while thousands of onlookers became wildly excited.  
Starting from Crystal Palace shortly before noon, Willows steered his machine over the very heart of the city and the noon crowds in the streets were electrified at the strange spectacle of the man-bird soaring above the roofs of buildings.  
Traffic came to a halt in the busy streets, and thousands crowded the streets and parks, gazing upward at the daring aeronaut.

SWEPT A GREAT CIRCLE  
The aviator traversed the entire city, sweeping in a great circle above the housetops. After crossing the length of London he circled back towards Crystal Palace, while beneath him the roofs became black with people.  
The police had a difficult time in handling the crowds. The streets became so jammed that busses and tram cars had to halt. Street crossings were blocked, and for a time traffic was suspended throughout the busiest thoroughfare.

As Willows sailed gracefully around the dome above St. Paul's the crowds in the streets were hushed into an awed silence. But later this gave way to the wildest of scenes when the aviator dipped towards the earth at the end of his daring voyage.  
As the aviator commenced his voyage from the Crystal Palace, the news sped like wildfire through the city.

### THOUSANDS TO THE SCENE

The crowds about the starting place were augmented by hundreds and thousands. As it became evident that the aeronaut would be successful in his daring undertaking the crowds in the streets broke all bounds.  
When Willows landed he was nearly mobbed by the enthusiastic crowds and the best police had difficulty in protecting him.

with the Hudson Bay Railway. The western farmers have declared again and again for this method of management and have repeatedly announced their disinclination to accept anything else. It will be strange if these organizations do not find a spokesman among the western members, likely to arise out of the four though no representations have been made in regard to it. This is forest protection. Forest fires have been considerably in evidence, and the need of some such measure has been forcibly impressed upon the mind of the Premier. He it is understood made careful inquiries into the conditions of the problem, and the Government legislative programme will probably include provision for the prevention of fires, as far as possible. This legislation would, of course, apply only to Dominion Crown lands, and co-ordinate legislation by the provinces would be necessary. Accordingly a conference between the Dominion and the provinces on the subject is quite within the bounds of probability.
