New Bank of New Brunswick Building to be Opened Monday

Magnificent Structure Recently Completed---Furnished and Equipped in Most Modern Style--Safety-Deposit Vault a Feature of the New Building.

The new building which will house the local branch of the Bank of New Brunswick will be opened to the public at ten o'clock Monday morning. At that time the transfer from the present bank premises on York Street will be completed and the staff will be ready to conduct business in the new building.

The new premises of the Bank of New Brunswick are a credit to that institution and to the city. The situation of the new building on the south side of Queen Street midway between York and Carleton Streets, could hardly be improved upon. The appearance of that portion of Queen Street has been greatly improved by the erection of the new building, particularly as the wooden buildings which had occupied the site had been an eyesore for many years.

FINE APPEARANCE.

The new Bank of New Brunswick building has a frontage of twenty-seven feet and a depth of seventy-five feet. The building in general appearance corresponds to the other branch buildings which this bank has erected in different places in the province. Its front is of cut free-stone, from the Shediak quarries, with a five-foot base of grey Spoon Island granite from the quarries of B. Mooney & Son. The main entrance is in the centre of the front. Four fluted Ionic pillars, with carved capitals, two on each side of the entrance, extend from the ground to the pediment. The latter bears in its centre the coat-of-arms of the province, carved in stone. Above the main entrance to the building is a large window fitted with prism glass, which will help to light the interior. On each side of the entrance are lanterns of wrought iron, of handsome design.

THE INTERIOR.

Immediately inside the entrance the doors of which will have panels of ground glass, bearing the provincial coat-of-arms is a vestibule. From it entrance is to be had to the main office. This is 25 feet in width, 52 in length and 23 in height. The portion reserved for the public is 40 feet by 13. The floor of this part is laid mosaic. The wainscoting is of American quarter-oak on a base of green Tennessee marble.

The portion of the office reserved for the use of the bank staff is floored with hardwood.

Ionic pillars of quarter-oak are striking features of the main room. Five three-quarter pillars are on the sides of the room extending the full height and supporting the roof beams. Four smaller pillars are beneath each of the two galleries, which are at the ends of the main room. This room is lighted mainly by three large panels in the ceiling which are filled with art-glass.

The office furnishings are of American quarter-oak, with lack-lustre finish. These were supplied by the Canadian Office and School Furniture Company, Limited, of Preston, Ont.

At the rear of the main room are the manager's private room, cloak-room, toilet-room, book-vault and stairway leading to the gallery. Beneath the front gallery is the telephone room. An iron spiral stairway leads to this gallery. The rear gallery contains the safety-deposit vault three coupon-rooms and stationery-room.

THE VAULTS.

The two vaults which are one above the other were manufactured by the Mosler Safe Manufacturing Company, of Boston. The safety deposit vault contains 231 safety-deposit boxes and is the first vault of its kind to be installed in this city. It is furnished with a time-lock in addition to having two combinations. The book-vault is also a fine specimen of the safe-maker's art, although not furnished with a time-lock. The vaults are floored with white hexagonal tiles and the safety-deposit vault is lined with 5-ply steel plates. The dimensions are 15 by 7 1/2 feet.

The outer wall is of brick, twelve inches thick. Within this is a 2-inch air space. There is an inner wall, eight inches thick and a wall of 12-inch concrete containing 56-pound rails placed vertically eight inches apart and crossed at right angles by

