## CATTLE FROM ONTARIO.

Mr. Thomas Gray of Kingsclear and Mr. Dudley Currie of Macnaquac, well known and successful beef raisers have returned from a trip to Ontario, where they purchased seventy-three head of cattle, which they will fatten for market during the coming winter. These gentlemen carry on beef raising as a side line, but heretofore they have been able to obtain what animals they needed from the farmers of York, Kings and Northumberland Counties. This year, however, they claim there were none to be had and they were compelled to journey to Ontario for a supply. The animals will be fattened and sold to Fredericton and St. John butchers. Mr. Gray will fatten 58 head and Mr. Currie 20.

## DAY ELECTRIC SERVICE WILL BEGIN IN FEW WEEKS

New Boiler Has Been Installed at Power-House--Circuits Being Extended and Altered.

The improvements at the power-house of the Fredericton Gas Light Company necessary for the establishment of a day electrical-power service are well under way. It is not expected that the day service will be a fact for some weeks, however, as it is the intention of the company to have everything as near readiness as possible before giving the service in order to avoid any interruptions. For some time past the employees of the company have been engaged getting the outside circuits in readiness for the day service. These circuits will be arranged so as to prevent any continued interruption by breaks. A third boiler has been added to the equipment of the plant. The new boiler is already in place and has been connected, but has not been used yet. With the additional equipment of the boiler-room 600 or 700 horse-power can be obtained. No date has yet been definitely fixed for the beginning of the new service, but is likely to be announced within a short time.

## CHARLES CLIFF OF KINGSCLEAR KILLED NEAR WINNIPEG

Circumstances of Fatal Accident Unknown--Son of Late Councillor E. A. Cliff.

Mr. Charles Cliff, son of Mrs. E. A. Cliff of Kingsclear, was accidentally killed near Winnipeg yesterday. A telegram containing word of his death was received by Recorder T. H. Colter this morning but contained no particulars of the accident. The body will be brought east for burial.

The deceased went to Manitoba in August last on the Harvesters' excursion and intended to return home in the spring. Recently he had been working as a carpenter near Winnipeg. He was the only son of the late Councillor E. A. Cliff of Kingsclear, and was about twenty years of age. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved relatives as the young man was of great promise.

Mrs. Alanson McNally, grandmother of the deceased, left yesterday for Berwick, N. S., to visit her son, Dr. George J. McNally. She was informed at St. John of the death of her grandson and will return home.

Five sisters survive the deceased. They are Mrs. Veysey of North Lake, Mrs. Simms of Isle of Pines, another attending the Provincial Normal School and two at home. Recorder Colter is a great uncle of the deceased.

## MEETING WITH SUCCESS.

Mr. F. W. Stevens, of St. John, representative of the Universal Chimney Cleaner Company, is in the city. Mr. Stevens says that it is likely that his company will establish a plant in either Moncton or St. John those places offering better shipping facilities than any other in the province. The fire insurance companies have taken up the idea of compulsory clearing of flues, and an attempt will be made in St. John to pass a by-law requiring such cleaning. Some fire insurance companies have offered a five per cent. reduction in rates on houses the flues of which are regularly cleaned.

## POLICE WILL WATCH FOR SMALL BOYS WITH FIREARMS

Great Danger Arises From Carrying of Revolvers and Rifles by Children.

The prevalence of the custom of allowing very young boys to carry firearms has been brought so forcibly to public attention recently that the authorities are going to take steps in the matter. Yesterday the police were making inquiries concerning the boys who were discharging rifles on the hills south of the city some days ago and sent a bullet through the window of a house. The danger that arises from the discharge of firearms in the outskirts of the city is great, but to it has been added the carrying of revolvers by young boys in the city. A few days ago, it is reported, a small boy living in the eastern part of the town, while playing with a number of other children, produced a loaded revolver which he presented at his companions. So dangerous a plaything might be the cause of a tragedy.

One matter that is likely to be taken up by the authorities is the method of sale of firearms in the city. It is also possible that the police may be asked to prepare and keep a record of persons possessing firearms. Ald. Osborne, who is a member of the police commission, stated this morning that it was realized that something should be done with regard to the matters, and that steps should be taken at once.

At this season of the year, practically everyone who can get possession of a rifle or shot gun is hunting and the small boy is no exception. Boys in parties, or singly, armed with small calibre rifles infest the woods near the city every day of the week.

## OUR SURVEYOR GENERAL.

The last number of Canada, an illustrated weekly published in London says: "The Hon. W. C. Hazen Grimmer, M. A., Surveyor-General of New Brunswick, was born at St. Stephen in 1858, of British parents. He was educated at Fredericton University, where he studied law. He was returned to the Legislature of the province in 1903 and again in 1908, in which year he was appointed to the portfolio he now holds. He has been mayor of his native town, and he is a warden of Charlotte County. Mr. Grimmer, an interview with whom appeared in last week's Canada, is at present in England."
