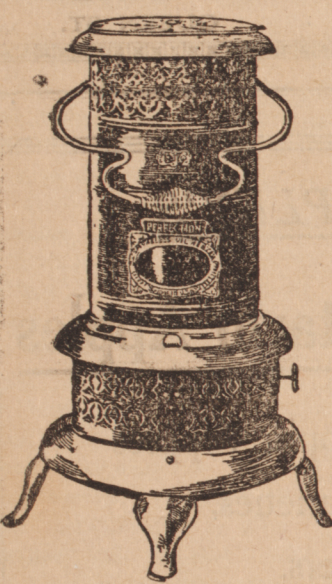

OWEN MORAN

HOTFOOT AFTER
AD WOLGAST

English Boxer Will Stay on This Side Until His Bout with Wolgast.

New York, Dec. 18.—"My chief ambition is to meet Ad. Wolgast for the lightweight championship," said Owen Moran, who whipped "Battling Nelson" "I am glad that he has come out of his hole sufficiently to say he will meet me February 22," Moran continued. "Any inducement that I can make to bring about a meeting will be made cheerfully by me. I never bagged over terms, and I certainly won't in this instance."

Moran is in excellent trim after his fight with Nelson. He believes the Dane was in as good condition and as strong and clever as he ever was during his pugilistic career when they met. "Nelson always fights the same," he said, "and I had his measure early in the game. He was the best man I ever met, and the fact that I defeated him in eleven rounds and was the first man who ever knocked him out is good enough for me, if I ever met Wolgast, for it took the latter forty-three rounds to win the championship from the Dane. I have to my credit a victory over Wolgast in a six round go in the featherweight class."

HIS CAREER

In speaking of his pugilistic career Moran said he had engaged in 180 contests. He began about ten years ago. He is now twenty-six years of age. He was born in Birmingham, England, of Irish parentage, and he speaks modestly of his achievements. Unlike some pugilists, he does not detract from the merits of other fist celebrities. He acknowledges that he has met defeat six times, but never, he claims, has he been knocked out or even knocked down squarely from a blow.

Moran is said to have contracts for ten weeks to give theatrical exhibitions at \$1,000 per week. He intended to go home for the holidays, but changed his mind in view of the opportunity to make plenty of cash, and will remain here until Wolgast is ready to meet him in the ring. Moran says he intends to become an American citizen and will soon take out his first papers. He is to go in partnership with Charlie Harvey, his manager, in a business venture.

Moran has as his sparring partner, a British lad named "Cliff" Perry, who has been in California for four years, where he has made a good reputation in the ring.

ONTARIO PRO UNABLE
TO GET PLAYERS

Ottawa amateurs seem to be passing up the Ontario Professional Hockey League. Geo. Booth has been trying for weeks to sign up a team for Trenton, but has not yet succeeded in getting any complete contracts. The Trenton Club made an offer to "Moose" Goodwin, the Capital cover point, who is also some hockey player. They guaranteed him \$25 per week and expenses as well as transportation both ways. Goodwin may go; also "Ras" Murphy, who was at Galt last season, and Fred Moffat, who played "amateur" hockey at \$20 per week in the Maritime Provinces. Dickie A. Young, an Emmett player, may take a trip to Trenton for a few weeks. Alex. Currie, Tommy Smith and Harry Broadbent declined the offers.

NOT IMPRESS NORMAN

"Rollie" Norman, reached St. John yesterday on his way home from the States. While in Boston he witnessed a couple of exhibitions of his favorite sport, but is rather inclined to be critical of the style of play in vogue at the Hub. "Cork" is very enthusiastic about the prospects of professional hockey in the Maritime Provinces and predicts that the "pro" teams will be among the best in Canada.

Schenectady, N. CREW WERE SAVED

Rockland, Me., Dec. 19.—The Boston fishing schooner Marina was wrecked on Bay Lodges near the Fox Islands in Penobscot Bay last night and is a total loss. The crew of fifteen men including Captain Edward Bishop, put off in five dories after coming ten miles reached here today. Allen F. LUNATICS ISSUE
"BUG" NEWSPAPER

Fishkill Landing, N. Y., Dec. 17.—Inmates for the Matteawan State Asylum for Insane have issued a newspaper that hereafter will be a regular weekly issue providing the moon or other causes do not affect the editors at publication time. In its first issue which has just made its appearance, the scribes of the institution rap society generally and alienists particularly, in referring to them a paragraph under the "Wise and Otherwise column" says:

"Some have a conscience but their business is con-science. Their 'science' is not exact. They are not as wise as they look."

James De Torre, formerly a newspaper man of Albany, who killed his brother some years ago, is the editor of the publication, which is called the "Looneytic." It contains many sketches some humorous and others pathetic.

In its salutary the editor says:—"Every profession trade or business has a journal to voice its wants kicks and benefits except the bugs. In New York thirty thousand of us are now restrained, housed and clothed at an annual expense of \$6,800,000—a mere trifle. Outside of insane asylums thousands are being incubated in the hatches of so-called civilized and Christian society, preparing to make one of these palaces their final roosting place. It is to put them and the taxpayers who ante their freight wage to the inside of their future home that we launch this long felt want in time of peace prepare for war—or a bughouse."

"Dr. R. B. Lamb superintendent of the Matteawan Asylum says some high grade imbeciles are in the building. We rise to ask if any are located in the administration end of this gorgeous pile?"

"Since some of us roared a protest we get soap on bathing day. Visitors only see the show part of big institutions."

"The profits from this family journal will be spent on the bugs entertainment. It's the same old thing here day after day. Give us a chance to help ourselves."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