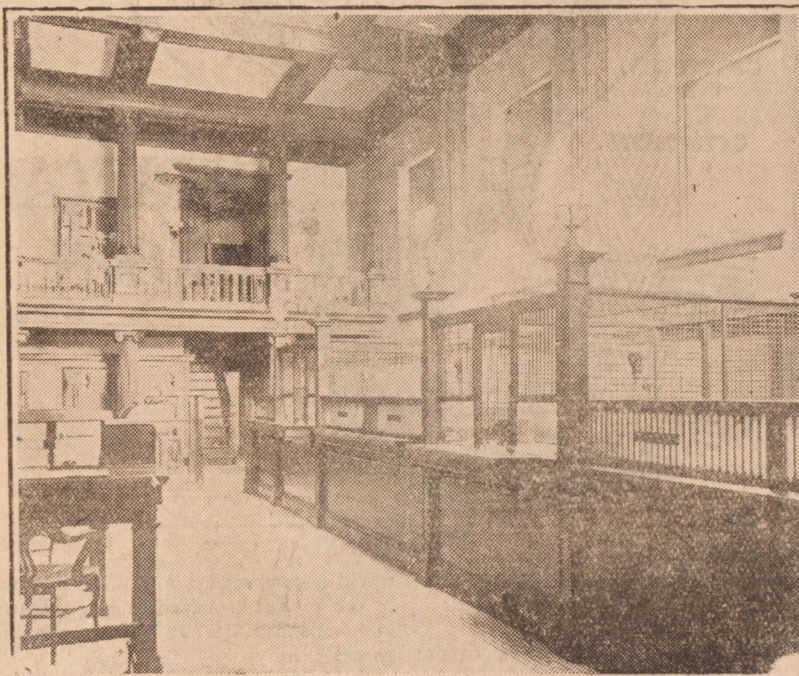
DIRECTORS.

The directors of the Bank of New Brunswick are Mr. James Manchester, (president), Dr. W. W. White, (vice president), Mr. Francis P. Starr, Col. G. West Jones, Mr. Chas. P. Baker and Mr. Thomas McAvity. Mr. R. B. Kes- sen is the general manager.

The Bank's paid up capital at the end of last year was \$755,500, and it has since been increased by an issue of new stock. The rest fund amounts to \$1,347,125, which is nearly double the amount of capital stock.

The total assets of the Bank on Dec 1st were \$8,887,780.29. It has deposits amounting to \$4,641,626.35, bearing interest, and \$1,128,883.31 not bearing interest. The loans and discounts made by the bank last year amounted to \$5,724,756.43.

For several years the bank has paid a dividend of thirteen per cent., which is the largest disbursement made by

iron bars 1 1/2 inches in diameter.

The doors of the vaults, like the electric fixtures and all brass-work about the building, have a "verde-antique" finish. The building is lighted by electricity and heated by hot water.

A GREAT INSTITUTION.

BRANCHES.

It is only a few years ago when Mr. W. B. Stavert was general manager, that the Bank of New Brunswick began to open branches, and it now has twenty-two in the three Maritime Provinces, including three in the city of St. John. The branches are at Campbellton, Chipman, East Florenceville, Fairville, Fredericton, Grand Manan, Hillsboro, Moncton, Norton, Petitcodiac, Riverside and Sussex, in this province; Charlottetown, Kensington, O'Leary and Summerside, in P. E. Island, and at Aylesford, Halifax and New Glasgow, in Nova Scotia.

LOCAL BRANCH.

The Fredericton branch was opened in 1906, soon after the People's Bank was absorbed by the Bank of Montreal. Mr. C. H. Lee, now of the head office staff, was the first manager, and was succeeded two years ago by Mr. W. E. Jardine, who is still in charge. The latter, although a young man, has proved himself to be a most efficient banker, and is popular with all classes in the community. The bank established itself in the Pitts Building, on York Street, but steadily expanding business has compelled it to seek more modern and commodious quarters.

Sir George Doughty Tells Toronto Canadian Club it Must Come

Toronto, Sept. 22.—Sir George Doughty, ex-M. P. of Grimsby, England addressed the Canadian Club yesterday and made the most eloquent and convincing appeal for Imperialism the club has yet received.

Sir George predicted that in the himself intensely proud of having the right to call himself a British subject with an interest in all that is making Canada strong today, went on to advocate strongly an Imperial Parliament, and to declare that as Canada became richer and her interests widened it would be necessary for her to have a voice in the councils of the Empire. It must come to pass, he declared.

Sir George predicted that in the near future a preference would be given colonial products over the products of every other nation in the British markets.
