WILL COMPLETE
THEIR CONTRACT
IN SIX WEEKS

Toronto Construction Company Rushing Operations on the Transcontinental—Seven Hundred Men at Work.

Mr. George S. Deeks, president of the Toronto Construction Company, is at the Queen on his way home from a trip to the company's headquarters at McGivney Junction. Talking to a Mail representative, Mr. Deeks said that good progress was being made with the company's contract on the Transcontinental, and if the weather continues favorable, they hope to finish in six or seven weeks. They now have the road completed and ballasted from Chipman to McGivney, a distance of about forty miles. There is considerable yet to be done at Napadogan, the divisional point, and two steel bridges are to be erected across the Miramichi river. The abutments, however, are already completed, and trains are crossing the river by means of wooden trestles. There is still considerable ballasting yet to be done between McGivney and Plaster Rock. The company now have a total of seven hundred men at work on their contract. The work of laying the sidings at Napadogan is progressing satisfactorily.

DEFENDANT WON IN
KESWICK ASSAULT CASE

The only case of local interest before the Supreme Court in which judgment was delivered yesterday was O'burn H. Allen vs. Brooks Edmundston. This was an action for assault, tried in the York County Court before Judge Forbes, in October last, and in which a verdict was rendered for the plaintiff.

The defendant appealed on the ground of excessive damages and improper charge of Judge Forbes to the jury.

The Supreme Court, by a unanimous judgment, ordered the verdict to be set aside with costs to be paid by the plaintiff. The parties both reside at Keswick.

THREE U. N. B. MEN
WILL ENTER MISSION
FIELD IN FEW MONTHS

Rev. Malcolm L. Orchard, Rev. James W. Howe and Rev. A. H. Barker, Each to Different Country.

The University of New Brunswick will within the next few months send three of her graduates to foreign mission fields. Each will go to a different country and two will leave within a fortnight for the scene of their labors. The intending missionaries are Rev. James W. Howe, Rev. Malcolm L. Orchard and Rev. Archibald H. Barker. All these gentlemen will be accompanied by their wives. Each is being sent out by a different denomination.

Rev. Mr. Orchard who bade farewell to the congregation of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church on Thursday evening will leave Fredericton on Monday next. He will go to Senigra, N. Y., where he will remain for a few days. He will sail from New York City for Southampton and after remaining in Great Britain for about ten days will sail for India. He will land at Colombo and from there go to his destination which is to some point in the Madras Presidency. Mr. Orchard was graduated from U. N. B. in 1907 and has resided in this city for some years. He is being sent out by the Baptist denomination.

Rev. James W. Howe is a native of Stanley and a son of Sheriff William T. Howe. He is at present in the city but will leave this evening for his old home in Stanley where he will spend a week. He will leave on Monday, October 3rd, for Vancouver whence he will sail for Tokio, Japan. Mr. Howe will spend a year in Tokio and afterward will continue his missionary work in some other part of the Japanese Empire. He was graduated by U. N. B. in 1904. He is being sent out by the Methodist Church.

Rev. A. H. Barker will labor in the mission field of Corea to which he will go early in 1911. Mr. Barker was graduated by U. N. B. in 1905 and resided in Fredericton during his college course. He will be sent out by the Presbyterian Church.

Supreme Court Completed Judgments—Conviction in Albert County Scott Act Cases Sustained.

The Supreme Court yesterday afternoon delivered judgment in several important cases and adjourned sine die.

In the case of The King vs. Peck, ex-parte Beal, an Albert County Scott Act case, the Court held, Judges McLeod and McKeown dissenting, that the conviction should stand.

In the case of The King vs. Peck, ex-parte O'Neill, in which the defendant, a St. John wine merchant, was accused of shipping liquor into a county in which the Canada Temperance Act was in force, the conviction was sustained.

In the case of Edmundston vs. Allen, a York County case, in which Judge Forbes had charged strongly against the defendant, the Court was unanimous in ordering a new trial on the ground that the damages found were excessive and the jury misdirected.

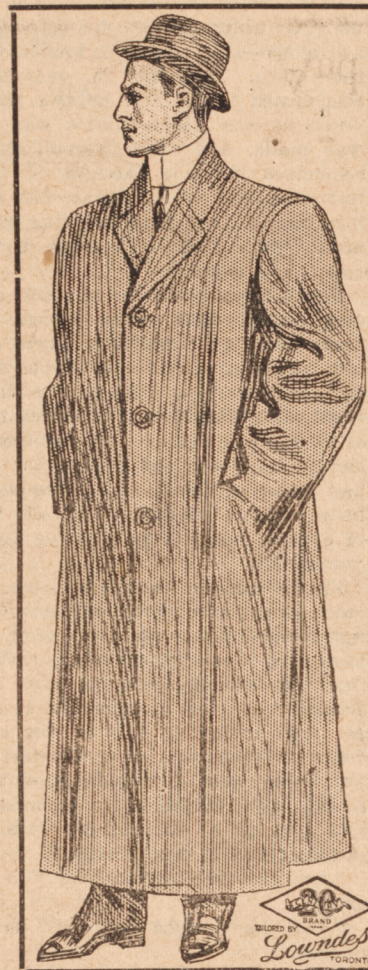
In the case of McKee vs. The Dalhousie Lumber Company, the Chief Justice and Judges McLeod and McKeown gave judgment refusing the application to set aside the verdict for the defendant and enter a verdict for the plaintiff. Judges Landry and Barry expressed the opinion that judgment should be given for the plaintiff. The verdict for the defendant stands.

In this case of The King vs. Murray ex-parte Copp, in which the defendant had been convicted under the Canada Temperance Act, the Court ordered the conviction to be quashed, on the ground that the information had been insufficient and improper.

In the case of Giberson vs. The Toronto Construction Company, a non-suit was ordered to be entered, pursuant to the leave granted.

This was an action over a quantity of lumber and was tried at Andover a short time ago and a verdict entered for the plaintiff for \$1100 or thereabouts. The defendants applied for a non-suit and it has been granted. Mr. T. J. Carter for plaintiff F. B. Carvell for the defendant company.

The Chief Justice, in delivering judgment in the case, remarked that he was at a loss to know how any intelligent jury could have returned such a verdict.

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
