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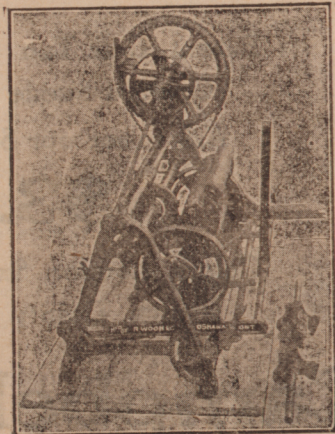

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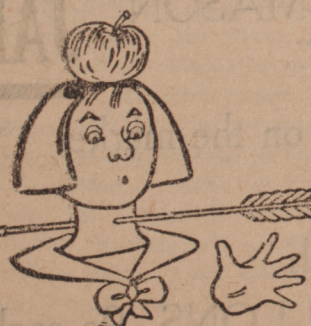

R. K. Y. C. MOTOR-BOAT RACE, MILLIDGEVILLE TO FREDERICTON WON BY THE BONSEL

Winner's Correct Time was 6 Hours, 8 Minutes, 17 Seconds--
Twenty-Two Boats Started and only One Failed to Finish--
Water was Smooth and Weather Very Warm.

The long distance motor boat race on Saturday from St. John to Fredericton, under the auspices of the R.K.Y.C., was won on time allowance by the Bonsel, owned by Gandy & Allison of St. John. The L. M. Trask Company's boat, the Ferro, was the first to cross the line here arriving at three minutes after 3 o'clock. Dr. Barton's boat, the Keonik finished second, reaching Fredericton at 3.30 p.m.

THE START

Twenty-two boats started from Millidgeville and twenty-one of them finished. The day was bright, clear and very warm. The fog which had drifted in early in the morning, lifted, making the weather excellent for such a race. Before the hour for starting arrived. Some of the owners of the boats had slept on board their boats all night and had everything in readiness for the start. Typewritten copies of instructions for the race were handed to the owners of the boats by the judges, so that no mistake would be made during the race. Fifteen minutes before the start, a flag was hoisted from the club house as a warning. Five minutes before the start a gun was fired in order to get the boats lined up for the start. At sharp 8 o'clock the starting gun was fired and nearly all the boats got away in fine shape. Just as though they wanted to be contrary, some had a hard time to get started. One of the conditions of the race was that all boats were to allow at least ten feet of clear water between them when passing each other, but this rule had to be disregarded in passing through the channel. The boats had a hard time passing each other, and several of them collided, but no damage was done. The Trask boat started in to leave the rest of the boats, but the Keonik and one or two of the other boats clung gamely to her and put a great fight for quite a distance. The Essex, owned by H. J. Fleming which

was looked upon as a winner, broke down soon after the start, and had to be towed back to Indian town.

SMOOTH WATER

The water was almost as smooth as glass all the way to Fredericton, but the boats had to keep pretty well in shore, as a strong tide was running. This was chiefly the cause of some of the boats finishing so late as one of two of them went too far in and got entangled in the blades of the propellers which hindered their speed somewhat. Several of the boats found it hard navigating the Gagetown creek, and one or two of them came to grief there. J. Purdy's boat ran aground two miles below this city and had to be hauled off by a passing tugboat.

J. P. Gregory's boat put up a good race till Carter's Point was reached, and then she dropped back considerably. The leading boats crossed to the left side of the river at Carter's and retained this position for about five or six miles. The engine in the Trask boat worked well and did not lose a minute on the way up. At Carter's Point the boats could be seen stretched out for quite a way down the river, the more powerful boats being well up with the smaller ones, chugging along pluckily on the rear.

THE FLAGSHIPS

The Corinthian, Commodore Thomson's yacht and flag-ship of the R.K.Y.C. squadron accompanied the boats to this city. The Lolita flag-ship of the St. John Boat Club also came up. The yachts and boats all left for St. John Sunday morning with the exception of one which broke down and is undergoing repairs here.

The 2.21 class was also closely contested. In this class the stallion, King Arion was a disappointment as he had to withdraw on account of colic after the first heat. Onward Gratten, owned by C. J. Hanson of Presque Isle, won in straight heats and lowered his mark from 2.19 1/2 to 2.15 1/2.

THOUSANDS TURNED OUT TO SEE RUNNERS AT MOOSEPATH PARK

St. John, July 11.—"One of the greatest day's sport I have ever seen" was the general verdict of the crowd that attend the opening of the running races on Moosepath Park Saturday afternoon. It is estimated that between 2,000 and 3,000 people occupied seats in the grandstand, or watched the racers from behind the enclosure, on foot and in carriages or automobiles. The management feel greatly satisfied with the way the local people patronized the sport, and it would seem that future meets are now assured.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH- WEST LAND REGULATIONS

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
