On Their White Lily Brand Biscuits

At the Dominion Exhibition held at St. John recently Messrs. J. A. Marven, Limited of Moncton were awarded a handsome gold medal for the best display of biscuits, the competition being open to the entire Dominion.

LATE MELTON PRIOR THE WAR ARTIST

London, Nov. 4.—Melton Prior, special war artist and war correspondent of The Illustrated London News, is dead. He had represented this paper in twenty-four campaigns and revolutions, his first appearance on a battle field having been in the Ashantee war in 1873.

His record in the field includes the Ashanti War of 1873; the Carlist Rising, 1874; Herzegovinian, Servian, Turkish, Kaffir, Basuto, Zulu, and Boer wars; the Egyptian campaign, 1882; the Sudan and Nile Expedition, the Burmese War, the disturbance in South Africa in 1896, the Greco-Turkish war, and the Tichin Rising, 1897.

From 1872 until 1886, Mr. Prior remained for one year only without seeing service. In addition to his work as war-artist, Mr. Prior attended every state ceremony which occurred during his brief stays in England. He went to Athens with the Prince of Wales's suite in 1875; travelled with the King of Denmark's expedition through Iceland; accompanied the Marquess and Marchioness of Lorne on their first visit to Canada; and was present at the Berlin Conference. Mr. Prior's most recent campaigning was during the late war in South Africa, when he was in Ladysmith during the siege.

Mr. Prior was in Canada again in 1901, representing his paper on the memorable tour of the then Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York (now King George V. and Queen Mary). Since that time he went to India to be present at the Delhi Durbar, and in 1903 he was with the Somaliland expedition, and in the following year was present at the Russo-Japanese war. On that occasion he went to the Far East by the Canadian route.

WHO WRECKED THE BATTLESHIP MAINE?

Kan as City, Nov. 4.—Lecturing at St. George's Church, Colonel Jasper Ewing Brady, one of the four officers sent by the United States Government to investigate the destruction of the battleship Maine in Havana Harbor, February 14, 1898, declared last night that the mine which destroyed the battleship was placed by the Cubans in order to bring war with Spain and the deliverance of Cuba. He further asserted that the information had been sent to the President and the Secretary of War.

"When I went to investigate the disaster with three other United States officials," Col. Brady said, "there were three theories concerning the origin of the disaster:

"That the explosion was caused from the outside by agents of Spain; that it was caused from the inside, and that the Maine was anchored over a mine prepared by the Cubans. We were able to inform the President and the Secretary of War that the last theory was the most consistent with the facts. This leads to the conclusion that the Maine was blown up by the Cubans in order to bring on war with Spain and the deliverance of Cuba."

Continuing, he said: "Now I will tell you for the first time the name of the man who blew up the Maine. He is, or was, Jose Zavaldo. He was electrician at Morro Castle. It was he who threw the switch which set off the powerful mine that destroyed the ship and sent 207 lives into eternity in a flash. Zavaldo was afterwards shot by order of General Blanco. We even got a piece of the cable that led from the mine to the wire room in Morro Castle. That piece of cable is now in the Navy Department at Washington."

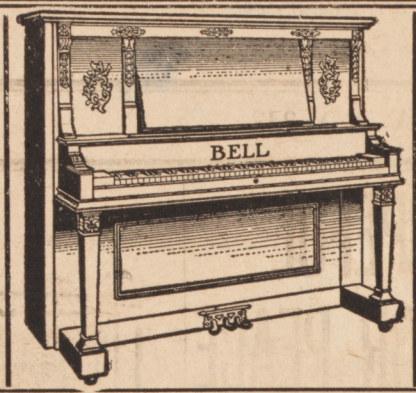
