

# LORD ROSEBERRY SCORES GOVERNMENT

Manchester, Dec. 1.—Lord Roseberry's political matinee on Wednesday afternoon proved to be entertaining, and becoming to the man of tone, furrow and non-party auspices. The meeting was held in the Free Trade Hall, which is just within a stone's throw of the Bright and Gladstone monuments, and on the platform used by Bright and Cobden.

Sir Alfred Hopkins, a distinguished free trade advocate, was chairman. The former premier's ironical references to the new Liberalism, with street corner eloquence, elicited applause, but his statement that Irish dictation was making Great Britain a nation of slaves aroused turbulence and was met with cries of "rotten and no politics."

Mention of Mr. Lloyd George's Mile End speech brought a clamor of three cheers for the Chancellor of the Exchequer, which was substantially given and repeated.

Lord Roseberry's argument was that the government's veto bill meant really a single chamber, because it gives the Commons power to abolish altogether the House of Lords. The House of Commons, elected for five years, would be absolutely all powerful for three. "The United States," said Lord Roseberry, "would not change the slightest jot in its constitution on a snap election."

"Do you advocate the American constitution?" asked a heckler.

"The House of Commons should predominate, but should not be absolutely unchecked," was the reply. "Instead of dissolution," continued Lord Roseberry, "there should have

been another and larger conference on the basis of the House of Lords' resolutions. The House of Lords had surrendered the hereditary principle, which, therefore, no longer was an issue."

In Northwest Manchester the most spectacular individual contest of the whole campaign is being waged by Mr. Bonar Law, a New Brunswicker, who relinquished the Dulwich division of Camberwell, where he was elected in the last general elections by a majority of 2,418, at the request of Mr. A. J. Balfour, to carry the banner of protection into free trade Lancashire. This district in January last returned all Liberals, save one, in twenty-three constituencies. Mr. Law has been described to me as more protectionist than Tory, who would for tariff reform give home rule without blinking, though since coming to Manchester he has been inclined to speak softly of protection.

Mr. Balfour's sensational shelving of tariff reform was emphasized by Lord Roseberry yesterday as designed to reconcile the Lancashire free-traders.

Indeed, the Unionist protectionist organ, the "Morning Post," is again disgruntled with its prey and describes it as an "election dodge." The "Courier," the local Unionist organ, the "Morning Post," is again greatest delight here.

Mr. Law is regarded as having an even chance. He is a man of great abilities and substance; is well liked by the business men, and the only man who, it is said, could win the riding from Sir George Kemp, a local cotton magnate, who was elected in January by a majority of 783.

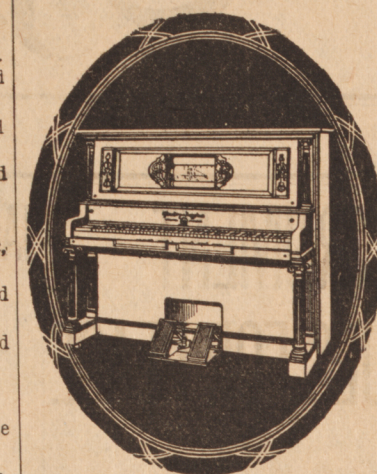
