### INDEPENDENCE BOY COVERED MILE IN 2.04 1-4 AT COLUMBUS

Took His Race in Straight Heats—Was Not Pressed Hard—Scintia Won 2.15

Columbus, Ohio, Sept. 23—Faster than any other race this week of grand circuit racing was today's 2:07 pace, which Independence Boy, winner Monday and again Tuesday took in straight heats. He made 2:04 1/4 the second heat, the third one being in 2:04 1/2. Ruth D., beat W. A., the original favorite out of the place. Neither made Independence Boy exert himself.

Scintia from Hartford, Conn., was favorite for the 2:15 trot and did not have any particular opposition. Fred F., first choice over Dirl, and the other 2:13 pacers, won in 2:06 1/2, in the first heat to lead Wiss Peeler home. He broke inside the distance post. The time and Dirl was first. Fred F. took the third heat in slow time and the race was forced to go over until Saturday.

BIG BALLOON RACE ENDED.

Indianapolis, Ind., Sept. 23—The last of the thirteen balloons which started in the American championship and free-for-all races at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway last Saturday afternoon, has landed.

"I have never made a voyage in which so many adverse conditions were encountered," said Captain Baldwin, of the balloon "New York." "We encountered hot sun, cold winds, thunder, lightning and rain in rapid succession. About noon Sunday we encountered one of the worst thunder storms I have ever met with in the upper air. Only by soaring above it at a height of three and a half miles did we avert the danger of being struck by lightning. It was a magnificent spectacle as we were carried along above it."

"JIMMIE" MURPHY HAS  
RETURNED TO NEW BEDFORD

The St. Croix Courier bids farewell to "Jimmie" Murphy of New Bedford Mass., and incidentally gives a brief history of the development of the St. Stephen baseball team. The Courier does it thuswise:—"Jimmie" Murphy left us Tuesday evening for his home in New Bedford, and his departure meant the severance of the ties with early ball playing in St. Stephen until last year, when a local league was formed that played an interesting series of games on the limited area of the Marks street school ground. Encouraged by the talent then developed, we reached out for something a little better this season and matters were placed in the hands of Clifford Vanstone, Wallace Grant, Jas. E. Lindsay, Earl Hyslop, M. W. McCormick and Herbert Maxwell, and the splendid ball that we have this year enjoyed was secured through the efforts of these young men, backed by the Thistle Athletic Association.

The original intention was to secure a coach and for this purpose Eddie Ramsey came down from St. John. His stay was brief, though nobody ever knew just why. It was a case of the coach's choice, Mr. Ramsey leaving without formal notice and presumably because he found life away from the city a little slow.

Then it was decided to secure a battery and Henry Gero and Jimmie Murphy came down from New Bedford on the recommendation of James Shanks. Mr. Gero did the pitching and Mr. Murphy the catching.

Soon afterwards Mr. Murphy had to return to his home to complete his school examinations for he was just leaving the high school to enter college in the fall.

On his return he brought with him two friends, Mr. Hurley and Mr. Fredette, who came only to visit but who could play ball so well that the local management made arrangements to retain them for the season. Mr. Gero was later released, going first to St. John and later to the Canadian west. He was replaced by Mr. Carter who has done splendid work in the pitcher's box. Mr. Covey, who has been a tower of strength to the local management was engaged to catch for Mr. Carter and the present team has been built up around these players.

Mr. Murphy who has returned to New Bedford preparatory to entering college, carries with him the respect and good wishes of a host of friends on the border. He was a gentleman on or off the ball field, as well as a good player. His place of business was generally at second base or short stop.

It was much regretted that during his stay here his right hand was so injured in two of the games that one joint of one finger had to be amputated, throwing him out of the game for several weeks.
