LOCAL FLORAL EXPERTS TALKS ON UP TO DATE SUBJECTS

Mr. John Bebbington, Sr., Calls Attention to Some Fine Gardening--The Condition of the Normal School Grounds--Horticulture in Education--A Plea For the School Garden.

Gorgeous and beautiful shrubs are those in front of Major Massie's residence. They are hydrangia paniculata grandiflora; the most popular and useful shrub up to the present time. This shrub was introduced from Japan some twenty-five years ago and since it became known has had the largest distribution of any shrub known. The word hydrangia--from hydra, water and aggeton a vessel referring to the cup form of the capsule or seed vessel.

Most of these shrubs were planted by Mr. Wm. Dunbar for the late Mrs. G. Fraser who built the residence which was bought by the Bank of Montreal for their manager's use. Major Massie is quite an enthusiastic gardener, his beds of hybrid perpetual roses, phlox, hollyhocks, dahlias, etc., all signifying his admiration and taste for the beautiful in garden ing.

His Lordship, Bishop Richardson and Mr. Rob. Randolph, Church St., last spring procured a quantity of assorted flowering and ornamental leaved shrubs which were arranged after a plan furnished by landscape gardener Gould of Sussex.

His Lordship has also planted an assortment of perennial phlox, peonies and other popular garden flowers, and the beds now make quite a show. Mr. Abraham Alward has an acknowledged reputation for gardening. His gladiolus, collection of peonies, roses, pansies, sweet peas, phlox and in the spring beds of tulips and Japanese Iris form one of the city's best displays. For years past at the exhibition Mr. Alward's gladiolus and other flowers and vegetables have been quite an important feature.

Mr. Donald Fraser at the other end of the city has recently shown the public he does not live by bread alone. He procured in Scotland some novelties in roses etc., and went to work at great expense and laid out his grounds with flower beds in formal design and has now transformed them into one of the most beautiful residence grounds of the city. I regret the condition the Normal school grounds for the present local government has not seen fit to appropriate funds to keep up any floral embellishment. It has at the present a deteriorated appearance. The appearance of a country farm house compared with the improvement made all along the front street, the stores and buildings in every line showing the result of advancing civilization. The Normal School grounds are to say the least behind time. These grounds could be made a credit to the city by planting a wind break of

combination evergreen and deciduous trees as background fronting river near city hall. Shrubs and beds of hollyhocks, phlox, and other hardy perennials also a little grading work would be in place in that part of the grounds. By the selection of rocks and roots by a person of skilled taste in this direction, after a little extra out lay, an appropriation of one hundred dollars a year from some source would keep the grounds in creditable shape by having the janitor cut the grass.

To your correspondent it seems a pity that such a favorable spot for beauty, a front garden for the main front street stores should be destitute of such an embellishment. As nature and the art of man go hand in hand this would be an object lesson for student teachers. The president of the American Florist association at a convention held at Rochester recently urged that the study of nature as it can be carried on through the school garden is a practical form of education. This is another encouraging evidence that modern education is leaving the old beaten track and getting away from the formal idea that education should be entirely classical and literary and that the only avenue for man's intellectual activity lay in one of the professions. It is now recognized that education should rather seek to broaden and beautify the lives of all by furnishing to every youth a practical knowledge of some calling which would fit him not only to learn his livelihood but to get the best out of life by supplying new avenues of enjoyment and of realization of the highest conception of life. This is the more necessary, because 95 per cent of all the children attending the public schools never pass through the high schools or go to college. In developing the youth of the country the school furnishes the most solid corner stone for a free government and in this form of practical education the school garden and all that it implies will perform no humble part. Another speaker said there is something more in life than merely the three R's but in order to give to the adult the power to appreciate the beauties of nature a love of these things must be implanted in early life, and it is in the schoolroom and school garden that this taste will be acquired, fostered, and cultivated. He asked and hoped that the florists of the country would contribute in planting trees, shrubs and flowers and make every school garden a thing of beauty which would have a reflex influence on the whole community.
