

### THERE IS MONEY IN STANDARD OIL

New York, Dec. 16.—Accompanying the announcement today that Standard Oil Company has issued final quarterly dividend to shareholders amounting to \$10,000,000 it was calculated that John D. Rockefeller, as owner of 25 per cent of the stock has received since 1882 about \$180,000,000 as his share of the dividends.

Since 1882 the company disbursed \$709,812,620 out of its profits of \$1,129,442,064 leaving a surplus of \$419,679,444. This is the first time that any real idea of Mr. Rockefeller's fortune must be up to date, as estimated to any accurate degree.

### NOVA SCOTIA MAN TALKS OF FUR BUSINESS

(Middleton, N. S., Outlook.)

One day this week we chanced to be a fellow passenger on a freight train with Coun. W. E. FitzRandolph of Williamston, and we enjoyed a pleasant and very instructive chat with him.

Mr. FitzRandolph's leading business is dealing in furs. As a boy he hunted for bearing animals. Later he used occasionally to ship furs to Halifax. Still later he bought considerable quantities in the vicinity of his home and sold to Mr. Samuel Burrill, of Yarmouth, then a general dealer.

Upon Mr. Burrill's death Mr. FitzRandolph began to do business more directly with the large fur dealers. Ten years ago Mr. FitzRandolph formed a partnership with Mr. T. B. Chipman, of Tupperville, a level-headed, shrewd young man, with a wide acquaintance with the people of Western Nova Scotia.

Messrs. FitzRandolph & Chipman made business connections with New York and Paris and also with London, the great fur headquarters of the world. They also began buying from local fur dealers in the maritime provinces, Newfoundland and to a limited extent in Quebec.

The first year the new firm did business to the value of \$10,000 and last year they handled \$75,000 worth of furs.

It may be generally supposed that Nova Scotia has ceased to be a fur producing province. But this is not the case. Mr. FitzRandolph estimates the annual value of the fur produced in this province at \$100,000 at least. Most of the fur bearing animals of Canada except wolves, are found in Nova Scotia. They include otter, beaver, bear, wild cat, fox, mink, muskrat, raccoon and skunk.

The martin is now practically gone. The otter is still quite numerous and a good skin sometimes brings as high as \$75. The finest mink skins in the world are from Nova Scotia. The muskrat is also numerous. At present Messrs. FitzRandolph & Chipman have on hand 15,000 muskrat skins, half of them from Nova Scotia.

Beautiful fox skins came from Newfoundland. Last year Mr. FitzRandolph paid \$800 for one skin, and \$600 \$400 and \$200 were common prices. Foxes are becoming very scarce in Nova Scotia. Mr. FitzRandolph would like to see the fox protected in Nova Scotia for several years, as is now the beaver. Trapping foxes at least should be forbidden. There are several fox farms in P. E. Island and one in Cumberland Co., N. S., where the black and silver, the high priced foxes, are raised.

### BANK OF ENGLAND HAS PECULIAR NOTES

(From the Scientific American.)

About the year 1819 a great outcry was raised against the Bank of England for not adopting a style of note that could not be imitated and at the same time preventing the sacrifice of life which at that period was common, the punishment for forgery being death. The subject at least became so pressing that the government appointed commissioners to investigate the cause of the numerous forgeries and whether a mode could be devised whereby the forging of bank notes might be prevented.

Previous to this investigation the directors of the bank had been endeavoring to remedy the evil, many plans having been submitted to them, all of which they were obliged to reject.

The bank placed before the commissioners 180 different projects that had been recommended for adoption and seventy varieties of paper made by way of experiment. The result of all this labor was the bank note of today.

The color of the paper is peculiar and cannot be imitated exactly by counterfeiters except at great expense. The combined thinness and strength of the paper are also unique. It is made in sheets large enough for two notes. Each note before it is sized weighs about eighteen grains and then if doubted it is strong enough to suspend a weight of thirty-six pounds.

The texture of the paper is also peculiar. It has a crisp feel invariably the same and such that bank clerks of experience can readily detect forgeries by this test alone. Then the wire mark impressed in the making by a frame, costly to make and difficult to use, is practically inimitable.

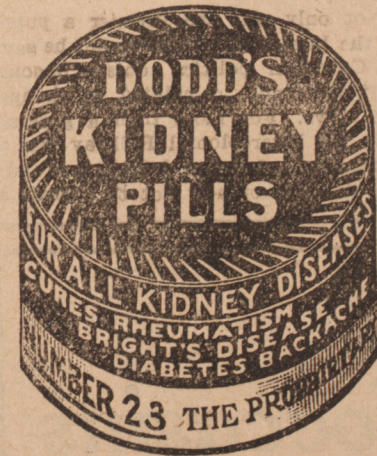

This ink has a peculiar and very deep shade of black, common black inks being tinted either with blue or brown

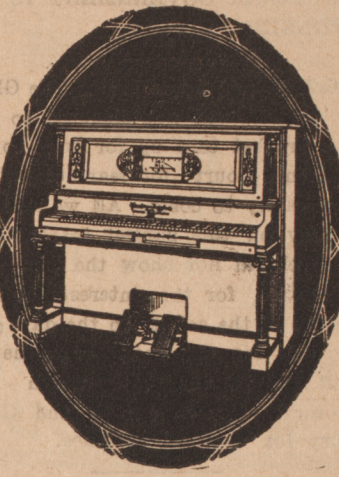
