"JOHN BULL, HIS FAULTS AND VIRTUES," SUBJECT OF BISHOP

Canadian Club Heard Bishop of London Give Most Instructive Address--Made Plea For Greater Missionary Effort and Imperial Unity.

The Y.M.C.A. Hall was filled during the noon-hour today by men of all classes desirous of hearing the address of His Lordship the Bishop of London. The address was given under the auspices of the Canadian Club but many who are not members heard it. His Lordship took as his subject "John Bull, his Faults and Virtues. In a half-hour's address he outlined those faults and virtues and urged his hearers as Canadians to avoid John Bull's faults but to copy and improve upon his virtues.

The meeting opened at 12.30. President C. F. Chestnut of the Canadian Club took the chair. Introducing the speaker, the chairman said that the Church of England was an ancient organization but that if the Bishop of London could be taken as a guide it was modern in every way. (Applause)

THE BISHOP SPEAKS.

In his opening remarks, His Lordship explained that his flushed appearance was not due to the breaking of a thirty year pledge but to the fact that he just came from a terrible struggle, bishops, versus deans on the tennis court (laughter)

JOHN BULL'S FAULTS.

He proceeded to discuss "John Bull his faults and virtues" First fault was shyness (Laughter) That shyness was often misunderstood. Another was his self-depreciation. Some countries were inclined to take that self-depreciation of John Bull seriously, and think that he was a back number and bless your heart, John Bull never felt himself more vigorous" said His Lordship (Laughter and Applause)

In Canada one fault found with the Englishman was that he knew all about everything when he came out here (Laughter.)

John Bull was all right said His Lordship but he drank too much. His annual drink bill would go a long way toward relieving the needs of the poor and destitute.

He had been pleased to observe that Canada was temperate (Applause) Another weakness was that John Bull desired to make himself comfortable. (Laughter)

HIS VIRTUES.

Then the bishop came to John Bull's virtues. First was his generosity. What was keeping Canada prosperous? The iron wall of the British navy. (Applause) And who paid for that navy. John Bull! He grumbled but he paid.

The Congo atrocities had attracted attention but it was practically only in John Bull's island that public opinion concerning those atrocities had been really roused.

Another of John's virtues was his honesty. That honesty sometimes brought him losses, but it was better to be John Bull whose word was as good as his bond than to be otherwise. (Applause)

Dogged perseverance was another virtue John Bull often made this most ridiculous mistakes but as some one so aptly had said he always muddled through.

"Whenever I see a map of the world with its red band around it I feel proud that so much responsibility has been entrusted to John Bull" said His Lordship amid applause.

The speaker referred to his predecessor Bishop Crichton who although a

bishop was a very level headed man. (Laughter) Bishop Crichton had said that the British nation was the most prodigious organization in the world. Lastly John Bull was very fond of his sons. England's attitude toward Canada was that of a proud father to a growing son. England wanted to see Canada with a hundred million people.

TO CANADIANS.

The bishop said he wanted Canadians to disbelieve any stories coming from the south to the effect that John Bull was played out. He wanted them to avoid his faults, and improve upon his virtues. He has not noticed any tendency to self-depreciation nor any shyness (Applause) Let a Canadian's word be as good as his bond.

His Lordship urged that all denominations work together. Until the day came as it would, when there would be one great church, there must be denominations. He had been pleased to observe the manner in which the denominations in Canada helped one another.

Canada should be the greatest missionary nation of the world for she had the opportunity. That had been one fault of John Bull he had not been a great enough missionary.

Appreciate and improve upon John Bull's virtues, avoid his faults and there will be nothing to prevent Canada from becoming the greatest nation of the world. (Applause)

GARDEN PARTY.

This afternoon there is to be a garden party at Frogmore the residence of Mr. A. H. F. Randolph, which will be attended by the episcopal party. All church-people have also been invited. The Bishop of London will deliver an address and it is expected that the Bishop of Washington and the Bishop of Niagara will also speak. The party is to begin at three o'clock but it is not likely that the peaking will begin until four.

This morning two exciting sets were played on the local tennis court. In one the Bishop of London and the Bishop of Fredericton defeated the Dean of Quebec and the Dean of Fredericton and in the other the Bishop of London

NORMAN L. McDONALD
POPULAR HOTEL MAN
HAS PASSED AWAY

The End Came on Monday Afternoon After Lingerin Illness--Was a Native of P. E. Island.

Mr. Norman L. McDonald, a well known citizen for many years in the hotel business here, died at his home on Odell Avenue at five o'clock last night. He was a sufferer from kidney trouble and had been in failing health for some months. Mr. McDonald was a native of Charlottetown, but had been a resident of Fredericton for thirty-five years. For a long time when the late Mr. J. B. Grieves was proprietor of the Waverly Hotel he was employed by him as clerk and upon the death of Mr. Grieves he entered into partnership with Mr. Thomas Feeney and took over the management of the hotel. A few years later they purchased the Lorne hotel on Regent street and conducted it until the spring of this year when Mr. McDonald disposed of his interest and retired. He afterwards purchased a grocery business on Northumberland street but recently, on account of failing health he was obliged to sell out.

The late Mr. McDonald was fifty four years of age and is survived by a widow, three daughters and one son. He was a prominent member of the Orange order and has also actively identified with the Fredericton Society of St. Andrew.

During his long career in the hotel business Mr. McDonald by his genial manner and kindness of heart made many warm friends and his death is deeply regretted on all sides.

The funeral will take place at three o'clock on Wednesday and will be attended by the members of the St. Andrew and Orange order. Rev. Dr. Smith will conduct the services and interment will be made in the Rural cemetery.
